PURCHASERS NOT TO SUFFER.

About a year ago, the United States commenced suit against the OCRYCo. and a score or more innocent purchasers of lands from the company, to secure the return of lands in the Umpqua and Rogue river valleys, which it was claimed were erroneously patented to the OCRYCo. and sold by them to the codefendants in the case. Now the United States attorney makes application to Judge Gilbert to be allowed 30 days time within which to file an amended bill in the case, against the railroad company only. This action has been taken in accordance with an opinion rendered in the supreme court of the United States, in a similar case taken up from Wisconsin, which was to the effect that innocent purchasers could not be divested of the lands purchased by them; but that the governments' remedy would be against the railroad company for the money it received from the innocent purchasers, alleging that they were trustees for the government in this matter, and must account to the government for the proceeds. The act of congress under which these land grant cases have been brought in a number of states was really an act to quiet title, and not intended to despoil innocent purchasers, and under this decision of the supreme court, the whole land-grant business will be speedily settled, and in fact is now settled, as far as innocent purchasers and settlers are concerned.

The annual meeting of the Sherman county Horticultural society will be held in Moro, Saturday June 14th. It is idle to say that the horticultural interest in Sherman county is not worthy of such attention as may insure the perpetuity of this society.

A San Francisco grocer was recently arrested and fined \$50 for selling adulterated syrup. He has now brought an action against the syrup manufacturing company, from whom he purchased the adulterated article, to recover \$25,000 damages. That grocer has taken the adulterated food question "by the horns," and by making the manufacturers of adulterated foods responsible for damages sustained from prosecution under the law, will set a precedent which if followed by others, will soon make the adulterated fraud business unprofitable, and encourage honest dealing with consumers. But it is necessary that the food inspectors should be diligent in enforcing the laws against adulterations, without fear or favor.

Com. Hermann of the general land office in Washington, places us under obligation for a copy of the statistics of crime in the United States which is "an eye opener." The Michigan legislature has a bill under consideration which provides for the sexualization of confirmed criminals, with a view of making them more tractable and also of preventing the growth of crime by inheritance. A number of physicians have expressed their approval of the bill, holding that it is "a strictly humane, just, progressive and scientific measure that should meet with the approval of all christian people." As one expresses it, "no punishment would influence the mind of the criminal to the degree that the proposed operation would." It may look a little harsh, but society at large demands less sentiment and more protection.

The Chicago Drovers Journal has discovered that you can't kill yearlings, heifers and cows and keep them for making two and three year old heaves too. Scouring the country for cattle to feed has resulted in getting more cattle on feed than at any time in the history of the cattle trade. Certain it is that feeders have gathered up cattle of all ages and conditions from the east, west, north and south. They have taken steers, oxen, bulls, cows, heifers and calves, but this fact of the indiscriminate gathering of all ages and conditions of cattle may only show that the ordinary kinds of feeding cattle are so very scarce as to make this scouring and scraping necessary. Furthermore, while this widespread ingathering of "anything with hair on it" that could eat corn may result in making quite a show of available slaughter stock, at the same time it may signify a marked scarcity of cattle for the near future.

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Sherman Co. Horticultural Society.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Sherman County, Oregon, Horticultural Society.

Article 2. The object of this Society shall be the dissemination of knowledge of the science and art of Horticulture among its members and the development and advancement of all interests pertaining thereto.

Article 3. The membership of this Society shall consist of annual members, and any person may become a member by payment of the entrance fee.

Article 4. The fee for annual membership shall be ten cents for men and five cents for women, payable at the annual meeting.

Article 5. The officers of this Society shall be a President, vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall hold their offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. Such election shall be held on the second Saturday in June of each year.

Article 6. The officers of this Society shall perform the duties usually devolving upon such officers in similar organizations. Provided the financial committee shall audit all bills and accounts of the Society and make an annual statement of the Society's finances.

Article 7. This Society shall hold 12 regular meetings each year, on the 1st Saturday of each month. The annual meeting on the 2d Saturday in June.

Article 8. The By-Laws shall be equally binding with the Constitution and alterations or amendments to either may be made at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present. Provision that notice has been given at the previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1. The President shall be the executive officer of the Society. It shall be his duty to see that all general rules and regulations of the Society are enforced. To preside at all meetings. To appoint all standing and other committees not otherwise provided for. To prepare and deliver reports to the Society, and from time to time present and outline the work and new issues before the Society.

Article 2. The vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside by seniority, and perform all the duties appertaining to that office. He, they, shall also act in conjunction with a third member as a committee, whose duties are defined in the Constitution.

Article 3. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be the recording, corresponding and reporting officer of the Society. He shall, with the advice of the President, arrange all programmes for meetings, edit all reports, unless otherwise provided, give all official notices for publication, issue all calls for meetings, collect and record all membership fees, and take care of the Society's funds. He shall also be the custodian of all books, papers, money, and all other property belonging to the Society. He shall keep all accounts in such a manner that the funds of the Society may be accurately ascertained at any time, and at the regular meetings in January and July of each year shall present to the Society an accurate statement of all money received and disbursed by him.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Article 4. Sec. 1. The following standing committees, to consist of three members each, shall be appointed upon after each annual meeting by the President.

On Orchard and small fruits.
Vegetables.
Flowers.
Legislation and Exhibits.
Finance.

Section 2. Each committee shall present a full written report of its proceedings with recommendations to the Society.

Section 3. The regular place of meeting shall be Moro, unless otherwise ordered by the Society.

QUORUM.

Article 5. Sec. 1. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.
