## Sun Eclipse Over Oregon Saturday, July 20

There will be a partial eclipse of the sun over Oregon on Saturday, July 20.

But don't look at it if you value your eyesight.

The time - worn schoolchild's pastime of viewing eclipses with the naked eye cost 170 Australian youngsters partial loss of their central vision and permanent damage in 1950.

There is no "best" way to look at an eclipse, says Dr. William E. Shackelford of Albany.

If you must indulge your curiosity, the safest way is to turn your back to the sun, hold a piece of pinhole - punched cardboard over one shoulder, then let the sun's rays come through the hole onto another piece of white cardboard held in front of your eyes. The sun's image will be reflected but its dangerous infra - red rays will be avoided.

Sun glasses or smoked glass are not completely safe. A piece of photo film, over - exposed and developed over its entire surface, is adequate protection, but the pinhole device—especially in a darkened room — yields a well-defined solar image without danger.

Looking directly at the sun anytime is dangerous. Further, the use of binoculars or telescopes during an eclipse heightens the chance of incurring complete blindness — which happened to 20 Utah viewers in 1960. Magnified sunlight can damage the eye permanently in the fraction of a second.

"We suggest that Oregonians stay indoors between 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on July 20. We will experience a 60 percent eclipse here. The best bet is to read about it the day after it happens."

## Seven Infested Trees Found In Moth Check

European pine shoot moth infestations were found in seven trees in southeast Portland in the recent survey made jointly by employees of the State Forestry Department and the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

The survey covered a total of 98,447 trees in the Portland and Salem areas.

Six of the infested trees were located on residential properties and the seventh tree was in a nearby nursery. Only one insect specimen was found on the nursery tree.

All of the infested trees were destroyed by burning. Also destroyed by burning were all of the pine trees that had been in the nursery longer than eight months.

After the finding of the infested trees the general area was surveyed with negative results. However, the area is being re-surveyed weekly for eight weeks to ascertain no infestations have been missed.

The Oregon Department of Agriculture nursery inspectors have checked and re - checked nurseries handling pine stock and the department has also placed some of its blacklight traps, used for rapping night flying insects, in the area.

## Winn Tuttle Now Resides In Washington

Western Wheat Associates announced this week that Winn Tuttle, recently appointed as the Washington, D.C. representative for the growers organization has taken up his new duties in the nation's capital.

Tuttle, until last month administrator of the Oregon Wheat Commission, succeeds Clancy Jean, who resigned from the wheat association to serve in the Department of Agriculture. Jean will remain in Washington as a feed and grain specialist with the government agency.

A graduate of Pamhandle A & M College in Oklahoma, Tuttle received a master's degree in agriculture from Oregon State College before associating himself with the Wallowa County Grain Growers in Enterprise. He served the farm cooperative for 12 years, ten of them as manager, until he was appointed to the Wheat Commission in 1961.

Prior to accepting his new position, Tuttle resided in Pendleton with his wife and three children. He was associate member of the Oregon Wheat Growers League and was active in the Future Farmers of America, American Legion and Elks Lodge.

Ralph McEwen of Athena has been named to succeed Tuttle as state wheat administrator. He will take over his new duties on July 1.

## Oregon Revises Pesticide Listings

Oregon's list of pesticides highly toxic to man and restricted to use for commercial purposes was revised by an order issued Monday by the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

The revised list becomes effective July 11. Pesticides on this list are not registered for sale or

distribution for home or garden use.

The order has removed Dime-thoate from the restricted list and placed Zinophos on the restricted list.

Those pesticides now on the restricted list are: TEPP, Parathion, Methyl Parathion, EPN, OMPA (Schraaan), Systox (Demeton), Phosdrin, Thimet (Phorate), DiSyston, Endrin of 2.5 per cent and above, Zinophos (O, O-diethyl O-2 pyrazinyl phosphorothioate), Ethion, Phosphamidon, Metyl Demeton (Meta Systox), Delnav, DiNitro-O-Cresol (DNOC), DiNitro-O-Sec Butyl Phenol (DNOSB-P), and Endothal of 20 per cent and above.
