SHERMAN COUNTY CREAMERY.

How the new Enterprise Operates in Ashland, Oregon.

As a pretty lively interest is awakening in Sherman county looking toward the establishing of a creamery here, the following from the Tidings may be considered valuable information on that topic.

The company propose to run the creamery as an experiment for a month and all patrons will be paid for their milk in proportion to the amount of butter fat the milk contains and the expenses of the plant will not be figured in. This is an inducement by the company to interest as many people as possible to give the creamery a trial.

The Tidings says: The first morning's milk received at the creamery amounted to about 10000 lbs. the second morning there was an increase and yesterday morning the amount reached 15000 lbs. If this increase can be kept up until it shall bring the amount of milk received at the creamery daily to exceed 20000 lbs. the company will see its way clear to keep the machinery going steadily all through the winter months. During the summer season it is expected that the capacity of the plant will be tested to its utmost.

The process of handling milk in a modern creamery is familiar in the older dairy sections, but in this part of Oregon it is something novel and interesting to many of our people whose knowledge in this line has heretofore been confined to the descriptions they have seen in print. The milk is brought by the various patrons in ten gallon cans and delivered at the door of the creamery where it is poured into tank scales and weighed and the patron given credit for a certain number of pounds of milk which is supposed to be tested daily and averaged up at the end of the week and the patron given credit for the per cent of butter fat contained in the milk he has delivered. From the scales tank the milk is strained into the common receiving tank with possibly hundreds of gallons of other milk. From this tank it is pumped into the tempering vat where it is brought to the proper temperature for extracting the cream, about 80 degrees.

From the tempering vat it is run to the Babcock separator, a magical little machine that runs at a high rate of speed. The milk is fed into it at the rate of 15000 lbs. an hour and at a spot on one side of the machine comes out the skim milk which empties into a vat from which it is pumped through a pipe to another vat outside the main building where the patrons at once receive it in their cans and dispose of it as they see fit. From the other side of the Babcock separator pours out the cream which empties into one of two huge cream vats. The separating is the most interesting process of the creamery, but with the separating the butter making has only begun. Two cream vats are used. Cream that is separated one morning is held until the next morning, when it is in the proper condition to be churned. The churn is a capacious one and beside it is located the butter-maker, a circular machine that attends to its part of the business perfectly. From here the butter is taken to the packing room adjoining where it is cut into proper sized packages to go to market. The power to run the machinery is furnished by steam, steam being also required in the separating process.

The building is a solid and substantial one. It is 32x42 in size, with office room, engine room, main factory room, packing room and storage room. It is well finished throughout. The water used is from a spring located on the property and is pumped to a reservoir from where it is supplied to all parts of the building. The spring has been walled up with brick and will later on be covered. Cleanliness is one of the requisites and ample facilities are furnished for practicing it from the time the milk is weighed until the butter is ready for market. The plant as it now stands has a capacity of 60000 lbs. of milk per day though it could be increased to 8000 at small expense, although it is not expected that the present capacity will be taxed for some time.

Hon. J. M. Jones of Arlington, will address the people of Sherman county in Moro, Tuesday evening next, Oct. 6, at School hall. "The Scarcity of Money, the cause and the remedy," will be his topic. A personal acquaintance of many years standing with Mr. Jones enables us to say that his address will be interesting and instructive. The farmer is especially requested to attend. Ladies are invited.

A disaster at the reservoir of the Moro water works on the 25th, caused by seepage through a crack in the cement wall has reduced the storage supply to about 20 inches depth, whereas it should be 8 feet. This is a serious matter and it concerns the people of Moro collectively and individually. Something must be done about it, but the question arises—What? Heretofore the water supply of Moro has depended upon the liberality of Messrs. R. J. Ginn, J. B. Hestor, S. S. Hayes and Moore Bros., citizens who are no more deeply interested than any other citizen with property rights. The reservoir must be repaired and speedily repaired at that. Now what is to be done about it? At a meeting of citizens, since writing the above, at which W. H. Moore presided, and J. C. Burkes acted as secretary, J. B. Hestor, Wm. Holder, G. N. Bolton, T. Kaseberg, R. J. Ginn, J. M. Parry and R. C. Craven were appointed a committee to devise a practical method of proceeding and report at an early date.
