MORO CITY COUNCIL.

ORDINANCES NOW IN FORCE. Published by Authority. [No. 13]

AN ORDINANCE entitled an Ordinance to prevent certain animals and fowls from running at large or from being herded in, or tied upon, any of the streets, alleys, uninclosed grounds or public places within the limits of the city of Moro, Or., and provided for the impounding and sale of any such animals or fowls, and for the punishment of persons found guilty of allowing such animals or fowls to run or be herded or tied thereon.

The city of Moro does ordain as follows— SECTION 1. That no horse, mule, saddle, hog, goat, chicken, turkey, goose or duck shall hereafter be allowed to run at large or be herded or tied in or upon any of the streets, alleys, uninclosed places or public grounds within the limits of the city of Moro during any of the hours of the day or night except when being driven through the city for shipment or other lawful purposes.

SEC. 2. It is hereby made the duty of the marshal, or any policeman or night watchman of the city of Moro, to take up any of the animals or fowls mentioned in section 1 of this ordinance found running at large or herded or tied within the limits of said city, or upon any of the streets, alleys, uninclosed places or public grounds therein and impound them in such place as shall be designated or provided by the city thereof.

SEC. 3. Upon taking up or impounding any animal or fowl under the provisions of this ordinance the marshal of the city of Moro shall forthwith prepare four notices which shall be substantially as follows: Notice. than five nor more than ten days, the time shall be computed by excluding the first and including the last days.

SEC. 4. Anyone having an interest in the property taken up or impounded, who shall feel himself aggrieved thereby, may at any time before the sale thereof takes place, make affidavit before the recorder of the city of Moro, setting forth his interest in such property and the facts in relation thereto as claimed by him, and have the same tried out before said recorder, and if it shall appear to said recorder that said property ought not to have been taken up or impounded the recorder shall issue an order discharging the property so taken up or impounded without charge to the claimant. If on the other hand, it shall appear to the recorder that the taking and impounding was proper and rightful, he shall dismiss the proceedings and enter up a judgment against the claimant for all cost, charges, and expense of such trial, and the same shall be paid out of the proceeds of the property taken up when sold, and if said property shall not be sufficient to pay the same the recorder shall issue an execution upon the judgment for whatever sum remains unpaid.

SEC. 5. All owners who shall pay all charges and expense shall be entitled to have their property released to them at any time before sale thereof.

SEC. 6. If the property taken up or impounded shall not be released there it shall be sold in accordance with the notice of sale, and such sale shall have the effect to vest a complete title to the property sold to the purchaser thereof.

SEC. 7. The marshal of the city of Moro shall also, forthwith, upon the sale of any property, file a certified statement with the recorder of said city, containing: 1st, A brief description of the property sold. 2d, The amount received for the same. 3d, The name or names of the purchasers thereof. 4th, An itemized statement of his own and recorder's fees and charges and expenses. 5th, The amount paid the treasurer. Which statement shall be entered in a book by the recorder kept for that purpose, and shall be at all times open for inspection by any interested parties.

SEC. 8. The proceeds of any sale which shall be made shall be paid forthwith by the marshal to the treasurer of the city of Moro, less his own fees, all costs, charges and expenses, and the fees of the recorder. The marshal shall file a receipt therefor with the recorder of the city of Moro.

SEC. 9. The marshal, beside the actual expense of feeding any animals or fowls taken up or impounded under this ordinance, shall be entitled to recover as his legal fees, the sum of one dollar per head for horses, mules, cattle; fifty cents per head for sheep, goats, geese and turkeys; fifteen cents for ducks and chickens, and ten per cent. of any sale.

SEC. 10. The recorder of the city of Moro shall receive as his legal fees under this ordinance: five cents for filing notice of sale; ten cents for filing treasurer's receipt; fifty cents for entering certified statement of the marshal, and five cents for filing the same; fifty cents for docket entries in any one case, and three dollars for hearing any contested case, to be paid by the contestant in advance.

SEC. 11. Any person or persons found guilty of violating this ordinance in any way, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than five or more than ten dollars, and shall be imprisoned in the city jail until the fine and costs be paid, not to exceed one day for each two dollars thereof.

SEC. 12. The owner or owners of any property sold under the provisions of this ordinance, at any time within one year from the date of sale upon satisfactory proof to the common council of the city of Moro, of such ownership, shall be entitled to an order on the city treasurer for the net proceeds of such sale, deposited as aforesaid.

SEC. 13. Whereas, there is urgent need of this ordinance it shall take effect and be in force from after its approval by the mayor.

