MORO CITY COUNCIL.

ORDINANCES NOW IN FORCE. Published by Authority.

[No. 3.]

AN ORDINANCE defining and prescribing the Qualifications, and Duties of the City Marshal.

The City of Moro does Ordain as follows.

SECTION 1. Before entering upon the discharge of the duties of his office, the city marshal shall file with the city recorder a certificate with his oath of office, as prescribed by the city charter endorsed thereon, and also a bond payable to the city of Moro in the sum of five hundred dollars, United States gold coin, with two or more sureties, who justify in like manner on bail upon arrest under the laws of the state of Oregon, and to be approved by the mayor, conditioned that he will honestly and faithfully discharge his duties of city marshal, account for and pay over to the city treasurer all money that comes into his hands by virtue of his office, and turn over to his successor in office all books, papers and property belonging to the city of Moro that may come into his hands by virtue of his office as city marshal, and that he will faithfully and impartially perform all duties that may be required of him by the city council.

SEC. 2. The marshal shall be a conservator of the peace, and shall execute all processes directed to him by the recorder of said city, or by any magistrate of the state of Oregon. He shall attend regularly upon the sitting of the recorder's court. He may make arrest for a breach of the peace, for a violation of any city ordinance, or for the commission of crime within the city limits, the same as a peace officer under the laws of this state. He shall collect all fines and taxes, and shall pay all money so collected by him to the city treasurer, taking therefor duplicate receipts, one of which shall be filed in the recorder's office and placed to his credit. When any person doing business within the city, or engaging in any occupation for which a city license is required, shall neglect or refuse to take out a license as required by the city ordinance, it shall be the duty of the city marshal to inform against and prosecute such persons before the city recorder, and enforce the payment of such license fee from such delinquent, and in the discharge of his duties he shall exercise a vigilant control over the peace and best interests of the city. He shall perform all such other duties as may be required of him by the city council, and shall serve as all notices within the city limits which the council may direct him to serve.

SEC. 3. All sums due to the city marshal for the collection of city taxes and for any and all services rendered the city, shall be audited and paid in the same manner as other claims against the city, except the fees in civil and criminal cases, when collected may be retained by him.

SEC. 4. The city marshal shall have power to appoint, by written appointment filed with the recorder, and employ a deputy, who shall hold his office as deputy marshal subject to the orders and requirements of the city marshal, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of city ordinances in force, and such deputy shall take an oath to faithfully demean himself in office, and such oath shall be immediately filed with the recorder.

SEC. 5. The city marshal shall attend regularly the meetings of the council and act as sergeant-at-arms of said council.

SEC. 6. Whenever the marshal shall arrest a person, either with or without a warrant for violating any city ordinance or criminal statute of this state, he shall forthwith take such person before the recorder for examination or trial, and he shall, if such arrest be made in the night time, or when the recorder's court is not in session, confine the prisoner so arrested in the city jail until he can have a hearing. Provided, that no person shall be so confined more than one day before his examination or trial shall begin.

SEC. 7. When any person, for the non payment of any fine, costs or disbursements, shall be adjudged to labor upon the streets or other public works of the city, it shall be the duty of the marshal to cause such person faithfully to labor upon the streets, or such other public works as may at the time be in progress under the direction of the council, not less than seven, nor more than ten, 10, hours per day on every day, Sunday excepted, for the full term for which said person was committed.

SEC. 8. When any person required to perform labor as aforesaid shall refuse to labor as required by the marshal, or shall attempt to escape from the custody of the officer having him in charge, it shall be the duty of said officer there to restrain such person by ball and chain.

SEC. 9. If any person, while required to labor under the provisions of this or any other ordinance, or by virtue of any judgment or order of commitment made and entered by the recorder, shall make his escape from the officer having him in charge, he may be retaken wherever found within the city limits and confined and secured by manacles until he serve and perform the full terms and conditions of sentence.

SEC. 10. The marshal shall keep a record, in which he shall enter the name, age, sex and color of every person confined in the city jail, whether upon commitment or not, together with the date and duration of the imprisonment, together with a list of articles of value found upon each prisoner. He shall also keep a register in which he shall enter the title of every state case in which he is called upon to act, together with a brief statement of his official acts, and also a specific statement of his fees and compensation.

