The 1963 telephone directory will start arriving at homes and businesses here today (May 23), according to Cal Horn, local manager for Pacific Northwest Bell.

Expanded area code information for long distance calling will be found in the introductory pages of the new directory. Many books with area codes for hundreds of U.S. and Canadian communities are available at the business office. New Blue Books for personal telephone number lists are also available for the asking. Both are free of charge.

Horn urged everyone to jot police, fire and other emergency service numbers in the spaces provided inside the front cover of the phone book. Small pictures of appropriate emergency vehicles have been printed next to these spaces to aid quick identification.

The post office is delivering the phone books again this year, and expects to complete the job by Tuesday (May 28).

Some 14,000 copies were printed for the Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam County exchanges listed in the book.

More than 9100 will be distributed to those exchanges next week.

Another 1200 will go to other points in Oregon and throughout the nation. The remaining copies will be used during the year for new customers and for replacement of worn out books.

Moro Library Adds New Books For Summer Reading

New books added to the Moro Public Library this week are: Frank Slaughter's Tomorrow's Miracle; Mary O'Hara's Wyoming Summer; Taylor Caldwell's Grand mother and the Priests and a U. S. Coast Guard publication entitled Recreational Boating Guide.

Tomorrow's Miracle is a novel of a young evangelist who becomes a medical missionary. This is the thirty-fourth novel by Frank Slaughter. A graduate of John Hopkins Medical School at the age of twenty-two, Dr. Slaughter, through his experience as a surgeon, writes with authenticity and immediacy a quality which has made him eminently popular with anyone reading his books.

Wyoming Summer is a documentary novel based on the journal Miss O'Hara kept while living fourteen years on the Goose Bar Ranch in Wyoming. The principal characters of this book are Mary O'Hara and her husband. Few authors have ever written of ranches, animals and people with more warmth and understanding. Mary O'Hara was trained as a pianist, but in the early 30's she migrated to Hollywood and became one of the top script writers of that period. In the late 30's she and her family moved to Wyoming, and her ranch there became the background for her famous novels, My Friend Flicks, Thunderhead and Green Grass of Wyoming. Wyoming Summer is the first book she has written about Wyoming since 1946. Miss O'Hara now lives in Connecticut. Our library has all of these books.

Taylor Caldwell's book is a most entertaining novel about saints and sinners, demons and angels, tyrants and humanitarians and Grandmother and her visiting priests. This is a story of heroes whose lives were indeed hard and perilous and who often, like their Lord, had no place to lay their heads and only random shelter. Taylor Caldwell was brought up in a town of Manchester, England and had a glorious, fascinating grandmother very much like the grandmother in this novel. She is the author of many successful novels. Among her most recent best-sellers that we have in the library are Dear and Glorious Physician, Never Victorious, Never Defeated, and This Side of Innocence.

The Recreational Boating Guide is a most instructive booklet for boat owners. It contains information concerning a legal minimum equipment requirements, responsibilities when operating, aids to navigation and hints on safety afloat and emergency procedures. Anyone who owns a boat should be familiar with this book.

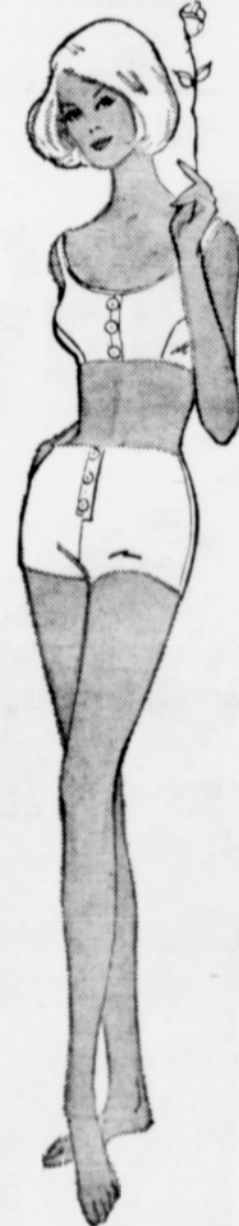
