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Sec. 7. If there should be any surplus money arising from such sale, after paying all costs, charges and damages, the constable shall pay the same to the owner of such swine sold. Provided, said owner make proof within 15 days after such sale that he is entitled to the same. If no proof shall be made within 15 days the constable shall pay the same to the county treasurer taking his receipt therefor.
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Sec. 3. If the owner of such swine shall come forward within five days and prove such swine to be his, the person so taking shall deliver the same to such owner, upon his paying all costs, charges and damages, sustained by reason of such trespass and taking up. Provided, however; that if the parties cannot agree as to the amount of charges and damages then each party may choose one disinterested person and they may choose a third person who shall determine the amount thereof, and such decision by such arbiters shall be binding and final as to the sum the owner of said swine shall pay.
Sec. 4. If the owner does not within five days after the posting of notices provided for in sec. 2 of this act appear and claim such swine and pay all costs, charges and damages to which the person taking up the same shall be entitled, then the person taking up such swine shall apply to the justice of the peace named in his said notices to appraise the damages which he has sustained by reason of such trespass, and assess the costs and charges in taking up and keeping said swine, and have said swine sold and the proceeds thereof applied in payment of said several sums. And thereupon said justice shall proceed to assess the damages, costs and charges and direct the constable of his district to proceed and sell such swine at public sale and apply the proceeds thereof in payment of the sums so found due and appraised by said justice.
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
