It was the clouds of dust filling the air for miles that often put the prospector on guard and saved his scalp for future emergencies.

The Seelye-house fire trap, mentioned last week, was brought into Justice Hunting's court Wednesday upon the return of a warrant issued for the arrest of Mr. Seelye who was on his way overland to Harney county. Witnesses testified as to the thorough efficiency of the fire-trap to destroy lives and property but for the timely discovery after the phosphorus began its deadly work. It was shown that the premises were insured in the Phoenix in the interest of Mrs. S. Nothing appearing to implicate Seelye in the attempt to destroy his own house, defendant was discharged. The trap was set in a loft, to reach which a person must pass over the kitchen roof and through a door constructed in place of a window. The coal oil, in two cans, old papers, etc., covering the phosphorus, was piled up to the height of two feet in one corner of this attic or loft, which forced the fumes down through the ceiling into a bed room and lead to the discovery. Messrs. Hosford and Bright defended Mr. Seelye. The state attorney was represented by Mr. Logan.