SEC. 11. The marshal shall make a report to the council at their first regular meeting in July, October, January and April of each year, which shall contain:

1. The number of arrests made during the quarter with the names of the persons.

2. The number of persons confined in the city jail during the quarter, together with their names and duration of confinement.

3. The amount and character of work done on the streets, or on the

public work, by the prisoners in the city jail, together with the number of the hours each prisoner worked.

4. The amount of taxes collected during the month.

5. The exact and specific amount of fees, costs and disbursements paid to him, while acting as city marshal, and the date of payments or collections.

6. Specific reference to the recorder's and treasurer's receipts given him during the month.

7. Amount of taxes collected for street work and the amount of work done thereon for street improvement.

SEC. 12. The marshal shall be ex-officio superintendent of streets and pound master, and shall keep himself informed of all public streets, alleys, public squares, highways, bridges, culverts, sewers, drains, street lamps parks and pounds, and shall have the supervision of all work done for the construction, improvement and repair thereof, whether such work is done by contract or by, or at the expense of the owners of adjacent property.

SEC. 13. Whereas, there is great and urgent need of this ordinance, it shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

[No. 4.]

AN ORDINANCE relating to and describing the Seal of the City of Moro.

The City of Moro does Ordain as follows.

SECTION 1. The seal of the city of Moro shall be circular in form, one and three quarter inches in diameter, and shall have engraved, in Italian letters around the outside circle the following words, to-wit: "Seal of the City of Moro, Sherman county, Oregon." Also an emblem on the face of said Seal, described as follows: A sheaf of Wheat.

SEC. 2. Whereas, there is urgent need of this ordinance it shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

[No. 5.]

AN ORDINANCE relating to the appointment, duties and compensation of City Attorney.

The city of Moro does Ordain as follows—

SECTION 1. The city attorney shall be of the degree of attorney and counselor of the supreme court of this state. He shall be elected by the city council to serve for one year from the date of his election.

SEC. 2. Before entering upon his duties the city attorney shall file with the recorder a certificate of his election, with an official oath endorsed thereon to the effect that he will faithfully demean himself in office.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the city attorney to attend to all actions in which the city is interested, and he shall advise the city council when requested to do so, on any legal question that may arise, involving the interest of the city.

SEC. 4. The city attorney shall receive as his compensation for services as city attorney such sum as the city council may deem just and reasonable for his legal advice as counsel. When excessive service is demanded of him when prosecuting any case in behalf of the city before the recorders court, he shall receive the fees set forth in ordinance No. 6, relating to fees of city officers.

SEC. 5. Whereas, there is urgent need of this ordinance it shall take effect and be in force from after its approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE Regulating the fees of City Officers.

The city of Moro does Ordain as follows—

SECTION 1. The city recorder shall be entitled to receive for his compensation the following fees, to-wit:

For issuing warrant or other writ ..... 50

For issuing subpoenas ..... 25

For taking bond, recognition or other undertaking ..... 50

For entering cause on docket ..... 25

For entering judgment when tried by jury ..... 1 00

For entering judgment when tried by court ..... 50

For entering discontinuance or satisfaction ..... 50

For entering appeal to circuit court ..... 1 00

For swearing witness or juror ..... 25

For taking affidavit ..... 10

For taking acknowledgment of deed or other instrument ..... 50

For making a copy of any proceeding or trial, per folio ..... 15

For making exhibits of the receipts and disbursements of the city, per folio ..... 10

For making each order on the city treasurer ..... 05

For making out an appeal by order of the council ..... 50

For making each receipt ..... 25

For issuing any license (to be paid by party obtaining it) ..... 50

For entering grant of license on record ..... 10

For filing any paper required to be filed ..... 05

For copying any ordinance, (per folio) ..... 05

For making any notice and posting the same ..... 25

For each certificate of election ..... 10

For attending council meeting and keeping minutes ..... 25

For keeping the books of recorder, per month ..... 2 00

SEC. 2 The city marshal shall receive as his compensation the following fees, to-wit:

