### Bronchitis Vaccine Restrictions Lifted

Oregon poultrymen using infectious bronchitis vaccines will henceforth need to purchase them from the open market suppliers. The State Department of Agriculture, which has been supplying these vaccines at cost for some years, has discontinued the practice. During most of that period, the department required a permit to use bronchitis vaccine; that is no longer necessary. The department will continue to fill orders from poultrymen for Newcastle vaccine, or they may obtain a department permit to buy this vaccine at other sources, according to Dr. J. I. Denton, assistant state veterinarian.

### Last Call For Antelope Tags

The deadline for antelope hunt applications is 5 p.m. on July 22. To be considered in the drawings applications must be in the Portland office of the game commission by the above date and time. Application is made on a controlled season (IBM) form available at license agencies. Each application must be accompanied by a check for \$5. Persons may apply as a party of not more than two by placing the name and address of both parties on one application and enclosing a check for \$10. A public drawing to determine successful applicants will be held at 10 a.m. on July 30 at the commission office located at 1634 S. W. Alder in Portland.

### Oregon State Game Commission—

#### Game Director Warns of Fire Danger Siuslaw Face Lifting Airplane Fish Drops

P. W. Schneider, state game director, today, issued a warning on fire danger to all fishermen and hunters. Schneider said, "I have been told by fire protection officials that as a result of the Columbus Day blowdown, the worst potential fire hazard in recent memory exists throughout much of the state. I urge every sportsman to use extreme caution in the woods now and when the hunting seasons start later this summer." Schneider continued, "The potential damage that could occur to not only the timber resource, but to fish and wildlife is inestimable. Repetition of anything approaching the great Tillamook fire would be a staggering blow to fish and game protection." Schneider pledged that the full resources of the commission will be used to avoid what potentially could be Oregon's worst fire season in many years. Siuslaw Tributaries Face Lifting Largely because of last year's Columbus Day blowdown the game commission is back on the Siuslaw river tributaries removing log jams. Work is now under way on clearance operations that may continue for three months at a cost of approximately \$17,000. Tributary streams from the headwaters near Loraine to tide-water and up the north fork will be cleaned out. Contractor on the job is the Fitzgerald Logging Co.

of Roseburg. Working with the contractor is Woody Holderman, commission stream clearance foreman. The commission removed jams from a number of upper Siuslaw tributaries last winter and the present work is a continuation of that program.

According to Ted Howell, contraction superintendent for the commission, final clean-up work was completed recently on the Trask river and tributaries in Tillamook and Yamhill counties. Crews continue to operate on streams in Clatsop county according to Howell.

#### Airplane Fish Drops Start

For the next couple of weeks fish will be raining down on lakes throughout the high Cascades. Scheduled for airplane release are approximately 800,000 two to three-inch eastern brook and rainbow trout from game commission hatcheries. In addition a few lakes will get some golden trout.

Operations have already started from the Klamath hatchery. Some fifty lakes in the south Cascades and a few in the Siskiyou will be bombed with fish from this source. The plane will move to Hood River for two days of planting in the Mt. Hood area and then on to the Fall River air strip out of Lapine from which the bulk of the air drops will originate.

Reino Koski, in charge of fish planting for the commission, said that about 300 lakes will be air

### Players Asked To Come Prepared For Intensive Drill Session

Players in the 16th annual Shriners' hospital all-star football game, scheduled for Multnomah stadium the night of Aug. 17, have been warned by their respective coaches to "report ready for action."

The rival 27-man State and Metro squads are due to check in here Aug. 4 for two weeks of intensive drills.

State coach Fred Spiegelberg of Medford, a veteran of the all-star coaching ranks, has warned his charges that "those who report ready to play will have a big edge over those who are not in top physical condition."

Spiegelberg, who hopes to make State a winner for the first time since 1956, pointed out that "we just don't have time to wait for those who have to work themselves into shape. We're going to start immediately with all-out practice sessions."

The Metro boss man, Bob Hull of Portland's Jefferson high echoed Spiegelberg's sentiments.

The game pits outstanding senior high school players of last winter against each other on a State versus Metropolitan basis. The series currently stands at 7 wins for the Metro, 6 for the Staters and 2 ties.

The Staters last win was a 7 to 6 thriller in 1956, but they did gain a 19 to 19 tie in 1961.

The game, often called "football's finest hour," has netted more than \$300,000 for the Shriners' hospital here since its inception in 1948. It has starred such gridiron greats as Sam Baker, Bob Schroed, Terry Baker, George Shaw and Mel Renfro.

Headquarters for the game were opened last week at 1119 S. W. Park ave., with Mrs. Jo Ryan again in charge. Mail orders for reserved seats at \$3 and \$2 are being accepted now, Mrs. Ryan reported.
