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THE MARKETS.

Wheat Closes a Shade Higher Good Cash Demand for Corn.
Chicago, Aug. 5.-Following is a review of yesterday's grain markets: The Liverpool market was the guiding star of wheat traders today. A real surprise came from the English market, quotations there being about 1/4 higher, a condition not looked for in view of the decline here yesterday. This was afterward explained on the ground of advanced ocean freight rates, but it had its effect on opening prices here, September starting at 69 5/8, an advance of 1/8. A momentary dip to 69 1/2 followed, but good buying by shorts mostly local, resulted in a gradual advance to 69 7/8, the highest point reached during the session. Besides the strength shown by Liverpool, prospective buyers were encouraged by continued crop damage in the Northwest and by Snow's crop summary which made the condition of spring wheat 85, or 5 points less than July 1. This indicated a total crop of about 275,000,000 bushels, but interest in the market was not high. The cash demand was almost nothing here, and only a moderate demand was reported from the seaboard. The Northwest, however, was a seller in this market, reported the flour trade quiet and the first rush of winter wheat apparently over. The buying demand thus dwindled to almost nothing during the middle of the session and attempts to realize an earlier profit were abandoned. September slowly declined to 69 to 69 1/8 and, around about that price until about noon, when a sharp advance was made, and some one life wheat and resulted in a steady advance which closed at 69 5/8 to 69 7/8, and closed at 69 5/8, a net advance of 1/8.

Corn was fairly active. At the opening the market was firm and higher on continued hot weather damage reports. The cash demand was excellent. Near the close the shorts went to cover, and the market closed up rapidly. September closed with a net gain of 1-8 to 1/4.

Oats were quiet and fairly steady, with a shade higher. Provisions were strong and active. The yellow fever situation was mostly favorable, but the market was not so much advanced in hog prices. Buying of all products was general and prices advanced steadily, the close being 1/4 to 1/2 higher.

ARMSTRONG EXTRADITION CASE.
Strong Fight Being Made in the Habeas Corpus Proceedings.

Seattle, Aug. 5.-A hearing on the application for a writ of habeas corpus for William Armstrong, of Chicago, charged with the murder of a woman, was begun in the superior court today. No decision was reached, and the hearing was adjourned. Armstrong's attorneys had made a main argument for his release on the contention that the offense with which he was charged was not a felony under the laws of Illinois. They claimed that the record did not show that the lieutenant-governor of Illinois had authorized the extradition of Armstrong, and that the demand for Armstrong's extradition in the absence of the governor from the state. They went further and asserted that under the federal law no state has authority to delegate any such power to any other person. He was an inmate of the jail at that time.

THOMAS DENIES IT.
Says He Was Not Responsible for Yellow Fever at Hampton.

Seattle, Aug. 5.-William Thomas, of Columbia City, Wash., who it was stated in yesterday's dispatches was sent to Hampton today, said today that there was no foundation for the statement that he was an inmate of the jail for a while as represented, but was not sick while there, neither has he any symptoms of yellow fever, or any other kind of fever, returning from Hampton. He further said that the transport on which he returned had no other cases.

Admiral Dewey at Naples.
Naples, Aug. 5.-Admiral Dewey, who arrived today on the flagship Olympia, was visited by United States Consul General Castro, members of the American embassy. The Olympia will probably remain in this port for a month.

The Admiral Commanding this Station.
The commander of the garrison and the prefect visited Dewey today. The American admiral returned to the visit. Dewey and the crew in the Olympia are all in good health. It is now said the cruiser will only remain here eight or ten days.

Street Car Tracks Torn Up.
Portland, Me., Aug. 5.-The tracks of the Silvan street railway company on Saginaw street were torn up early today by a gang of men, understood to have been employed by Alder. The men and other citizens. Soon after 1 a. m. the people were called out by continued blowing of steam whistles. The cause of the indignation against the company is the fact that the company opposes paving the street and is enjoying the city from proceeding through it.