For serving a summons, order, writ, or process other than a warrant of arrest in a criminal action, or a subpoena ..... 50

For serving a warrant of arrest ..... 1 00

For serving a subpoena, including copy and return ..... 25

For committing a person to jail ..... 50

For summoning a jury ..... 1 00

For attending recorder's court during a trial therein ..... 1 00

For advertising and selling property ..... 2 00

For keeping property, when a keeper is required and not otherwise provided by ordinance (per day) ..... 1 50

For return of an execution, or warrant or summons, when no levy for service is made ..... 25

SEC. 3. Witness and jurors fees: For each day's attendance before the recorder as a witness in any case ..... 1 00

For each juror sworn in recorder's court ..... 1 00

SEC. 4. Attorney's fees: For each attendance before the recorder on behalf of the city when conviction is had ..... 5 00

For each attendance when no conviction is had ..... 2 50

SEC. 5. Whereas, there is urgent need of this ordinance it shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

[No. 7.]

AN ORDINANCE to license, tax and regulate certain callings, trades and employments, and to provide for the manner of issuing licenses.

The city of Moro does Ordain as follows—

SECTION 1. Auctioneers, who follow their vocation within the city limits of the city of Moro, shall pay a quarterly license of \$3.00. Every person shall be deemed an auctioneer within the meaning of this ordinance who offers property for sale at public outcry. Provided, however, that this section shall have no application to persons selling property by virtue of an order or decree of any court.

SEC. 2. Hawkers shall pay a license of \$2.50 per day for each day in which they shall conduct their business within the corporate limits of the city of Moro. Any person who offers goods for sale by outcry on the streets, or who shall conduct their business from a stand, booth, tent or wagon, upon the streets or any lot, shall be deemed a hawker within the meaning of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. Any pedler who shall conduct his business within the corporate limits of the city of Moro, shall pay a license thereof as follows—when traveling with two or more animals, \$2.50 per day or \$25.00 per quarter, when traveling with one animal \$1.00 per day or \$15.00 per quarter; when traveling on foot 50 cents per day or \$10.00 per quarter. All persons except persons peddling newspapers, bibles and religious tracts, farmers or persons peddling products of their own farm, gardens or milk ranches, who sell, or offer to sell, at retail, goods, wares, merchandise or other commodities, traveling from place to place within the city of Moro, shall be deemed peddlers by this ordinance.

SEC. 4. The keeper or proprietor of every circus shall pay a license of \$10.00 for each exhibition. Every building, tent, space or area where feats of horsemanship or acrobatic sports are exhibited, shall be regarded as a circus, under this ordinance.

SEC. 5. Theatrical troupes, or the proprietor or manager thereof, shall pay a license of \$2.50 for each and every performance or exhibition within the city limits. Two or more persons going from place to place for the purpose of giving dramatic or operatic exhibitions, or other plays or performances, including magic lantern exhibitions for the entertainment or amusement of the public, where an admission fee is charged, shall be deemed a theatrical troupe. Provided, however, this ordinance shall not apply to any citizens of Sherman county who desire to show in the city of Moro. Provided, the proceeds of the show are for the exclusive use of some public enterprise in the town or village the actors came from.

SEC. 6. Jugglers shall pay a license of \$10.00 per week or \$2.50 for every day and night of their exhibition. Every person who performs by slight of hand shall be regarded as a juggler under this ordinance.

SEC. 7. The proprietor or agent of all other exhibitions, entertainment or shows, traveling from place to place and exhibiting for money, including lecturers or speakers, shall pay a license of \$10.00 per week or a daily license of \$2.50.

SEC. 8. The owner of any hack, cab, hackney, carriage, wagon, dray, cart or other vehicle, used for the transportation of passengers or any article of trade, earth, ballast, manure, building material or other substance, within the city limits, shall pay a quarterly license of \$5.00 for each vehicle drawn by one animal, and for each additional animal used in drawing such vehicle an additional sum of \$1.00. Provided, that nothing contained in this section shall be considered or construed so as to require persons drawing dirt, stone or gravel for the streets or highways, or drawing wood, gravel or other commodities from outside the city limits, or in plowing or scraping the public streets alleys, railways, or other public improvements, or persons engaged in the sale of milk, or dairy products, within the city limits, to procure a license. The owner or driver of vehicles conveying passengers or merchandise as above mentioned, shall place the number of his vehicle, as named in his license, on each side of his vehicle, in a conspicuous place, in a neat and legible manner, in figures not less than one and one half inches long and of proportionate width, and said number shall not be changed while said vehicle is subject to the payment of a municipal license.

