FINE PIECE OF DENTAL WORK.

Sherman Co. Horticultural Society.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Sherman County Horticultural Society.

Article 2. The object of this Society shall be the dissemination of knowledge of the science and art of Horticulture among its members and the development and advancement of all interests pertaining thereto.

Article 3. The membership of this Society shall consist of annual members, and any person may become a member by payment of the entrance fee.

Article 4. The fee for annual membership shall be 50 cents for men and 25 cents for women, payable at the annual meeting.

Article 5. The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, whom shall hold their offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. Such election shall be held on the second Saturday in June of each year.

Article 6. The officers of this Society shall perform the duties usually devolving upon such officers in similar organizations. The Secretary and Treasurer shall audit all bills and accounts of the Society and make an annual statement of the Society's finances.

Article 7. This Society shall hold 12 regular meetings each year, on the 2d Saturday of each month. The annual meeting on the 2d Saturday in June.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1. The President shall be the executive officer of the Society. It shall be his duty to see that all general rules and regulations of the Society are enforced. To preside at all meetings, to appoint all standing and other committees not otherwise provided for. To prepare and deliver an annual address, from time to time present and outline the work and new ideas before the Society.

Article 2. The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside at all meetings and perform all the duties pertaining to that office. He, they, shall also act in conjunction with a third member as the finance committee, whose duties are defined in the Constitution.

Article 3. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be the recording, corresponding and reporting officer of the Society. He shall, with the advice of the President, arrange all programmes for meetings, edit all reports, unless otherwise provided, give all official notices for publication, issue all calls for meetings, and see that all bills of membership, and other dues, are paid in full. He, they, shall also have the custody of all books, papers, monies, and property belonging to the Society. He shall keep his accounts in such a manner that the funds of the Society are accounted for at any time; and at the regular meetings in January and July of each year shall present to the Society an accurate statement of all monies received and disbursed by him.
