Miss Alma Newton of Monkland was a welcome visitor to this office Saturday. We learned more of her concerning that remarkable pure white snake which she and Mr. Gregg recently killed. When first seen by her it had the appearance of a dry bleached stick lying across the road but it startled her when it raised its head starting in pursuit of her. Mr. Gregg was near by attending to some horses and in answer to her call went to her aid. This caused the snake to halt, dividing its attentions between the two and Miss Alma took advantage of the situation, stunning it with a rock after which a few well directed blows with a stick killed it. The notable features of this unclassified reptile was the back regularly lined from tip to tip with beautiful little yellow diamonds, a very small pink dot in the center of each one. The head was long and pointed and the eyes blood red. The snake measured 31.3 in. It was not preserved for want of spirits.

One hundred and forty years ago a Bengal poet sang of the love of Vidya and Sundara. His work is a mine of information on some of the social customs of our country in his time. In a certain scene he describes a number of Hindu women bewailing their miseries in domestic life—one curses her fate as the victim of "a treacherous mother-in-law," and of a cruel attitude (husband's sister).

The great prevalence of the mother-in-law's persecutions nowadays, says the Indian News, has obtained for such a one the sobriquet of Bhoukanti, or the tormentor of a daughter-in-law. We have indeed anglicized mother-in-law, more motherly than natural mothers, but their existence by its contrast exhibits their opposites in the most horrid colors. In the cottages of the poor as well as in the mansions of the rich these monsters play unmolested their devilish pranks with their sons' wives, among whom some become haired to them, some bicker, and others of a sensitive and delicate nature succumb.

The daily routine of such tortures, which relates to food, pigment, bedding, bath and toilet, domestic service, company of husband and of near relatives, and take the shape of angry and foul vituperations is not much noticed. It becomes only the subject of gossip of neighboring families and of lamentation by her parental relations. It is only when the conduct of a Bhoukanti culminates in serious acts of violence, mutilations, homicide or murder, or when it leads to suicide that rare instances it comes to public notice and under cognizance of law. Lately criminal cases in the town and Monkland have recorded cases of conviction in which wives, for the most trivial faults, had been seriously injured or murdered by their husbands and mothers-in-law.
