MONKLAND WILL CELEBRATE

The annual meeting of the Sherman county Horticultural Society developed an enthusiastic sentiment. Following is the list of officers elected for the ensuing year:

President: J. E. West
Vice President: A. C. Huff
Secretary and treasurer: J. M. Parry

It was decided to have an exhibition of Sherman county fruits, grains, grasses, vegetables, etc., in Moro, at a date to be fixed, not later than October, to be held in Moro School hall.

Short and sensible addresses were made by Messrs. A. C. Huff, J. E. Harris, A. V. Underwood, D. W. Howard, T. Clay Neece, Peter Fleck, J. M. Parry, D. C. Ireland and others.

Several new members were enrolled, among them Messrs. Howard, J. J. Thompson, J. B. Mowry, Underwood, Fleck and Neece.
A. C. Huff, chairman of the committee on orchards and small fruits, read a valuable paper on pruning, etc., which will be published in The Observer.

A resolution of thanks to The Observer for interest displayed in fostering the objects of the society was adopted.
A committee, consisting of T. C. Neece, P. Fleck and A. V. Underwood, was appointed to look after pests on fruit trees; to cooperate with the state board in this matter and prevent the introduction of pests to this county.

Secretary Parry reported on the best seed distribution in this county.
A fine display of orchard products was made by A. C. Huff, and vegetables by J. E. Harris.

Hon. F. Schanno, member of the state board of horticulture, will be present at the next meeting of the Sherman county horticultural society, July 10th.

For the Housewife.
The Observer house-keeper has tested each recipe or suggestion offered in this department:
When cooking vegetables do not entirely cover the kettle. It will be better to let part of the steam escape.

No receptacle for soiled clothing, no matter how much adorned by mistaken aesthetics, should be kept in a sleeping apartment.
The addition of a little powdered borax to cold starch tends to give the linen extra stiffness, and a little turpentine put into the boiled starch adds luster.

Potato Croquettes: Pare, boil and mash six good-sized potatoes. Add one tablespoonful of butter, two-thirds of a cupful of hot cream or milk, the whites of two eggs well beaten, one saltspoonful of salt and a dash of pepper. Mix the mixture cool slightly. Then shape, roll in egg and crumbs and fry.

Velvet Sponge Cake: Two eggs beaten light; beat in one cupful of granulated sugar, one-half cup of sifted flour, next one-half cupful of flour sifted with one teaspoonful of baking powder, and lastly one-half cupful of boiling water and one-half teaspoonful of vanilla. Have the tin buttered. Fill and bake at once in a well-beated oven. The batter will seem very thin, but the cake is excellent.

Bread Omelet: Bread omelets are delicious eaten with hot maple syrup and will be appreciated on cool summer mornings. For a family of five take five thick slices of bread and five eggs; cut the hard crust from the bread, then soak in milk just enough to cover it, add the five yolks well beaten and one-half saltspoonful of salt and beat all together; just before frying add the whites well beaten. Fry on a pan cake griddle in the form of pancakes.
