It is no more than fair that everyone should enjoy a part and parcel of this prosperity. We have accounts on our subscription books which we have been carrying for years and we need the money. Wheat is a good price and the yield is fair. Perhaps another year may be unfavorable. If so we will be as lenient as possible but this year we must have our money and that right away in order to place the paper on a firm basis.

One firm in China wishes to contract for all the flour that can be made from the wheat of Washington county. The Chinese are fast becoming bread eaters and the demand for flour is increasing very rapidly. The firm mentioned above commenced business five years ago. The first month 1250 barrels of flour was sold. Now they sell 20,000 barrels per month. The China trade if once established would be far better than the Liverpool market to us, with only quick seas to cross. We would not have to compete with Russia, Argentina or New York. True, India is not far from China but it is understood that Indian wheat makes a poor grade of flour.

Last week one day THE O. MAN drove into the attractive door yard at Assessor B. F. Pike's fine farm residence and there found Frank monkeying with a new wind mill above the well. Remembering that Co. Clerk Henrich's prescription "half a bucket full of water before breakfast, for the health," had been neglected that morning, first seized us and we seized a bucket hanging to Pike's pump and proceeded to drink. "Great Scott, what's the matter with that water, Pike?" was spit out with the first mouth full. "Why?" inquired Pike. "It's charged with grease," said THE O. MAN. "You're the first person to complain about that water," retorted Pike. Further explanations proved that THE O. MAN was the first person who had supped from the well! It was a new hole in the ground, 186 feet deep, and the grease came from the pump which had that hour been adjusted to work. So we had dedicated the new well which cost Pike \$600 and which is worth at least \$2000 to his farm.

The senior of THE OBSERVER staff was the guest of Capt. and Mrs. Stanley at a dinner last week where corn bread was conspicuous on a menu comprising numerous dishes temptingly prepared by the skillful hostess. The special feature was the corn bread, however; as the Captain and THE O. MAN, belonging to a class of Americans remembering the days when that article of diet was more highly regarded than it is now, still claim for it a standard of excellence. Mrs. Stanley understands the art, which not one cook in a thousand does, and while regretting corn as a breadstuff has lost its popularity at home and people are so industriously educating Europeans as to the delights of hoe-cake, corn-dog, etc., American families might learn the lessons, well nigh forgotten. Good corn bread is hard to beat, and it would certainly be wise not to turn over entirely to our hogs and cattle, nor yet to the poor of Europe, the life-giving elements of the American corn field.

A LESSON FOR FARMERS.

At a Sherman county farm dinner, prepared by Mrs. O.P. Hulst, assisted by Miss Jennie Hulst; to which we were invited guests, on a recent occasion, one of the meat dishes was rare and delicious pork, which might easily be taken in preference to the artistically fried chicken served. It brought to mind the discriminations against American pork in Europe and the reflection that if Sherman county had the contract there should be no such discrimination. It is a fact that while the American farmers and hog-raisers ship to the British market an immense proportion of the bacon consumed there they get the lowest market prices for it.

The British consumer pays more for Canadian and Danish bacon because, according to his taste, the Canadian and Danish products are superior. American bacon brings only 6 1/2 cents a pound in England, while the product of the two competing countries brings from 11 to 14 cents. Thus, while the United States raises more than half of the bacon imported into Great Britain the amount received for it is only about equal to the sum paid to the Canadian or Danish farmer. American bacon, according to the English idea, is too fat; hence the competing bacon producers, who raise a leaner article, get the best terms in the market. Were the American farmer to change his methods of fattening hogs he might have the same prices.

Here is a point which farmers would do to heed. It will pay them to study their market and the tastes of their customers. Well do we remember the day when it was claimed that Oregon could not produce pork. Notwithstanding the fact that Thos. Cross, a plain man at Salem, put up a thousand dollars' worth of a \$365,000 annually; and found active inquiry for it abroad. The business failed, finally; perhaps for want of cooks like Mrs. and Miss Hulst to prepare it for the table.

But there is no reason, apparently, why the American farmer, notably the Oregon farmer, may not command just as good prices as their competitors if they will only take the pains to ascertain their customers' tastes and cater to them. This applies to all kinds of products. If we would profit by an expanded market and better prices let us learn what consumers desire and then offer them just what they want.
