FOSSIL EXCITED OVER GOLD

The town of Fossil is considerably excited over the discovery of gold about one mile from town, on top of the hill above Squire Donaldson's ranch. Years ago pieces of quartz that looked as if they might contain gold were picked up on the mountain and a short time ago, the Journal says, Napoleon Hastian discovered what appeared to be a promising quartz ledge, a portion of which he sent to Colorado to be assayed. The assay has come to hand, showing the ore to contain \$14 in gold to the ton.

On receipt of the assay Mr. Hastian took Lyman Brown, an old California miner, out to his ledge to see if he could tell him whether it was a spur or permanent ledge. Lyman put in a blast that blew the whole mine into the air. It was simply a boulder weighing four or five hundred pounds. The boulder was on top of the mountain and the question is, how did it get there and where did it come from?

Croppings of the same kind of quartz are being picked up all over the hill, and from sunrise to sunset some one is busy pounding the ore into dust. Merchants and laborers, farmers and stockmen, the preacher and the printer, are all excited alike and jostle each other for a look over the shoulder of some old miner as he washes the pulverized rock in his pan. With glittering eyes the old timers tell of rich strikes they made in '49, when men became millionaires from poorer prospects than showed in Uncle Tom Watson's plan.

Options and assessments, hydraulics and stamp mills fill the air and all that is needed to make us all rich is to find the ledge whence came the croppings. The present excitement gives those who came into the world a generation afterwards, a fleeting glimpse of the spirit that animated men in the craze of '49. The faith of a miner, the oft-times founded on sand, is sublime and is stronger far than that of the average Christian.

Gov. Lord's message which was not delivered to the 40-days disgrace was published in the Oregonian March 31st. It was looked upon as a sort of April fool document, but a hasty perusal of it reveals many suggestions of remedy for the glaring faults observed in the conduct of various branches of administration of state affairs.

Ex-President Harrison, in a lecture at Ann Arbor, Mich., a week ago, said: "Five-sixths of the voters of the country favor a revision of corporation laws limiting the purposes for which corporations may be organized, supervising the issues of stocks and bonds, and putting other restraints upon them." This is very true and just right.

Some malicious persons destroyed 1,500,000 salmon fry at the Clackamas station last fall by putting lime into the stream which feeds the troughs. The loss which the salmon industry has sustained by such wholesale destruction can be better appreciated when it is understood that a year's entire catch of salmon does not amount to 1,500,000 fish.

The question that puzzles not a few people is this, says the Oregonian: How is prosperity to be restored and how is the country to be enriched, by a policy that is intended to take \$100,000,000 more each year from the people, and thus give the treasury what is called "simple revenue" to be paid out to office-holders, pop-suckers and crib-feeders at the treasury?

The Mountaineer says half the stores in The Dalles today are supplied with butter imported from Portland or San Francisco. This does not speak well for a section of country that boasts of being self-sustaining. Wasco county certainly needs a creamery to supply the home market. Don't worry yourself, Brother Doughty; people are too busy producing 25-cent wheat to bother about creameries, beet sugar, etc.

"Murder will out." At a populist meeting in Clackamas county last week U'Ren admitted receiving money from the hold-up leaders, Bourne, Simon and Corbett, which should be sufficient evidence to the most exacting as to the real cause of the devilment done by the recent 40 days disgrace in Salem. The charges that U'Ren had been bought with gold; that Krause had been influenced with women, and that Ogle had been held by the present of a gold watch and chain; all by the gang led by Jo and Jonathan were reiterated at the meeting.
