Department Sets Hearings In June

Two hearings have been scheduled by the Oregon Department of Agriculture to consider amendments proposed for mobile slaughter regulations.

The changes are proposed to bring the regulations more in line with Oregon law. They would prohibit the mobile slaughter units from transporting the whole or parts of meat carcasses. The state now has 11 of these units licensed and two more in the process of securing licenses.

These proposed revisions will mean that the farmer will have to do all of the transporting of the carcasses of his animals.

The first of the mobile slaughter unit hearings will be Monday, June 17, at 1 p.m. in the ground floor conference room of the Jackson County courthouse Medford. The other hearing will be Wednesday, June 19, at 1:30 p.m. in the conference room of the Oregon Department of Agriculture Building, Salem.

Revisions in the department's list of pesticides highly toxic to man and restricted to use for commercial agricultural purposes will be considered at a hearing Monday, June 10, at 1 p.m. at the Department of Agriculture building, Salem.

Persons wishing to submit

written material to the department for any of the hearing may direct it to the department at Salem.

Deadline for receipt of the material on amendments to the mobile slaughter regulations is June 19 and on the pesticides' list revision the material is due June 10.

New Sport Fishery May Be Enjoyed in Oregon

Have you ever caught a mackinaw trout? Would you like to try it on light gear and enjoy a strong battling fish that will test your angling skill to the limit? If you would, and we don't know anyone who wouldn't, lend an ear, for this great fishery is available if you have a little time and the inclination.

It may be a little late this year, but anglers might keep this great sport fishery in mind when next spring rolls around. For it's an early spring show — a time of year when these big, deep-dwelling lake trout are available to anglers right up on top of the water.

And this spring surface angling for mackinaw is beginning to catch on especially at Crescent lake, where the normal deep troll method used during the summer season has been relatively unproductive. The big lakers are there, but it is only on rare occasions that anglers using the deep troll method report in with good catches. Because of his reluctance on the part of lake trout at Crescent to hit, anglers have stuck pretty close to fishing for rainbow trout or kokanee.

But now a new kind of lake trout fishing is catching on — that of casting from the shore line during the early spring period. Boat anglers are also taking the big mackinaw on shallow troll. And it's proving to be a real fishing experience for those anglers giving it a try.

We recommended this early spring method of taking mackinaw trout several years ago, but don't know if someone took our word to heart or just accidentally stumbled onto it on his own. Perhaps the angler who gave it a first-time try at Crescent was an "old namyush" fisherman from northern Minnesota or one of the Canadian provinces. Nevertheless a few anglers caught on and more anglers are giving it a try as they too, learn more about the habits of lake trout.

We can only recommend this type of mackinaw angling in early spring. At other times it will be about as unproductive as plunking for sturgeon in a goldfish pool. The best fishing will be from the time the ice breaks until the upper surface water begins to warm. The nearer you can fish to the ice breakup, the better your chances of success.

At this time, a period which may last two to three weeks, the big trout will appear near the surface and can be readily taken on a variety of flashing lures and wobblers. When the surface water begins to warm, these fish head for the cold water depths and there they remain until the winter months when water near

the surface again reaches a desirable temperature.

During the summer months, then, the only way to take mackinaw trout is with the use of weighted lines and heavy lead in order to reach down 100 feet or more into the mackinaw's cold water home. Although many lake trout are taken in this fashion, we have never relished horsing a pound or more of lead up from the bottom, plus a fish that loses fight quickly against the unyielding drag of the weight.

However, it is during his spring sojourn near the surface that this big trout really shows his worth. He is vibrant with energy and will fight to the last breath of exhaustion. He's hungry, too, and woe to any minnow or to anything else that looks like food that gets in his way. His strike is savage, an arm-jarring experience to the angler that continues to the end. He is not spectacular, such as the rainbow, but for sheer tenacity, bulldog in fighting, and rollicking, spirited runs, "old namyush" is a front runner in the trout family.

At Crescent lake this spring, casting from the shore with wobbling and flashing lures produced excellent catches of lake trout. Of the many mackinaw taken, one weighed in at 24 pounds. Most of the fish landed ranged in the 5 to 8-pound class. According to our information, the best time to fish for mackinaw is when a strong west wind is blowing causing the lake to be quite rough at the northeast end.

Many years ago in northern Minnesota, we also found windy days producing the best lake trout angling. In addition, top angling was had immediately as the ice broke. Many times enterprising anglers would use outboard motor boats to break up honeycomb ice if there was no open water in which to cast. In that country "ice out" meant mackinaw fishing, and an open shore line was all that was needed to send anglers hurrying to favorite lakes.

We haven't heard of anglers trying their luck surface casting for mackinaw at Odell or Big Cultus lakes, but we are sure this great sport fishery is available here as well as other lakes where mackinaw are present. The early spring surfacing of "namyush" is a characteristic wherever he may be.

We certainly suggest a try by some enterprising angler who likes to experiment a bit.