[No. 14.] AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 1 and 5, of Ordinance No. 6, entitled an Ordinance regulating the fees of city officers.

The City of Moro does Ordain as follows. SECTION 1. The city recorder shall be entitled to receive for his compensation the following fees to-wit: For issuing warrant or other writ..... 50 For issuing subpoena..... 25 For taking bond, recognition or other undertaking..... 50 For entering cause on docket..... 25 For entering judgment when tried by jury..... 1 00 For entering judgment when tried by court..... 50 For entering discontinuance or satisfaction..... 50 For entering appeal to circuit court..... 1 00 For swearing witness or juror..... 10 For taking affidavit..... 25 For taking acknowledgment of deed or other instrument..... 50 For making a copy of any proceeding or trial, per folio..... 15 For making exhibits of the receipts and disbursements of the city, per folio..... 10 For making each order on the city treasurer..... 05 For making out an appeal, by order of the council..... 50 For making each receipt..... 25 For issuing any license..... 50 For entering grant of license on record..... 10 For filing any paper required to be filed..... 05 For copying any ordinance, per folio..... 05 For making any notice and posting the same..... 25 For each certificate of election..... 10 For attending council meeting and keeping minutes..... 25 For keeping the books of recorder, per month..... 2 00

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the recorder to keep in a well bound book, kept for that purpose, a record of all the dog licenses issued by him together with the name of the person taking out license, the date, No., and date when license expires.

SEC. 3. Whereas, there is urgent need of this ordinance it shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

[No. 15.] AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 1, 2, and 5, of Ordinance No. 8, entitled an Ordinance relating to taxing dogs and regulating their running at large.

The City of Moro does ordain as follows— SECTION 1. Every person owning or keeping within the city of Moro, any dog or dogs, shall pay a yearly tax of \$2.00 on each dog so owned or kept.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the recorder to keep in a well bound book, kept for that purpose, a record of all the dog licenses issued by him together with the name of the person taking out license, the date, No., and date when license expires.

SEC. 3. Whereas, there is urgent need of this ordinance, it shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

AN ORDINANCE entitled an Ordinance regulating and providing for the establishment and alteration of grades; the improvement of streets and alleys; the construction, improvement, maintenance and repair of sidewalks, footways and pavements, and providing for the payment of the cost thereof.

The City of Moro does ordain as follows— SECTION 1. Whenever the council shall deem it necessary or expedient to establish or alter the grade, or to improve any street or part thereof or any alley, sidewalk, footway or pavement now or that may hereafter be laid out, established, built or constructed within the corporate limits of the city of Moro, it shall cause said work to be done, and shall determine and provide for everything convenient and necessary concerning such work and improvement and the cost and expense thereof, as hereinafter provided. The power and authority to improve a street includes the power and authority to improve sidewalks and pavements.

SEC. 2. Whenever the council shall determine upon making any of the alterations or improvements, or any public work enumerated or contemplated in the foregoing section, it shall, except as herein otherwise provided, cause not less than seven days notice thereof to be first given by at least one publication in a newspaper published in the city of Moro, or by posting such notices for a like period in three public places within said city.

SEC. 3. Such notice must be given by the recorder, by order of the council, and must specify with convenient certainty the streets, or part thereof, proposed to be improved, or of which the grade is proposed to be established or altered, and the kind of improvement which is proposed to be made.

SEC. 4. The council, at its earliest convenience thereafter, and within six months from the final publication of such notice, may by ordinance est-

ablish the proposed grade or alteration thereof as set forth in the notice, or may commence to make the proposed improvements as hereinafter provided. Two or more streets, being practically extensions of each other, or running in the same general direction, and being in effect an extension of such street, and accommodating the same line of travel, shall be for the purpose of this ordinance construed to be one street.

SEC. 5. In case the notice be for the improvement of a street, or part thereof, or any alley, footway, sidewalk or pavement, the council shall proceed to ascertain and determine the probable cost of making such improvement, and shall assess upon each lot, tract, or part thereof, liable for its proportionate share of such costs, as hereinafter in the next section provided.

SEC. 6. Each lot, tract or part thereof, within the limits of a proposed improvement, as defined in the foregoing section, shall be liable for the full cost of making the same upon the half of the street in front of and abutting upon it. But when the land adjacent to said street, alley, footway, sidewalk or pavement to be improved, shall not be laid off into blocks, then the cost of improvement shall be assessed to the owner or owners of the tract of land lying within one hundred feet of such improvement, but the intersection of all streets shall be improved at the expense of the city.

