WATER SHORT THIS YEAR

The 1963 water supply outlook in the Hood River-Wasco county area remains only "fair" with poor late season flows expected on most streams, according to a report released today by T. P. Helseth, state conservationist for the US department of agriculture Soil Conservation service co-operating with OSU and the state engineer. The snow pack is nearly a record low for February 1.

Water content of the snowpack is only 20 percent of average for February 1 and only 28 percent of last year at this time. It is very unlikely that remaining winter storms will make up the present shortage of snow cover. If normal conditions of temperature and precipitation occur between now and April 1, the snow pack will end up only 41 percent of the 15 year average.

Watershed soils are well primed and will favor runoff from snowmelt later this spring.

White river is forecast to flow 110,000 acre feet or 62 percent for the April to September period.

Statewide, Oregon's water supply outlook for the spring and summer months of 1963 is extremely poor except where adequate reservoir facilities can provide stored water. Reservoirs continue to gain storage from recent heavy rains and melting of snow up to elevations of 7000 feet. Snowpack is nearly record low and summer streamflow will be much below average resulting in drastic shortages for most lands without access to stored water supplies.

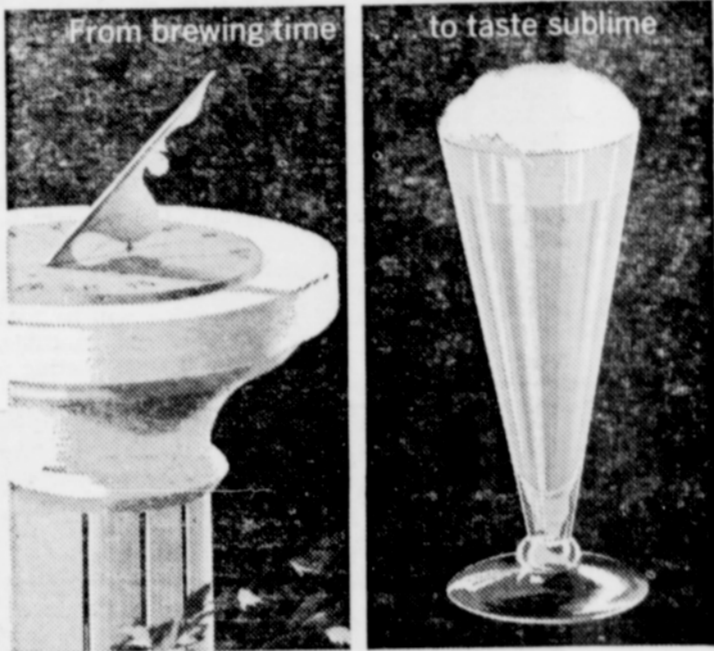
ANNUAL WEED MEETING
