A new National Ode, incident to the Philippine trouble; written by a Web-footer and set to music by Stadlerman, leader of the celebrated Marine Band, will be sung at a jubilee in Washington city for the first time this month. It consists of three verses and a rousing chorus and is intended to be the Dewey song of the age.

Very few people realize the magnitude of the combinations of capital commonly called trusts the past 17 months, aggregating \$1,500,000,000 since Jan. 1, 1899. During 1898 the figures were \$916,000,000. The inherent weakness and the fundamental fallacy of such schemes is being discussed now in eastern financial circles. A crash is evident—stand firm under. The cracker trust has collapsed with a margin of loss, and returns to business in the old way at the old stand—Portland included.

May 30th wheat advanced in Chicago and all along the line because of Statistician Snow's report on the winter crop conditions, which fully confirm the statement of The Observer made three weeks ago. He estimates that 2,000,000 acres have been plowed up during May, reducing the area to 24,500,000 acres—a loss of 5,500,000 acres from the area seeded last fall as estimated by the government last December. Snow also estimates that the condition has been materially reduced in all the principal winter wheat states during last month—Michigan having lost 9 points, Indiana 10, Illinois 12, Missouri 5, Kansas 6, and California full as much.

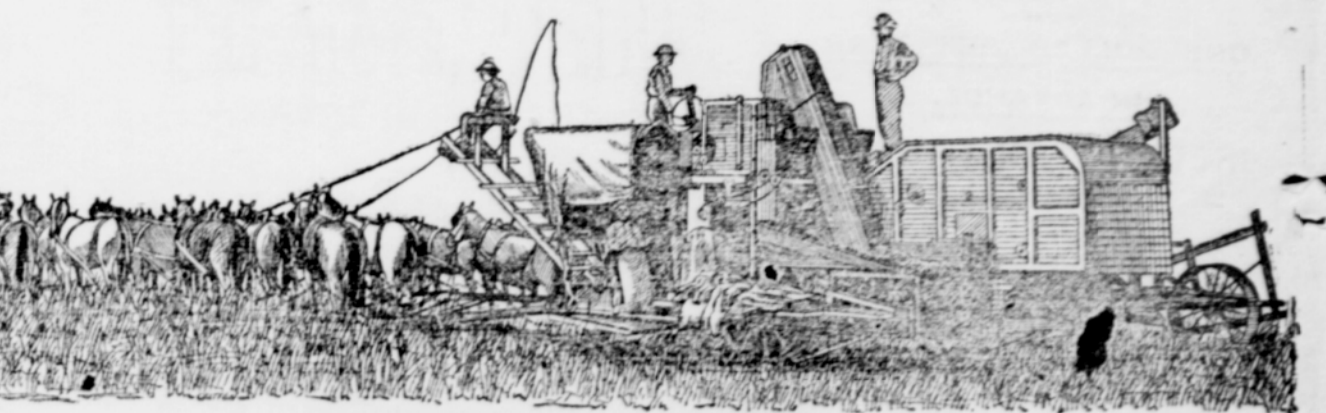
