The ORN is one of the few transportation systems of the United States to emerge from a recent receivership more prosperous than ever before. Its prosperity shows the remarkable recuperative powers of Oregon, Idaho and Washington, the three Pacific Northwestern states covered by the G. N. railway system.

The powers of Europe are teaching no moral principles in the Turkish-Grecian muddle. Each day proclaims afresh the fact that greed for gain and not love for humanity, rules the world.

A series of magazine articles recently appearing on How to Manage a Husband, it turns out after inquiry were written by a woman who never had a husband to manage. However she is a good domestic and a splendid judge of human nature.

"Sheep and wool" articles will be a thing of the past in newspapers of the "Waiting Empire" soon. The persistence of forestry cranks and the foolishness of Grover Cleveland have essentially swiped one of the chief industries of the great states of Oregon and Washington.

Denny pheasants are in great demand. Several states have been supplied from Oregon recently and if they increase in other localities as they have in this state it will not be long until the entire United States will be stocked with the most useful and finest game bird in the world.

If the Roentgen rays discovery sets women's waists free it will have accomplished a great mission. And things begin to point that way. The Queen of Portugal has set the ball in motion. At her suggestion the ladies of her court submitted themselves to the searching action of the rays and were so startled at the sight that they immediately declared "the corset must go." They will be free women henceforth.

Oregonians prefer eastern sweat-and-blood made clothing to the home woven and home made garment from Oregon woolen mills—so what matter if our flock men are financially ruined and their sheep sent to the slaughter? The forests are preserved until such time as fires running in the mountain grasses may light heaven with another blaze such as Western Oregon experienced 50 years ago. The present generation of fools learn nothing from experience.

New York, Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Baltimore, Cincinnati, St. Paul, St. Louis, Buffalo and San Francisco the leading cities, paid \$3,470,000 for electric lights last year, saving nearly \$5,000,000 on the account against the old systems of lighting. Moro will make a larger saving proportionately of the higher prices paid here for lighting materials and very much more in the matter of heating, as it is expected the Moro plant will substitute electricity for wood and coal.

Four weeks ago THE OBSERVER cautioned owners of cattle not to let the cows and calves go. The selling movement is not checked. Cheap corn in the Missouri valley is draining the inland Empire and it will be but a short time until the supply of beef cattle in Oregon will fall below the home demand and all the money received from the present movement and a great deal more, will have to be sent away for future supplies. The conditions are similar in counties east of this and The East Oregonian says the small herd that can be made to lift many a mortgage and provide the owner with a constant source of ready money is rapidly disappearing.

Great Britain wishes an American alliance. There is only one way to secure it, suggests The Oregonian. Let her bundle out of the western hemisphere bag and baggage. Evacuate the American continents and islands—horse, foot and dragons. Take away her flag, her warships, her royal governors, her monarchical insignia and her imperial policy. Then America may stand at her back while she conquers the rest of the world. The way to make the plea of blood brotherhood effective is to let go of the brother's inheritance before preaching to him the fraternal duty of help in need. The way to unite those of one race against the alien is to rest content with looting the alien and respect family possessions. Three continents ought to content the British land hunger.

The Condon Globe pertinently suggests that if the Gilliam county court were as particular and grannish in dealing with big city firms for stationery, supplies, etc., as it is with our little home newspapers in the matter of printing, hundreds of dollars might be saved to the county each year. The couple of dollars a year that the county printing amount to appears to be quite a lugeboon to the county court and it would not surprise the Globe if the court would next be soliciting bids from the news papers to see which one would be willing to pay the biggest bonus for the privilege of doing the county printing. The court says the reason the big city firms are not asked to bid on contracts for furnishing supplies for the county is that the firms don't want the work unless there is a big profit in it for them. But, of course, for the home papers it does not make any difference—they can live on wind and scenery.

Sherman Co. Horticultural Society.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Sherman County, Oregon, Horticultural Society.

Article 2. The object of this Society shall be the dissemination of knowledge of the science and art of Horticulture among its members and the development and advancement of all interests pertaining thereto.

Article 3. The membership of this Society shall consist of annual members, and any person may become a member by payment of the entrance fee.

Article 4. The fee for annual membership shall be 50 cents for men and 25 cents for women, payable at the annual meeting.

Article 5. The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, whom shall hold their offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. Such officers shall be elected on the second Saturday in June of each year.

Article 6. The officers of this Society shall perform the duties usually devolving upon such officers in similar organizations. Provided the financial committee shall make and make an annual statement of the Society's finances.

Article 7. This Society shall hold 12 regular meetings each year, on the 2d Saturday of each month. The annual meeting shall be held on the 2d Saturday in June.

Article 8. The By-Laws shall be equally binding with the Constitution and alterations or amendments to either may be made at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present. Provided, that notice has been given at the previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1. The President shall be the executive officer of the Society. It shall be his duty to see that the general rules and regulations of the Society are enforced. To preside at all meetings. To appoint all standing and other committees not otherwise provided for. To prepare and deliver an annual address, and from time to time present and outline the work and new lines before the Society.

Article 2. The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside by him, and perform all the duties pertaining to that office. He, they, shall also in conjunction with a third member as the finance committee and have duties as defined in the Constitution.

Article 3. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be the recording, corresponding and reporting officer of the Society. He shall, with the advice of the President, arrange all programs for meetings, give all official notices for publication, issue all calls for meetings, collect and record all membership fees, and other dues, pay all bills of the Society. Provided, no bill is paid until approved by the finance committee and so ordered by the Society. Have the custody of all books, papers, monies, and seals belonging to the Society. He shall keep his accounts in such a manner that the funds of the Society may be ascertained at any time; and at the regular meetings in January and July of each year shall present to the members an accurate statement of all monies received and disbursed by him.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Article 4. Sec. 1. The following standing committees, to consist of three members each, shall be appointed once after each annual meeting by the President.

On Orchard and small fruits. Vegetables. Flowers. Legislation and Exhibits. Finance.

Section 2. Each committee shall present a full written report of its proceedings with recommendations to the Society.

Section 3. The regular place of meeting shall be Moro, unless otherwise ordered by the Society.

QUORUM.

Article 5. Sec. 1. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 1. First, Call to order and reading minutes of previous meeting.

Section 3. The rules of parliamentary practice as laid down in Cushing's Manual shall be adopted as the rules governing this Society.
