Ernie Woods, Finds Pakistan Peculiar

Ernie Woods writes from Pakistan that he and Mrs Cecile Cole were married February 3 and describes the ceremony which is further described in a mimeographed sheet published there. Mrs Woods wore a purple sari and the teachers of the colony made an event of the wedding which was the first to be held there.

Ernie is to be assistant town manager of Baral, the name of the settlement built for English and American workers on the dam. Houses are all brick, even closet walls are brick. Nearly every line of business is represented.

Pakistanis drive the big machines, getting \$3.75 per day although laborers get 82 cents a day. There is \$58 million worth of rolling stock on the job. The project is very big, 12,000 feet of earth fill dam, 8000 native workers on the job and all the living conditions to be moved in for the engineers and overseers, and nearly all of it in place.

Formers Gather To Hear Word From Washington

Farmers half filled the cafeteria at Sherman High school Tuesday night to hear an explanation of the 1963 wheat and feed grain programs and some discussion of other topics including the production of safflower and a promise to give further information on the controversial 1964 wheat program.

Joe Heater, chairman of the ASCS committee, introduced the speakers who were Ted Dunwoodie of the state ASCS, who was delegated to explain the 1963 wheat program. Farmers must sign up by March 22 and the explanation was understandable until farmers began asking specific question about problems involving rental of several farms, planting to grass and postponing compliance to another year. Not all of these questions were answered.

George Potter from the ASCS explained the feed grain program which also requires sign-up by March 22. In this connection it was said that the USDA is very anxious to have a big sign-up for this program and can be expected to protect farmers who go into it by manipulating the price of barley in his favor. Barley is now equal to the loan and the idea seemed to be that the CCC would not let it stay.

Bill Hall said there was normal moisture in the ground for this date. Tommy Thompson said that there was a possibility that the fall trow of rust came from the growing grain on diverted acres and suggested a different crop than wheat. Rust, it was explained, likes to have some green plants to live on. Thompson said the 1964 wheat program was not yet available but meetings on it would be held probably in April.

Harold Blain, talked about safflower. He is an employee of a vegetable oil company in Spokane and would like to see more safflower grown in the northwest to help fill the demand for it in Japan. The market has been expanding because it is used in foods now.

Dr. Davidson Takes Position With State

Dr. Hugh R. Davidson has accepted a position at the Columbus Park home in The Dalles starting May 1 and will discontinue his private practice a week or two before that date to give time for a vacation. Dr. Davidson has been coming to Moro every Tuesday for two or three years and, inasmuch as no other doctor seems anxious to continue that practice, the office here will be closed.
