

Oregon State Game Commission—

Big Game Management Units Revised Or Eliminated To Procure Better Hunting

Big game hunters are advised that several big game management units in the southwest region of the state were either revised or eliminated and new units established in an effort by the game commission to more effectively manage the big game resources in this area.

Management units effected include the Tenmile, Coquille, Umpqua, Douglas, Butte Falls and Green Springs, all of which have been abolished and the areas included into existing units or into new units. In addition, the Sius-

law unit will be split and a portion of the Powers unit included in one of the new units.

The Siuslaw unit as re-established will include only that portion north of the Lane county line to highway 36. The south half of highway 38 and the entire Tenmile unit will be incorporated into a new unit called the Elkton unit.

The Umpqua unit will be split north and south, with the western portion and the entire Coquille unit incorporated into the new Tioga unit. The east half of the old Umpqua unit, plus the northeast corner of the Powers unit and a strip of the Douglas unit taking in all agricultural areas to the east of highway 99, will be incorporated into the new Melrose unit. To keep big game hunters from being confused with Douglas county, the remainder of the old Douglas unit will hereinafter be called the Dixon unit.

The Butte Falls and Green Springs units will be split north and south approximately along the Jackson - Klamath county

lines. Both units will be abolished, with the east portion which takes in Klamath county to highway 97 and highway 62 to be known as the Keno unit, and west portion in Jackson county to highway 62 and highway 99 to be known as the Rogue unit. All other units in the southwest remain unchanged.

Big game hunters who intend to hunt in the southwest region this fall are urged to check these new unit boundaries on the map which will be provided in the 1963 big game synopsis. Unit permits for either deer or elk will be allocated this year according to the new unit boundaries.

Commencement Exercises Slated June 9 At Oregon

The 86th annual Commencement and Baccalaureate exercises at the University of Oregon will be held at 2:30 p.m., Sunday, June 9, with 1,851 candidates slated for advanced and baccalaureate degrees.

This year's graduating class is slightly under the all-time record figure of 1,892 set in June, 1962. The load on the June ceremony has been eased because of summer Commencement, held for the first time in August, 1962. At that time, 400 received degrees. A similar summer Commencement will be held again this August.

Candidates for baccalaureate degrees this June total 1,417 which is slightly over the 1,339 receiving such degrees last June. Doctoral candidates total 35 for Doctor of Philosophy degrees; 26 for Doctor of Education degrees; and one for a Doctor of Business Education degree.

Masters degree candidates number 392 with 142 Master of Arts; 160 for Master of Science; 85 for Master of Education; 8 for Master of Fine Arts; 15 for Master of Music; one for a Master of Landscape Architecture; and 20 for Master of Business Administration.

Sixteen will receive bachelor of arts degrees from the Honors College.

Included in the 1963 class are the following candidates from Moro who will receive the indicated degrees if requirements are completed: Arnold Lee Miller—Bachelor of Science, son of Vernon I. Miller of Rte. 1.

Game Commission And Lane County Erect Boat Ramp

Cooperation with Lane county was extended by the game commission in the development of two new boat ramps in the Lane county area. This cooperation was given approval by the game commission at its meeting in Portland on May 25.

The new boat ramps to be cooperatively built include one at Siltcoos lake within the Lane county park, being developed just north of Ada Station on the east side of the lake, and the Deerhorn ramp within the Deerhorn county park about six miles below the Leaugdam dam. Both ramps will be gravel fill.

In addition to the above ramps, the commission will also cooperate with the forest service in the development of a new boat ramp and parking area on Wood river tributary to Klamath lake. This parking area and ramp is located in an area providing very little access at present.

Also approved by the commission was the repair of the Alameda Bar and Schroeder Park ramps on the Rogue river.