SEC. 9. Shooting galleries shall pay a license of \$10.00 per quarter, or \$1.00 per day. Every place or building where guns or pistols are kept for shooting at targets, whether for hire or not, shall be deemed a shooting gallery under this ordinance.

SEC. 10. The owner or keeper of any bowling alley, billiard room or pool room, shall pay a quarterly license of \$3.00 for each alley or table belonging to or used in the building or place to be licensed. Every place or building where bowls or balls are thrown, or billiards, pool, pigeon-hole, or other games played when balls and cues are used, shall be regarded as a bowling alley or billiard room or pool room, under this ordinance.

SEC. 11. All traveling dentists, oculists, s, physicians, surgeons, milliners, photographers, merchants, or any other occupation, profession or trade, who comes into the city of Moro for a temporary purpose only, shall pay a license of \$40.00 per quarter or \$2.00 per day, before they shall be allowed to practice their profession, or trade, or sell their goods, wares and merchandise.

SEC. 12. That no person, firm, company or corporation, shall be engaged in prosecuting or carry on any trade, business or profession within the limits of the city of Moro, for which a license is required by this ordinance, until he or they shall have obtained such license.

SEC. 13. That every person, firm, company or corporation, required by this ordinance to obtain a license to engage in any trade, business or profession for which a license is required shall pay to the city treasurer the sum of money required by ordinance to be paid therefor. Thereupon, with the receipt of the city treasurer, which receipt shall set forth the kind of business for which a license is desired, they shall apply to the city recorder, who shall issue a license to the party applying in accordance with the receipt of the city treasurer, upon compliance by the applicant with the provisions of all ordinances relating to obtaining licenses for the business, trade or profession for which such license is desired.

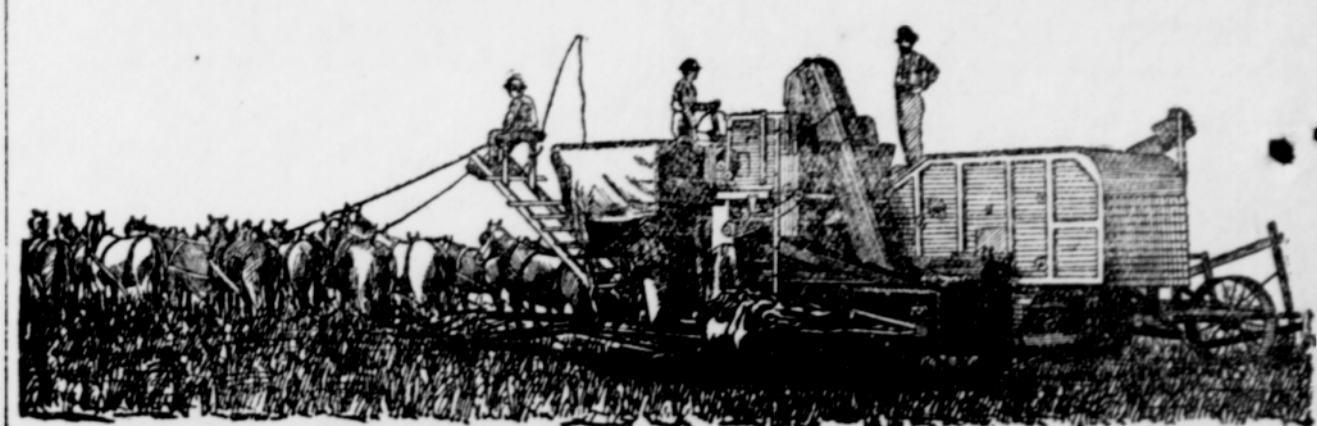
