Mr. Sutton's Temperance Work. Rev. E. B. Sutton, the old prohibition war horse of the Nation, in an interview tells of some strange experiences during his 25 years of platform work. He took the field as a reformer, he said in reply to the question how came you to, "because I saw that this government could not exist 50 years longer half drunk and half sober."

What was your first line of action in the field work? The Red Ribbon movement in Michigan first. Then active Good Templar work. Have been a Good Templar over 30 years. Then the straight-out prohibition party work, beginning with 1880. For 6 years general agent of the Michigan state temperance alliance with Samuel Dickie as its president most of the time until he became national chairman of the prohibition party. I gave 4000 public addresses in Michigan and presided in living, although laid up for several weeks. My little daughter Maggie, who for five years traveled with me, at another time, grievously hammered and bruised and her clothing ruined, while I was laid up for repairs for another week. All this goes with a reform movement of a moral character. It is only a part of the price we have to pay for the privilege of trying to help and benefit our fellow man. Patience in the midst of ill treatment and disrespect in the midst of bitterness, has at last won the fight and now admit the necessity of prohibition. All temperance movements today are making prohibition their rallying cry.

What is the Inter-State Temperance Alliance? It is on a large scale just what the State Temperance Alliance of Michigan and Washington was, on a small scale, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Utah and Montana have united in an educational movement to compel the attention of the nation to this subject. It does not antagonize the prohibition party in any possible sense. We co-operate. Indeed, the two are one in all things except in name. The party names its candidates and we work with them through the campaign. At the close of the campaign we keep right on hammering away with good educational truths. Parties and state central committees take a vacation between campaigns. We found that the saloon men take no vacations and as an effect organized a capital stock company, on a financial basis, with shares of stock at \$1000 each, the money to be paid in ten equal payments, to be used in keeping the platform work year by year, until we succeed.

Our incorporation does business in a business way—with president, secretary, treasurer and board of directors elected by the stockholders at the annual meeting. Our president for this year is Rev. W. J. Moore, president of Idaho College, one of the best educators on the Pacific slope. We set every man and woman at work that we can, and who will take the field, guarantee them their expenses and give them the collections. Our plans for the future are eternal hammering away at the saloon, until the saloon is a thing of the past, until they withdraw voters of this country, and become as faithful servants of God politically as they are in any other way, so it may no longer be truthfully said, after an election: They were both run votes; And sanctified the license plan; But one was cast by a cunning old brewer; And one by a Sunday School man.
