Grover Cleveland and W. J. Bryan will be delegates to the convention in New York city January 14th, for the purpose of reforming the laws governing party primaries and caucuses.

Cel. Hay is all right, and Queen Victoria agrees with THE OBSERVER. He has declined over fifty invitations to make public speeches since he arrived in England. Judging from the praise lavished on his purely literary speech at the Omar Khayyam club, he will find it more difficult to decline future invitations.

The ladies of the cabinet in Washington have adopted new rules. No refreshments and open only to those who have received cards of admission. This action will be severe upon a nameless mob, who have secured both lunch and apparent social recognition by attending the receptions without invitation, and hogging the refreshments.

President McKinley's utterances on the Cuban question are being commended by all classes of citizens and members of all parties. There is an evident feeling throughout the country that his course has been so wise and judicious that the entire matter can, with perfect safety, be left in his hands for such future action as may be necessary.

Thursday last President McKinley decided to put a quietus on protests formulated against Attorney-General McKenna as judge of the supreme court, and concluded to send in his nomination to the senate. The president is determined to stand by his attorney-general to the end of the fight. He will insist, it is said, that McKenna continue in office as attorney-general until the senate confirms his nomination as associate justice.

The cause of Moro's steady advancement is to be found in the fact that there are no dissensions and bickering to divide our people into warring factions, crushing out the spirit of progress and blocking every proposed enterprise. We propose that 1898 shall be more memorable than 1897 in the history of the city for substantial achievements in a business way. The day of booms is past, but we do want solid, permanent growth.

The people who are urging immediate legislation for an increase of the revenue are doing an injustice to the existing law and to the business interests of the country. The earnings under the new law have grown with marked rapidity, beginning with \$19,000,000 in August and running up to over \$25,000,000 in November. The receipts now are within about five million a month of the expenditures and when it is remembered that the receipts from sugar, wool and woollens will not begin to be felt until after the month of January, but will average six or seven million a month all told, it will be seen that there is good reason to believe that the law will meet all requirements and that the demand for additional legislation at the present time is unfair and unjust.

Say, some of you who are "Oregonian worshiping" republicans, just file away this dirty, contemptible slur from the Oregonian last week: "Mr. Dingley asserts that by next May the treasury receipts will be exceeding expenditures. Of course that settles it. However, to make the proof yet more incontrovertible the republicans loudly cheered. Demonstration could certainly go no farther." This is a free trade Oregonian slur at Dingley. It will keep until next May. Save it for reference. The critics of the enemies of the Dingley tariff law, in which they assert that it is not now producing sufficient revenue to meet running expenses of the government are fully met by the letter of Assistant Secretary Howell of the treasury department whose long experience in this branch of the government service entitles his opinion to special consideration. Why don't the Oregonian print that?

Annual Ordinances by the Voters.

Was set apart from Wasco county in 1888. To look at it on the map one would suppose that a six horse team could not be turned around in the county without upsetting the wagon into the John Day or Deschutes, its eastern and western boundaries. But it is the Biggest Little County on the Pacific slope. The population is about 3200. Following is an estimate of the output of the products of Sherman county for 1907:

John Biggs, one said that getting up at four o'clock this morning is gradually becoming one of the lost arts, but a peep at the harvest fields as the first rays of the sun rising over the mountains rest on Sherman county in July, presents an appearance which baffles description in a brief like this. There were 48 threshing outfits employed in this little county last year on the crop harvest of an extremely plump and quality, makes bakers rejoice from Oregon to England. It is the best wheat in the world. This is an attested fact.

Statistics inform us that the first carload of wheat was shipped out of what is now Sherman county, just one carload, in 1872. The 1907 output shows the development in that line of production in 25 years. Advancement has been steady, and whilst wheat is our leading industry, other pursuits prove profitable. With the introduction of beet sugar refineries and linen factories, one of each of which will be established in Oregon in 1908, placing the Oregon farmer upon the threshold of an extremely promising outlook, we find encouragement; for sugar beets and fax may be profitably produced in Sherman county by a vote of people.

Coal is the only mineral found in Sherman county, and it is yet in an undeveloped condition. Moro, the county seat of Sherman county is near the center of the county. Wasco, 10 miles north, Grass Valley 10 miles south, and Monkland 7 miles east, are trade centers in the up lands. Rufus, Grant and Biggs are trade centers 20 miles north from Moro on the line of the O. R. N. Ry., and bank of the Columbia river. Wasco is now connected by the C. S. Ry., from Biggs.

There are 14 post offices in the county as follows: Besides the points above enumerated we have Bigelow, Crox, Gorman, DeMoss Springs, Erskinville, Rutledge and Kent. Wasco and Moro have banks; the long distance telephone extends to Grass Valley. Three stage lines center in Moro daily, from Kent, Rutledge, Grass Valley and Erskinville to the south; from Grant, Rufus, Wasco and DeMoss on the north, and Dallas City northwest. At each of the postoffice points in the county there are churches and schools, besides numerous similar organizations at points not supplied with postoffices. Moro and Wasco have graded schools, Grass Valley has a splendid academy in addition to its public school. The returns made by the county board of examiners for 1907 aggregate in valuations \$14,490,000, the returns for 1906, \$12,000,000. The returns for 1905 may safely be placed at double the figures. In 11 months of the current year 480 papers were recorded in the office against 398 in '06 and 291 in '05, for the same period of time. When Scott & McCoy, our stalwart and worthy E. O., who still sticks to Sherman county the best, has such credit on this building, now the Home of The OREGONIAN, there was no other town in Moro here, only the rolling hills covered with native grasses, the world-beating bunch grass predominating, upon which were feeding herds of cattle and flocks of wild geese. The virgin soil had only been broken in patches

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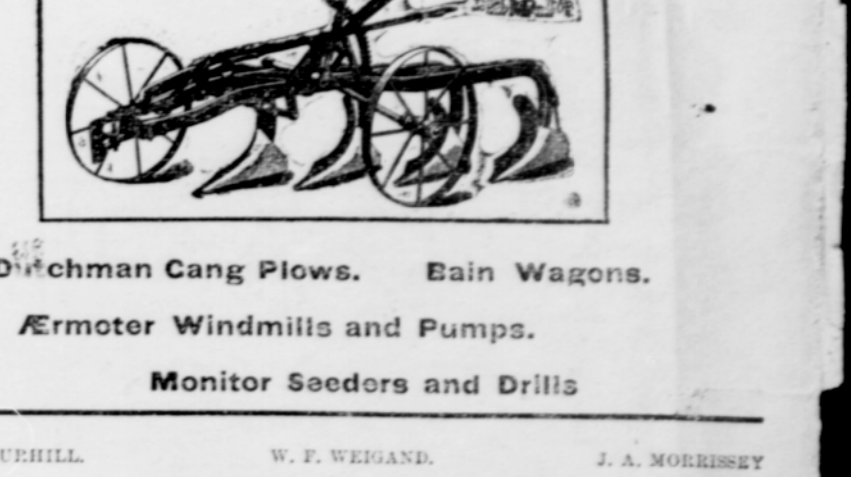
