Talk of Theodore Roosevelt for president in 1900 continues at New York.

President McKinley hopes to leave Washington for Yellowstone Park by July 15.

Bellamy Storer, United States minister to Belgium, will be appointed minister to Spain.

It has been decided to pay no money to former Cuban troops who now have civil employment.

Thomas J. Havemeyer, of sugar trust fame, died at New York Monday, aged 83 years.

Orders for the reorganization of the navy on a peace footing have been issued at Washington.

Mr. Bryan addressed the Missouri legislature from the capital steps at Jefferson City Tuesday.

Mayor Van Wyck, of New York, advocates municipal ownership of gas plants in a message to the council.

Foreign diplomats agree that little is expected in the way of direct results from the czar's peace conference.

Aginaldo has issued a proclamation declaring that Spanish shall be the official language throughout the Philippines.

Major General Shafter arrived at Washington Sunday. He will testify before the army court of inquiry into the beef charges.

The result of Monday's riot at Panama, Ill., was seven persons killed and nine wounded. Martial law has been declared in the town.

The Greek steamer Maria was sunk off Tripoli in a collision with the British steamer Kingswell, and 45 persons drowned.

A draft on New York for \$20,000,000 in favor of the government of Spain, as per the terms of the peace treaty, will soon be delivered.

Ray, the French premier, announces that conditions, both at home and abroad, are eminently satisfactory to the French government.

Returns from the Irish county council elections show that 83 unionists, one labor candidate and one liberal have been returned.

Thirty West Point cadets engaged in a fight with the French at the annual Sunday night. U. S. Grant the third was among the seriously injured.

An American Protestant missionary at Hankow, China, makes charges against the Chinese of murdering Protestant chaplains, and torturing Protestants.

An anti-trust league has been formed by 50,000 men to boycott all goods of big combinations. The members are pledged to purchase from independent dealers.

John E. O'Brien, chief of the Santa Fe line department, was instantly killed by the California limited train at Topeka.

The troops on board the transport Chicago for Manila, are reported by their officers to be in unfit condition for service, being mostly raw recruits.

Public sympathy is with the employees to such an extent in the street railway strike at Bay City, Mich., that the sheriff can secure no men to act as deputies.

Five children of Ed Peterson, of Viborg, Turner county, north Dakota, were poisoned by eating wild parsnips. Two are dead, one dangerously ill, and two will recover.

The trial of ex-United States Senator Quay and his son on charges of conspiracy in the alleged misuse of funds of the People's bank was called Monday in Philadelphia.

Oriental advances state that a sensation has been caused at Peking by an edict issued by the empress dowager, according to Li Hung Chang and Chang Jung, governor of Shan Tung, with gross extravagance.

Sir Wilfred Laurier stated in the house of commons, at Ottawa, that the government had received information from the United States respecting the delimitation of the Alaska boundary, but he could not give the details.

Recently published official figures show that in 1898 the Canadian gold output was \$13,700,000, placing Canada in fifth place as a gold-producing country. Of the total, \$10,000,000,000 was taken out of the Klondike.

Aginaldo's envoy in Paris declares that fever and the rainy season will be good for the cause of the rebels, as it will allow them to recruit their army and prepare to resume the war with better odds, while it will tend to demoralize the Americans.

Judge Ross, in the district court at Los Angeles, handed a decision Monday in the case entitled the United States against the Southern Pacific company, which involved title to 140,000 acres of land in Southern California. The decision is favorable to the United States.

H. E. Huntington has been retired from actual control of the Southern Pacific, when Collis P. Huntington is absent, and George Crocker succeeds him, the result of a deal in New York, whereby Huntington retained the presidency, and gets all the support of the Crocker interests.

Already the gossips are at work with the story that there is a Roosevelt candidacy for the presidency behind the Mazer investigation in New York, but the more likely view is that Platt has found that he can do better in Congress with Crocker and stand in with Roosevelt and reform.

The Illinois house of representatives passed a bill providing for the erection at Springfield of a new capitol building, at a cost of \$1,000,000. The bill appropriates \$100,000 and provides that \$400,000 be raised by popular subscription. Congress will be asked to appropriate the balance.

The converted cruiser Yosemite will sail from New York shortly for Guam Island in the Pacific with the governor General R. P. Lowy, U. S. N., and his garrison of marines on board. The government at Washington will allow Capt. Lowy to remain a year for maintaining government on this island taken from Spain.

Hannah Garey, aged 22, the elder of the two Garey sisters, who have been afflicted with supposed leprosy for the past 17 years, died at their home near Junction City, Ohio, Wednesday. She is the first white person to die of leprosy in the state. It is supposed the girls contracted the disease from their father who got it in the civil war.

Judge Blair, of Jersey City, has just decided that the national bankruptcy law supersedes the state law, and that while it, in combination with the state law, provides in certain cases for the imprisonment for debt, it provides no way for release so that a man imprisoned hereafter in New Jersey for non-payment of a debt, will be liable to be taken to jail for life unless released by congress.

The Cuban military assembly being dead, General Gomez will take up his program of solidifying the Cuban people into a party that shall, without ceasing, urge the United States to withdraw from the island. His purpose is to make the people seem to have but one opinion, one desire—the thought of independence and absolute separation from the United States.

There is every indication that not less than 2000 miles of new railway will be built in the United States in 1899, representing an investment of about \$150,000,000. At the present time over 4000 miles are either under contract or actually under construction. Oregon is put down for 127 miles, Washington for 108, Idaho 267, in Iowa 294 miles, and in Utah, which is the most to be constructed in any state in the union.

Advices received at Tacoma say a movement is on foot in Hawaii to lacerate the island with Portuguese laborers from the Azores.

The empress dowager of China, has issued an edict ordering that foreign missionaries in her domain be well treated by all people.

Ebenezer A. Hyde, connected with the large Chicago meat market, has been indicted for selling debts of \$841,000, with no assets.

John F. Stevens was appointed chief engineer of the Great Northern railway, and is to have the head of directors of the road in St. Paul.

Ten thousand applications for pensions have been made by soldiers of the Spanish-American war, of which 1000 have been filed the past two weeks.

It is now stated that Senator Quay has decided to withdraw from the senatorial race in Pennsylvania and to run for election of some other republican.

At the bi-monthly meeting of the Association of Steel Shafting Manufacturers, in Philadelphia, the decision was made to raise prices, averaging 5 per cent.

Within 24 hours 500 additional men have joined the Cleveland carpenters' strike. Over 1500 men are on a strike. They demand an eight-hour day and 30 cents an hour.

The bill providing for the incorporation of the St. Louis World's Fair, to be held in 1904, at the Centennial of Louisiana purchase has passed the Missouri legislature.

Albany bakers have formed a trust. They have raised prices, giving 10 cents a loaf for \$1, and have agreed not to sell to middlemen.

As the play develops the doctor's good angel contends for him and he is repeatedly told that he may still repent and turn back, but the astute enchanter of evil never has some new fancy to divert him. In the last act, when the 24 years are about to expire, an old man comes to him and advises him to leave his magical arts and turn to truth and righteousness. Faustus wavers and then Mephistopheles promises that he shall have for his reward two or three feet of snow and evidently was successful.
