For the Housewife.

THE OBSERVER house-keeper has tested each recipe or suggestion offered in this department:

The smell of onions seems to cling to knives in spite of all efforts. The best way to avoid this is to rub the blade well with a flannel dipped in coarse salt.

Whiting, dissolved in the boiling water in which silver is to be cleaned, will remove dullness. Dried afterward the task of cleaning with powder, etc., may be avoided.

Here is a good polish for bright steel: Tablespoonful turpentine, tablespoonful sweet oil, sufficient emery powder to make a creamy mixture. Apply with dry flannel.

Delicious potato cakes may be made from remains of cold mashed potatoes by rubbing them with an equal quantity of flour, a quarter as much butter, a good pinch of salt, a teaspoonful baking powder. Mix to a stiff paste with one or two beaten eggs, roll out to an inch thick, cut in rounds, brush over with milk and egg mixed and bake in a brisk but not too hot oven.
