Third Annual Petticoat Derby sponsored by the Oregon chapter of the Ninety-Nines was cancelled Saturday morning just before take-off time when during the weather briefing schedule the Race Committee and the Officers of the Oregon Chapter arrived at the unanimous decision of cancelling the race because of the weather conditions and the designated route which had been known to the participants of the Derby the night before at a briefing in the Hospitality Room at the Flamingo Motel, Portland.

Mr. Joe Harrell gave the pilot briefing, answering questions on the course and flight plans. Saturday morning at 6:00 a.m. the racers and some of the Forty-Niners and a Half, who are the husbands of the Ninety-Nines, had breakfast at Tad's Restaurant, Troutdale with each one present given a pad and pen with the inscription of the Ninety-Nines on the pads and the pens were supplied by Kampus Market, Lebanon. Following the breakfast the group motored to the Skyway Airport to receive final instruction when it was announced the race had been cancelled. However, since the committee had stated dur-

ing the preparation of the program, win, lose, draw or cancellation with cancellation never entering their thinking they continued on with a Hospitality hour at the Elks club in Gresham followed with a steak dinner.

One of the Ninety-Nines and her husband of Lebanon who are Flying Farmets of the Oregon Chapter and whose business is growing roses and flying them to market presented each one present at the banquet with a beautiful rose from their rose gardens. They furnished the center pieces for each table with rose arrangements of every size and color to such a display they were as statues of perfection on parade.

The banquet program with Mr. Bob Dunn, director of the Oregon State Board of Aeronautics, being the emcee introduced a number of the members as well as Carolle Phillips who had flown her Cessna 150 from Victoria, B.C. accompanied by her mother. Carolle is a commercial pilot, a very attractive young lady in her early twenties who entered for her first-time last year to be disqualified for some regulations of rules to be disappointed this year due to weather conditions but anyone who visited with Carolle realized even this will not discourage her from entering next year.

The speakers at the banquet were two men who definitely are aircraft enthusiasts, Col. Charles Yeager, first man to exceed the speed of sound, now commandant of the Air Force Aerospace Research Pilot School at Edwards Air Force Base. The X15 has reached the limits of altitude 61 miles and speed of 3400 mph for which it was developed. Capt. William (Pete) Knight, one of the five pilots chosen to fly the Air Force manned space craft X20 Dyna-Soar will orbit the earth at nearly 15,000 mph. The pilot will be able to control the Dyna-Soar and the booster himself.

There were twenty pilots entered in the race this year with all of them arriving with their official proof, which was a miniature petticoat to be left at each landing, had the race not been called off. At the close of the banquet program they were thinking and planning in advance for the race next year.

The American Legion's Beaver Boys State at OSU in Corvallis started Sunday, according to William Stevens of Portland, chairman and director. Approximately 500 high school juniors from all sections of the state attended. Session will end Saturday, June 29.

The boys, who will be seniors next fall, organized city, county and state government during the week of the citizenship training session. Assisting in this were city and county officials from Portland.

Highlight of the program, to which the public is invited will be a parade and inauguration ceremonies today (Friday) 7 p.m. Chief Justice William M. McAllister of the Oregon Supreme Court will administer the oath for the new Boys State governor. Dr. R. E. Lieualien, Oregon chancellor of education, will be the inauguration speaker. Also on the program, which will be held in Gill coliseum, will be Brig. Gen. Gordon Doolittle of the Oregon Air National Guard. Retiring Boys State governor is Tom Jernstedt of Carlton.

Monday night, Leroy Skousen, Portland attorney and formerly of the FBI, was the assembly speaker.

Cadet Ralph H. Graham of the U.S. Air Force Academy was the Tuesday speaker. Graham, whose home is in Grand Junction Colo., is one of the outstanding cadets at the academy.

On Wednesday, Judge Alfred T. Sulmonetti, Multnomah county circuit court, assisted by two prominent attorneys, presented a practice trial for the boys.

The Boys State talent show was the Thursday feature. OSU Athletic Director Spec Keene spoke.

A memorial service Friday in connection with the inauguration will complete the week long Boys State session.

Mrs. Harland McDonald was hostess serving strawberry shortcake with whipped cream.

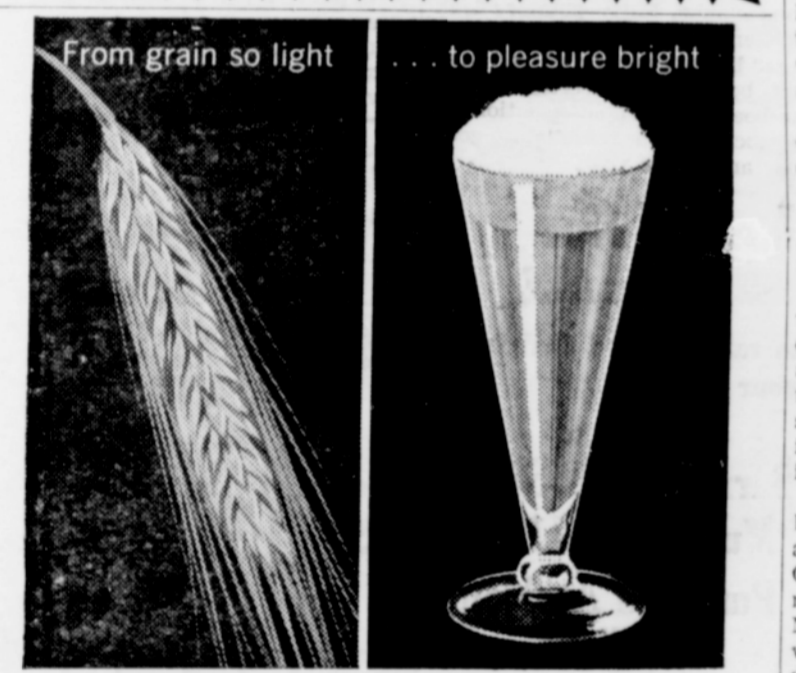
