The Fossil Journal, one of the best X-changes that reaches The O. MAN'S table, comes in a new and attractive dress this week, brim full of news.

It is thought in war circles that when the new crop of feed stuffs is distributed hostilities will begin anew over Greco-Turkish affairs. Armies cannot fight on empty stomachs.

The Toledo Blade is practicing duplicity with the "country" press to such extent that its propositions reach the waste basket in this office. It is an old but true saying that none are so blind as they who won't see.

After spending a few months in Nebraska, eating cheap corn, 67 car loads of Oregon hogs returned to the state for slaughter last month. They came over in double decked cars and on the top of each were to 15 sacks of corn for lunch on en route.

Keep out of debt. When the greater number of those engaged in industry and enterprise are borrowers the struggle becomes severe and prosperity takes flight. "Borrowing," says Shakespeare, "dulls the edge of husbandry." Worse than borrowing is pledging your life time for things you do not need.

The emptiness of the assertion that the Ostend Manifesto is commendable doctrine, appears in the treatment of the powers; compelling her to lose her liberty and freedom. In order to raise the ransom demanded by Turkey she is on the eve of surrendering her taxing abilities to a commission based upon the policy that "might makes right."

The extraordinary demand for wheat has led to an unusual state of affairs in eastern points. The grain has been required for shipment as fast as it came in so that to transfer it, it is run through the elevators. Cars from local points are run on one side of the elevator and cars or boats on the other. One leg of the telescopic chute is let down on the receiving side and the grain is hoisted to the lofty roof and rushes down on the opposite side without pausing a moment in the transfer. The elevator men have thus been able to collect their half cent toll per bushel for transferring.

Tonnage cuts a figure to help hold prices of wheat down on this coast. If freights were not put up our farmers might reasonably expect to receive the coveted dollar per bushel by December, but it appears now that ship owners are grasping all they see in sight. Last year charters opened at \$4.13 per ton. This year charters started at \$6.07 but have advanced till now some are asking \$7.72. This trend is a very positive factor in keeping the price down. But having had fair prices last year and again good ones this season, can we expect to realize the profitable figure for the 1908 crop? If we can then, every acre that can be seeded to wheat should be sown.

Maurice S. Liden, the photographer, formerly of Portland, now of Grass Valley, is the fortunate possessor of one of the very first prints from the negative which brought the first prize at the annual competition of professional and amateur photographers at Springfield, Mass., last week and is mentioned in the Sunday Oregonian of Sept. 12th inst. It is quite a thing for art loving Oregonians to know that a better picture, even when judged by eastern eyes, than any other photographer in the United States. Mr. Fellos is, and has been at the head of The Oregonian art and engraving department for ten years. Mr. Liden has several more pictures by Mr. Fellos, also pen drawings by Fease, Koutledge and others of that paper staff. They are not on exhibition at his gallery, but he will gladly show them to anyone who appreciates the art side of photography.
