### Game Commission Plans Rehabilitation Projects For Waters

Four chemical treatment projects to bring waters back into good sport fish production for the angler were given the okay by the game commission at its meeting in Portland, Saturday, May 25.

On the agenda for rehabilitation late this summer are the Cow lakes in southeastern Oregon to the north of Jordan Valley, Bully creek impoundment on the Malheur river, Crooked river project from Sterms dam to about Opal Springs, and Big Lava lake on the century drive to the west of Bend.

All except Big Lava lake are

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set for chemical treatment before the summer ends. At Big Lava, biologists have been studying the rough fish build-up, mostly roach, for several years, but the good eastern brook trout angling at this popular lake opening week end may stall the treatment to some future date.

Brook trout angling at Big Lava has declined considerably over the past few years along with the build-up in the roach population. Partially controlled through gill and trap nets as well as spot chemical treatment failed to hold the population in check. The commission will watch this lake during the summer and if good catches of brook trout are continued to be made, the treatment will be postponed. Big Lava received previous chemical treatment about ten years ago.

Chemical treatment of Crooked river will be done in order to remove rough fish from a section of stream prior to impounding water in Round Butte dam. This is an attempt to reduce the rough fish population before they have a chance of getting into the impoundment to be brood stocks for a rapid build-up.

The Bully creek project again is an attempt to reduce the rough fish population in a section of the Malheur river before a build-up

of these fish occurs in this new impoundment. The reservoir did receive some water last winter and spring, which will also be chemically treated. The impoundment was built and completed last summer by the Bureau of Reclamation.

Cow lakes contains a conglomeration of rough fish, but little in the way of a sport fishery. Treatment here should bring this lake into good trout production.

More and better grass from sagebrush - bunchgrass range that blankets much of Eastern Oregon will be featured at a special June 25 field day at the Oregon State University Squaw Butte Experiment Station range.

Part, present, and future research will be discussed during a 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. tour of the range, 42 miles west of Burns on U.S. Highway 20, reports W. A. Sawyer, station superintendent, and Forrest A. Sneva, range management researcher.

of fertilizer for early spring production of crested wheatgrass, and digestibility trials to evaluate three range grasses.

Premature curing forage grasses for high - quality late season and winter grazing is another point of major interest. Visitors also can see how grass and beef

While sagebrush and cows 'make grass work harder,' eliminating cows doesn't solve all the grass problems, Sawyer says. Effects of 27 years' non-use of range by livestock will help tell this

story, he adds.

Discussion is also scheduled on amounts and types of feed supplements for specified gains of yearling beef animals grazing summer - long on crested wheatgrass pasture.
