Al Ullman Reports...

Wheat Referendum

A quick look at the results in the Oregon referendum will show that the commercial wheat areas voted strongly for the wheat program, but that it was defeated in areas where wheat is a secondary crop. Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Sherman counties voted 77 percent for the program. One county, Morrow, voted 90 percent in favor. The result, however, will treat everyone alike. The referendum automatically puts into effect the stand-by support program of 50 percent of parity for those who comply with acreage allotments and gives a free choice of planting fence to fence to those who do not elect to come under the support program. No one knows yet what the full impact will be on the wheat economy of Eastern Oregon. As of now, there is little hope for further legislation. I personally am seriously concerned about the future of the smaller wheat ranchers under the rules put into effect by the defeat of the wheat referendum.

Tax Bill

My report on Ways and Means Committee progress is optimistic; long hours of work each day are moving major decisions behind us. Items that particularly affect the 2nd District economy — livestock and timber capital gains — were left intact with present favorable treatment being continued. In the case of individual non-corporate timber sales, when sold in block or with land, they will get the additional advantages of the availability of 30 percent base treatment for capital gains after a three year holding period.

Debt Ceiling

Those who say the way to stop government spending is to clamp an unrealistic lid on the debt ceiling are not only attacking the problem from the wrong end, but are dangerously jeopardizing America's economic position in the world. We need to cut spending where it is excessive, but in the proper manner — in authorization and appropriation bills. To tie the hands of the Treasury

in such a way that they cannot meet outstanding obligations is to court economic disaster. What would world reaction be if the U. S. Government could not pay its bills. The outflow of gold might well throw the whole financial world into a panic. There is no responsible alternative other than granting the Treasury the borrowing authority it must have to meet its legitimate obligations.
