FEED GRAIN BILL

The house agricultural committee last Tuesday voted 20 to 15 to report out the Poage feed grain bill.

As approved by the committee the bill provides for a two year extension of a revised feed grain program. The house committee has not scheduled the bill for floor action. Most speculation is that no further action will be taken on the feed grain bill until after the wheat program referendum.

'64 WHEAT PROGRAM

Marketing quotas for the 1964 wheat crop have been proclaimed and May 21 has been set as the date of the referendum. The vote is on the program for one year only—1964.

The county ASC office received the 1964 allotment figures for '64 last week. Statistical information received gives Sherman county a wheat base acreage of 146,059 and allotment of 89,975 acres.

The 1964 farm allotment will call for a 38.34 percent reduction as compared to 1962 when a slightly larger reduction was necessary with a 39.18 percent reduction.

Passage of the 1964 program will call for a mandatory diversion of 10 percent for the old 55 million national allotment. This last already has been calculated in the above figures. The diversion will be 6.85 acres for every 100 acre wheat base acres. Calculations to determine farm diversion can be done by multiplying the 1964 allotment by 11.11 percent.

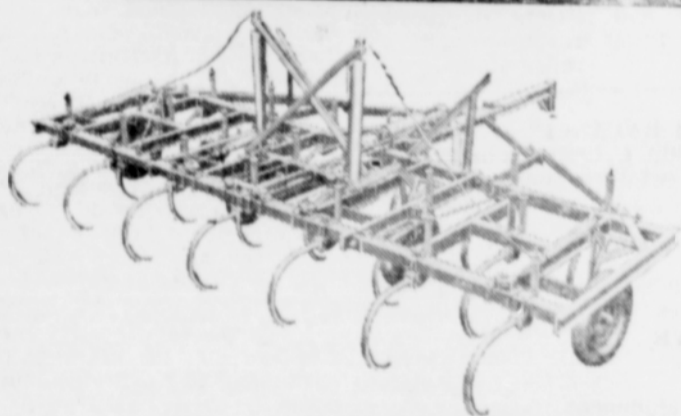
