The importance of Oregon's moving more swiftly toward total eradication of brucellosis (Bang's) was emphasized to members of the Wheeler County Stockgrowers' Association at a meeting May 20 at Sprague by J. W. Southworth, assistant director of the Oregon Department of Agriculture for livestock industries.

Southworth told the group that slaughter test reports are needed on every herd for total eradication. He stressed the fact that eradication was important to save tax dollars or re-direct them to some other disease program. Oregon has been a modified certified brucellosis area since July 1, 1959, and some of the counties have now been re-accredited. Dr. Donald B. Anderson, assistant federal veterinarian in charge for Oregon, who attended the meeting with Southworth, reported that Wheeler County now has the level of calfhood vaccination and testing to be re-accredited in the modified status.

The association's disease committee chairman, George Webb, urged 100 per cent calfhood vaccination. He expressed the hope that the Oregon Department of Agriculture would be able to get the trace-back system to operate efficiently enough to give a check on all herds and eliminate a necessity for mass testing on the farm in order to achieve total eradication.

Off-Farm Job Outlook For Farm Families Told In OSU Bulletin

More than one-third of Oregon's farm jobs were eliminated between 1950 and 1960 as farms became bigger, fewer, and more mechanized — raising the question of off-farm job opportunities for persons coming from farm backgrounds. A recent survey by Oregon State University Agricultural Experiment Station of employers in Oregon urban areas reveals both encouraging and discouraging news for people no longer able to find full or profitable employment on the farm. More than 90 percent of the employers interviewed indicated they would hire persons coming from a farm background as readily as they would those from other backgrounds if other qualifications were equal. However, a majority were reluctant to hire part-time farmers. Part-time farming — comparable to "moonlighting" or holding two jobs — was considered an undesirable quality of applicants by more than half of the employers interviewed. "Moonlighting" was most acceptable to employers in government and was disapproved most by employer in finance, insurance, and real estate. The OSU findings are reported in a bulletin, "Off-Farm Employment Opportunities for Oregon Farm Families." Oregon residents may obtain free copies of the bulletin from local county extension agents or from the OSU Bulletin Clerk, Corvallis.

Information was gathered by interviewing 390 employers in the Portland, Salem, and Eugene-Springfield areas. Employers also anticipate the following trends in types of job opportunities: increased percentage of skilled and professional-technical categories; clerical-sales increasing but at a slower rate; and number of unskilled workers increasing least. Federal-state programs have now been authorized to train unemployed and under-employed workers in skills to fit them for new job opportunities.
