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THE REBELS ON THE RUN

Lawton Again Takes the Field at the Head of a Large Force.

BATTLE IN FRONT OF NOVALICHES

Only Lasted Fifteen Minutes and the Insurgents Retreated in Bad Order—American Troops Suffering from Heat.

Manila, April 22, 7 p. m.—General Lawton took the field at daylight with a column of troops consisting of the North Dakota regiment, two battalions of the Third infantry, the Twenty-second infantry, two guns of Scott's battery, three troops of the Fourth cavalry and "Gale's" squadron equipped in light marching order. The force started at 5 o'clock over the Novaliches road, traversing the country previously cleared of rebels but subsequently reconquered by them. It was met by a force of about 1,000 men in front of Novaliches at 8 a. m. The rebels opened fire, but their fire was silenced fifteen minutes later, the enemy retreating in bad order and the Americans advancing along the rough roads around Novaliches. The rebels were considerably annoyed by the fire of rebel sharpshooters from the jungle for two hours. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the rebels were in full flight, leaving many dead on the field, and our troops were compelled to take a brief rest in the shade, the heat being overpowering.

Lawton's Flying Column.

Washington, April 22.—The war department today received a cablegram from General Otis announcing the formation of a new flying column under command of General Lawton and the initiation of a new campaign which is expected to result in the clearing out of the jungle in the country north of Manila up to the foothills of the Sierra Madre.

The text of the dispatch is not made public, but it is said to agree closely with the account of the movements contained in the Associated Press dispatch from Manila.

Washington, April 22.—The North Atlantic squadron sailed today from St. Pierre northward. The Solace has sailed from Manila for San Francisco.

TRAITORS AND TREASON.

Enthusiastic Anti-Expansionists Liable to Get Into Trouble.

Portland, Ore., April 22.—An Oregonian special from Washington says: The cabinet today discussed traitors and the laws of treason in relation to the Philippines. Recently there came into possession of the administration evidence incriminating United States citizens for furthering election. Telegram messages from anti-expansionists have been intercepted encouraging volunteer officers and men to demand their return to the Philippines on the ground that peace had been declared. The messages even counseled the volunteers to go to the length of refusing further service in the Philippines.

What the president will do has not yet been decided. It will not be surprising if a warning in the form of a message will remind the mischief makers that there is a serious law against treason which will be enforced if a further attempt is made to tamper with the men at the front.

STILL IN ABSENCE.

Germany's Request for a Coaling Station in the Philippines.

London, April 22.—The Daily Chronicle says this morning: We are informed that during the Hispano-American war, Germany proposed to the United States the cession of a coaling station in the Philippines in the event of action being taken with the change of commercial privileges.

The United States replied that the proposition was not acceptable.

High Water in the Missouri.

Omaha, April 22.—The Missouri river rose several points last night. Many railroad tracks on the bottoms are under water.

St. Joseph, Mo., April 22.—The Missouri river has risen a foot in the last 24 hours. The levee at Hamburg, Iowa, broke last night and the bottoms are flooded for miles below.

Three Killed by a Train.

Baraboo, Wis., April 22.—Four young people were run down today by the Chicago and Northwestern train at Crawford's Crossing. Three were instantly killed, Bonnie Tolbie, Kittie Marshall and Nellie Welch. The party was walking on the track and failed to notice the approaching train.

The Chinese Are Alarmed.

Victoria, April 22.—The presence of nearly the whole German fleet at Kiau Choo, according to the Chinese, has caused the Chinese people to be alarmed. It is believed that the Chinese are expecting extensive operations and the Chinese are seriously alarmed.

An Alleged Traitor Escapes.

Berlin, April 22.—Major Albert von Bismarck, a German officer who was being taken in chains to the Spaniards escaped from the guards and has not been recaptured. He was charged with high treason in disclosing to Russian agents detailed plans of German fortifications.

Pittsburgh, April 22.—"Kid" Lavette, who is believed to be dying from the effects of a knockout blow delivered by John Cavanaugh during a prize fight last night.

Assets Double the Debts.

Tacoma, April 22.—The Western Bank Company has been placed into the hands of a receiver. The debts aggregate nine thousand dollars, the assets eighteen thousand.

Jury Failed to Agree.

Charleston, S. C., April 22.—The jury in the Lake City, S. C., case failed to reach a verdict and was discharged. The case goes over to the next term of court.

King Humbert's Tour.

Sassari, April 22.—The king and queen of Italy arrived here last evening. All the warships were illuminated in honor of their majesties.

George Case Hearing an End.

Denies the Report.

WAS CAUGHT IN THE ACT

Further Details of the Arrest of the Falk's Commander.

FURNISHED ARMS TO MATAPAPA'S MEN

While So Doing He Was Surprised by a Squad of British Marines and Immediately Placed Under Arrest.

Seattle, April 21.—A Times special from Manila says that the steamer Aorangi from Australia bringing advice that the commander of the German man-of-war Falk at Samoa has been arrested by British forces and is now held a prisoner on the British vessel Porpoise. He was surprised by a squad of British Marines and immediately placed under arrest.

After the arrest of the Falk's commander a conference was held between Captain Stuebe and Admiral Kautz and the Porpoise and Philadelphia steamed in a position on either side of the Falk. Orders were then sent that if the Falk made a move of any kind she would be blown out of the water.

No one is allowed to go aboard or leave the German ship without permission in writing of the captain, either Captain Stuebe, of the Porpoise, or Admiral Kautz.

Considerable sickness among women of the Porpoise and Philadelphia, the result of the cholera epidemic, is reported. Lieutenant Kautz, of the Porpoise, is among the sick.

Matapapa's case in waiting.

San Francisco, April 21.—The Victoria dispatch says that the captain of the German ship Falk was placed under arrest by the British and American forces at Apia. He is credited by the natives with the charge of complicity in the sale of arms to the natives.

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THE REBELS AGAIN ACTIVE.

Attack the Washington Outposts, but Were Checked and Routed.

Manila, April 21.—A force of about two hundred rebels yesterday afternoon attacked the outposts of the Washington regiment, near Taguig, south of Pasig and Patente. Two companies immediately engaged the enemy and drove them into the open in airish order. The rebels were checked and routed after two hours fighting, leaving a trail
