Good News for Farmers.

We understand that the Columbia Commercial company have reduced storage and forwarding on wheat from 60 cents per ton to 35 cents per ton. This will be worth several thousand dollars to the farmers of Sherman county on the large crop of wheat to be shipped this year. The wheat raisers of Sherman county should stand by this company as they always give as much, and very often more, for what than other buyers, and now they are virtually giving the farmer 15 cents a ton on his wheat more than he expected and are doing it without being forced or even asked.

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
