HARI KARI IN OREGON.

Two years ago and for several years preceding, Oregon was represented in the United States senate by two of the ablest, most experienced and most efficient members of that body. Both were republicans and both accomplished more for their state, for the northwest coast, and for their party than any new men could possibly accomplish. Both have now been retired, and the state is represented by only one senator, and he a new man of no special ability, and the dispatches from Washington indicate very clearly that the other seat must remain vacant, in all probability, for two years at least.

This loss to Oregon and the Pacific northwest, a most serious one in every way, has been caused by the worst kind of political mismanagement, and by reckless disregard of all the people's rights and interests. Senator Dolph was defeated by a factor of the republican party, which was a very small one, because he had taken strong ground in favor of the gold standard. Senator Mitchell was defeated by an equally small faction of his party, and by the most desperate and disreputable tactics, because he had taken strong ground in favor of silver, although he had subsequently put himself thoroughly in harmony with his party on this important question.

In order to accomplish his defeat an entire session of the legislature was prevented, a republican administration left without appropriations sufficient to carry on the state government, and the interests of the people and the state ignored, insulted and trampled upon. All this at a time when republicans everywhere realize that it is a matter of the utmost importance that the party shall have every vote it can possibly command in the senate, and when even the opponents of their party are ready to admit that it is desirable that one party should have a good working majority in all departments of the government.

Business interests everywhere are suffering as they have never before suffered, and they have suffered for so long a time that they are now exhausted and paralyzed. No recovery is possible until affirmative legislation can be had, and such legislation can be had only by a majority of the party which succeeded in the late election. Oregon has ignored all this; ignored its own interests, sacrificed its own welfare, and jeopardized the welfare of the whole country, merely in the interest of a faction, and a faction so small as to be really insignificant.

It is argued in defense of this faction that it was not alone to blame; both the republican majority and the populist opposition might have permitted an election and so procured it by giving up the fight. This defense is purely. The Mitchell party represented a majority of the people of the state. It certainly represented a majority of the republican voters. The populists and democrats represented a minority. The factionists represented few but themselves. Because the overwhelming majority on both sides would not yield to an inconsequential faction everything was risked and much lost. The republicans of Oregon will do well to keep these reckless factionists in mind until the next opportunity comes to retire them to permanent oblivion.—Tacoma Ledger.

THE OBSERVER is pleased to know that Speaker Reed is growing hourly more unpopular with decaying politicians of the Oregonian dye. Mr. Reed's determination to prevent the passage of needless appropriations by congress is praiseworthy. He has taken no interest in any pet schemes to further personal ambitions nor feather the nests of financial jobbers.

The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad company has gone into agriculture on an experimental plan. It proposes to induce farmers to raise something else besides corn, which has been such a drug on the market that it has not paid to move it. To that end the company has selected five stations in Illinois, Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska, at each of which it will have a forty acre field. Soil culture is the prime object in view, and men who are supposed to be thoroughly informed on the subject will be engaged to take charge of the fields and cultivate them to their capacity for any particular production. The company expects, with an intelligent preparation of the soil, to produce crops of different products from which a paying revenue may be realized.

Senator John H. Mitchell's friends are too many and too true to be estranged by blackguardism. THE OBSERVER commends to the Oregonian a handsome little book just published: "Kind Expressions of Senators," in which Mr. Mitchell's associates in the United States senate express their admiration of him in clean language, something which the Oregonian has evaded upon nearly every occasion in referring to Mr. Mitchell since Gen. Grant, about 1875, removed a customs collector in Portland.

President McKinley's message to congress this week is short, sharp and decisive. It deals with one subject only, the question of currency. There is no reference to the currency to Cuba. He takes the ground that the financial depression in the United States is due to the lack of revenue and that prosperity cannot be expected until the government is on a paying basis. Therefore it is the duty of congress to see that its income is equal to its expenditures before it transacts any other business.

