THE NEW CONDITIONS.

When the farmer smiles everybody else is glad, and the American farmer these days has a smile that stretches pretty well across his face. People generally are beginning to share the farmers' elation. The city merchant is welcoming the town and country merchants, and the channels of trade, almost run dry with the financial drought of the last few years are once more filling up with the long delayed tide of prosperity. Good times, which always travel in company with good prices, are here at last, and the air of hopefulness has displaced the air of stagnation.

The best story about the renewal of prosperity is that it comes from natural source—the soil, the sun, the rains, the air of heaven. Politicians have been lying awake nights trying to bring prosperity by law, but just when the process seemed almost hopeless Nature takes a hand and once more the country rejoices. Legislation may hinder, but seldom greatly promotes prosperity along enduring lines. Wastefulness and extravagance and ill-considered laws on the part of government and lawmakers may increase the burdens of taxation, may dry up temporarily the sources of public revenue, and stagnate the channels of trade; but when Nature is working full time and pouring out its abundance, even bad laws and economic misrule cannot wholly overcome the largeness of the soil.

A serious shortage of crops in other countries has added greatly to the prices of America's abundant harvests this year. The competition in the world's markets for wheat from Russia, Argentina, Australia and India, our most prominent wheat growing rivals, is either diminished or absent, for the wheat crops of all those countries, except India, are short, and to two of these at least, Argentina and Australia; we are now actually shipping wheat and flour. From the various European countries headed by England, orders for our wheat come in enormous volume. These export orders have not been confined to wheat, but have also included large amounts of corn, barley, rye and oats. There has been a big rush to charter vessels to carry grain cargoes and quotations in the ocean freight market have advanced rapidly.

Exporters are apparently so sure of their position that they are now selling bills against wheat for future delivery on a large scale. They are able to obtain good rates because the foreign exchange market is sustained by heavy imports of merchandise, and when large grain shipments commence it must not be expected that the United Kingdom will be able to requisition all she wants as in former years when there were liberal reserves at other ports. Belgium, Holland, Germany and France are all contracting to secure shares in the long-led supply. Even in India Pesh purchases have been made for American wheat for delivery in the north of Bohemia.