SEC. 7. When the probable cost of improvement has been ascertained and determined, and the proportionate share thereof assessed against each lot, tract or part thereof, as provided in section 6, the council must declare the same by ordinance, and direct the recorder to enter a statement thereof in the docket of city liens, as hereinafter, in the next section provided.

SEC. 8. The docket of city liens is a book in which must be entered, in pursuance of the preceding section, the following matter in relation to assessments for the improvement of streets:

1. The number or the letter of lot assessed, and true description of the lot assessed, and if a separate assessment is made upon a part of a lot or tract, a particular designation of such part. 2. The name of the owner thereof or that the owner is unknown. 3. The sum assessed upon such lot or tract or part thereof, and the date of entry. Provided, that a failure to enter the name of the owner thereof, or a mistake in the name of the owner in such entry, or the entry of a name other than that of the true owner in such lien docket, shall not render void nor vitiate such assessment, nor in any way affect the lien of the city on the property described in such lien docket, if such property is correctly entered and described.

To be continued. Epworth League Convention. The 6th annual convention of the Dalles District League convened in Moro M. E. Church on the 9th. The convention was opened by devotional services conducted by Rev. N. Evans. At 9 a.m. the business session was called to order by President Evans. During the morning session the following subjects were presented and discussed: "How may the League help or hinder the Pastor?" by Miss Teresa Fletcher, of Heppner. An address, "How may the Pastor help or hinder the League?" by Rev. J. H. Wood of the Dalles, which was followed by reports of District officers, showing a large advance in League work over the preceding year, and an increase of 70 per cent in membership. During the afternoon session the subjects, "How the Literary department may be made effective," "The Power of Social Nature, and how to apply it," and "What can the Juniors do?" were presented by Rev. "My Brother in Need, how can I help him," by Miss Collins of the Dalles. "Our duty to Missions," written by Mrs. Robert Warner and read by Miss Randall. "Christian Citizenship," by Golden-dale chapter, read by Mrs. N. Evans. All subjects were handled with a mastery of composition and argument which shows that the authors well understood the subject which they offered for consideration. At the business session Rev. N. Evans was unanimously elected to represent the Dalles District League at the International convention to be held in Indianapolis this year. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Rev. N. Evans; Goldendale; 1st Vice President, Grove Smith, Yakima, W.; 2d, Miss Lillian Bisby, Heppner; 3d, Mrs. C. D. Nickelsen, Moro; 4th, Mr. Tusley, N. Yakima; Secretary and Treasurer, Miss Mable Riddell, the Dalles; Musical Director, John Parrott, the Dalles; Organist, Miss Edyth Randall.

The following resolutions were adopted by unanimous vote of the League: Whereas, Having thoroughly enjoyed this Epworth League convention, and believing that we as Epworth Leaguers have received spir-

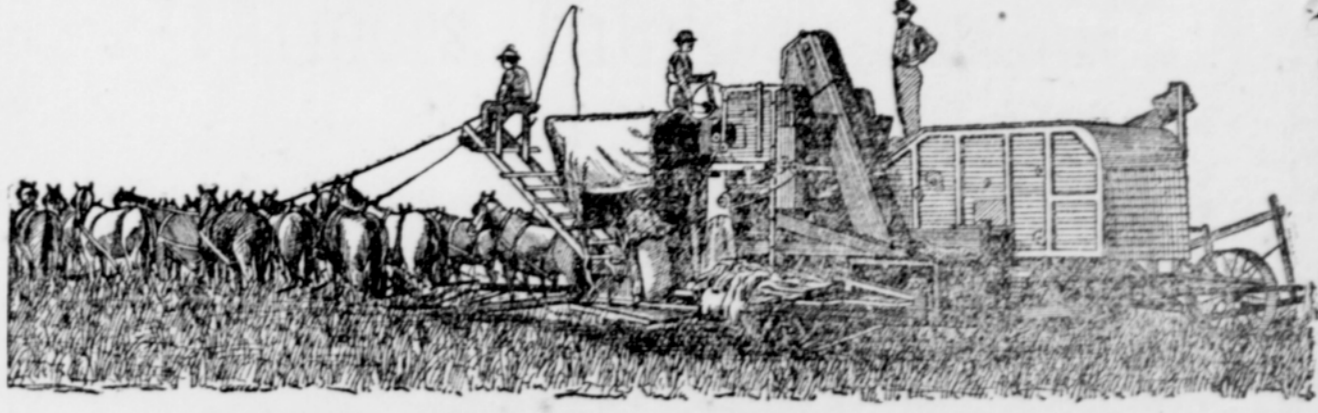