Senator Dolph was always a kind, conscientious man. People who considered him cold made the fatal error in judgment which death confirms in his case. But few men, afflicted as Mr. Dolph has been, could always carry a cheerful disposition. His last act was a deed of kindness to clear the title to valuable property to a Mrs. Abraham who had been unwisely influenced to part with it by selfish zealots for "Christianity" leaving her almost absolutely penniless.

The facts developed by the investigation of the civil service commission ought to be and doubtless are sufficient to convince every fair minded man that it was simply a political machine, under a reform name, doing all that other political machines do, and worse if possible. Its members were but human, and being human they helped their followers, but did it in the name of political honesty in a most awkward, clumsy and dishonest way.

Notwithstanding the confusion of parties that prevails in the senate, republican leaders predict that the tariff bill, for which they count a majority in that body, will be passed and in operation by the first of June.

The Lexow committee which has been investigating the trusts with such a flourish of trumpets, has just made a report recommending, in effect, that somebody else be instructed to do what it has failed to do, or to discover any reason for doing.

The object of the populist legislators in Olympia seems to have been to make the borrowing of money and the transaction of business unlawful.

SHERMAN COUNTY HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.

ORGANIZED A. D. 1897

Constitution and By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Sherman County, Oregon, Horticultural Society.

Article 2. The object of this Society shall be the dissemination of knowledge of the science and art of Horticulture among its members and the development and advancement of all interests pertaining thereto.

Article 3. The membership of this Society shall consist of annual members, and any person may become a member by payment of the entrance fee.

Article 4. The fee for annual membership shall be 50 cents for men and 25 cents for women, payable at the annual meeting.

Article 5. The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, whom shall hold their offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. Such election shall be held on the second Saturday in June of each year.

Article 6. The officers of this Society shall perform the duties usually devolving upon such officers in similar organizations. Provided the financial committee shall audit all bills and accounts of the Society and make an annual statement of the Society's finances.

Article 7. This Society shall hold its regular meetings each year, on the 2d Saturday of each month. The annual meeting on the 2d Saturday in June.

Article 8. The By-Laws shall be equally binding with the Constitution and alterations or amendments to either may be made at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present. Provided that notice has been given at the previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1. The President shall be the executive officer of the Society. It shall be his duty to see that all general rules and regulations of the Society are enforced. To preside at all meetings. To appoint all standing and other committees not otherwise provided for. To prepare and deliver an annual address, and from time to time present and outline the work and new issues before the Society.

Article 2. The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside by seniority, and perform all the duties appertaining to that office. He, they, shall also

act in conjunction with a third member as the finance committee, whose duties are defined in the Constitution.

Article 3. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be the recording, corresponding and reporting officer of the Society. He shall, with the advice of the President, arrange all programmes for meeting, edit all reports, unless otherwise provided, give all notices for publication, issue all calls for meetings, collect and record all membership fees, and other dues, pay all bills of the Society; Provided, no bill is paid until approved by the finance committee and so ordered by the Society. Have the custody of all books, papers, monies, and seals belonging to the society. He shall keep his accounts in such a manner that the funds of the society may be ascertained at any time; and at the regular meetings in January and July of each year shall present to the Society an accurate statement of all monies received and disbursed by him.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Article 4. Sec. 1. The following standing committees, to consist of three members each, shall be appointed soon after each annual meeting by the President.

On Orchard and small fruits. Vegetables. Flowers. Legislation and Exhibits. Finance.

Section 2. Each committee shall present a full written report of its proceedings with recommendations to the Society.

Section 3. The regular place of meeting shall be Moro, unless otherwise ordered by the Society.

QUORUM.

Article 5. Sec. 1. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Section 2. First, Call to order and reading minutes of previous meeting.

2. Reports of 0. cers.

3. Reports of Standing committees.

4. Reports of Special committees.

5. Papers, addresses, etc.

6. Election of officers.

7. New Business, etc.

Section 3. The rules of parliamentary practice as laid down in Cushing's Manual shall be adopted as the rules governing this Society.

Section 4. All acts, rules, etc., in conflict with the foregoing are hereby repealed.
