THE OBSERVER house-keeper has tested each recipe or suggestion offered in this department:

Mrs. Geo. Howe, Wauseon, Ohio, tells us how to prepare rhubarb pudding. Fill a three-pint pudding dish half full of chopped rhubarb. Strew with a half-teaspoonful of sugar. Make a batter of one cup of sour milk, two eggs, piece of butter size of an egg, half-teaspoonful soda, and flour to make batter stiff as if for cake. Try a pint. Spread over rhubarb and bake. When done turn out on plate upside down. Serve with sugar and cream or hard sauce.

Spread the bottom of a deep dish with two ounces of butter, cover with a thick grating of cheese; break eight eggs upon the cheese without breaking the yolks. Sprinkle over a level teaspoonful of salt and the least bit of red pepper. Pour three tablespoons of cream over the surface and strew about two ounces of grated cheese on top and set the eggs in a moderate oven for fifteen minutes and you will have a splendid dish for breakfast.

A simple way of preparing French mustard is to mix three tablespoonfuls of the best powdered mustard with a tablespoonful of granulated sugar. Add the white of one egg. Work all the materials together and when they are mixed smooth add four tablespoonfuls of nice sharp vinegar. Set the bowl containing the mustard in the pen of boiling water. Now stir the mustard with a spoon continually for five minutes. Remove it from the fire and put it aside in a bowl for use. Some cooks add a grated clove or garlic or a few drops of white onion juice to the preparation.

Now that radishes are becoming plenty try serving them in this dainty way. Cut off the root close to the radish and remove the leaves leaving about an inch of the stem. Then cut the skin of the radish from the root toward the stem, in sections, as is done in removing the skin of an orange in eights. The skin can then be peeled carefully back to the stem by slipping the point of a knife under it and pulling it gently away from the heart of the radish. The white heart, with the pink of the peeling and the green stem, makes a beautiful contrast. Throw into cold water as fast as they are prepared. The skin of the young radish should never be discarded, as it contains properties of the vegetable that should always be eaten with the heart.

The wool movement is beginning to be lively. Some is reported sold and shipped. The market has a healthy appearance and 7 1/2 to 8 is talked of as the quotations for the first clips. Several buyers are in the city from San Francisco besides a representative of the Oregon City mills.

Mrs. Jennie Rufeno, nee Russell, who was married on Easter Sunday was buried from the Congregational church just four weeks after. It was a sad occasion, owing to the fact that she was a young bride of a month. She was a talented and honorable lady; a member of the W.R.C. and Eastern Star.

An effort was made in this city last week to get the people interested in a road connecting The Dalles with Fossil. Several hundred dollars was subscribed while the amount desired from the people was set down at \$1,000. It would seem looking at the map that Moro and the free bridge would be the most direct route. It is claimed that Sherars is a nearer and better route.

The present height of the river has caused the cascade canal to be closed until the water reaches 30 ft. consequently the D. P. & A. N. Co. steamers will be compelled to make transfers at the cascade by wagon. The company will continue to handle all freight except heavy machinery. The steamer Regulator has established a record for speed in which she could leave The Dalles at 6:30 a.m. and arrive in Portland for dinner, returning, arrive in The Dalles at 7:30 p.m. the same day. The company may put this schedule into force after the high water season is over, although it is not certain.