Trial of the Spanish Generals.
Madrid, Aug. 5.-The supreme council deliberated today over judgment in regard to the surrender of Santiago to the American troops. It is expected the council will be acquitted. It is said the public prosecutor submitted a report demanding that the rebels be hanged if imposed on the Spanish officers responsible for the surrender of Manila.

The Yaqui Insurrection.
Chicago, Aug. 5.-A special to the Tribune from the City of Mexico, says: The Yaqui Indians, who number about 3000 or 4000 men, their temporary success has encouraged the Indians from all along the Yaqui river to back to the stronghold in the mountains. The government has decided to reinforce General Torres.

Five Drowned at Baltimore.
Baltimore, Aug. 5.-Five persons were drowned this morning by the capsizing of a row boat in Hatapoer river.

ALASKA BOUNDARY LINE.
United States Has Had Surveys at Work for Two Years.

Seattle, Aug. 4.-According to the statement of Philip Sheridan, formerly crown prosecutor at Dawson, the United States has had surveys at work the last two years on the Alaskan boundary line. He said:

"I came out from Dawson with a man named James Haines, or Hayes, who for two years has been working a survey extending from the southern boundary of Alaska to the Yukon river, and I have every reason to believe that his work was done under the direction of the United States government. I learned from him that he was a topographical survey of the line in question and that he came out on the Yukon at Fort Cudahy. He is an Easterner and his home being at Harlem, N. Y."

Session of the Synod and Revival Meeting.
Seattle, Aug. 4.-A novel excursion to Alaska left here today on the steamer City of Seattle. It consisted of about 300 persons, including the Protestant synod of Washington. The annual session of the synod will be held aboard the steamer during the trip. The action was suggested by literary and musical entertainments held in the cities on the Alaskan coast.

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Two Deaths Reported but the Epidemic at Standstill.

Newport News, Aug. 4.-Two deaths, but no new cases, of yellow fever, reported from the soldiers' home today. Governor Woodfine claims one of the deaths was a consumption.

Chamberlain's proposal for a joint inquiry as to the effect of the new franchise proposal to the Transvaal government was only presented yesterday, and the cabinet government is still considering its acceptance.

Invoked the Curse of God.
St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 4.-A special to the Post-Dispatch from Van Buren, Ark., says: John Maxwell, a negro rapist, was hanged this morning. He maintained his innocence and on the balcony invoked the curse of God upon the people of Van Buren for the injustice done him.

A Lynching Crowd Felled.
Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 4.-John Thomas, a negro charged with attempting to assault, was surrounded last night by a lynching crowd and wounded during a running fight. He finally managed to escape. He wounded several of his pursuers.

Negro Murderers Hanged.
Chicago, Aug. 4.-James Phelps and Sam Bailey, negroes, were hanged in the county jail this morning. Phelps killed a policeman and Bailey took the life of a companion in a quarrel over cards.

Wife Murder and Suicide.
Cleveland, Aug. 4.-John Schlehner shot his wife four times this afternoon at the Woodland hotel and then sent a letter to his mother, a negro woman. The tragedy was prompted by jealousy.

Reported for Duty.
Portland, Aug. 4.-Captains Breeze and Prescott, recently appointed from Second Oregon regiment and assigned to the Thirty-fifth Infantry, have reported for duty at Vancouver barracks.

A Triple Murderer Hanged.
New York, Aug. 4.-Frank Naska, an Italian, was hanged at St. John, La., today. Naska killed three people and wounded two others three years ago.

THE COPPER RIVER TRAIL.

Being Opened Up by Soldiers to the Tanana Country.

MINERS ARE LEAVING COOK INLET
Government Giving Employment to Impoverished Miners - Scoury Sick Are Being Sent Out Free.

Seattle, Aug. 4.-C. F. Perolat, a late arrival from Copper River and Cook Inlet, Alaska, reports that on last Saturday the steamer Dora arrived at Juneau with a large number of sick and impoverished miners from Copper River.

"The trail from Valdez to Copper River," said Perolat, has been completed and the old trail over the glacier abandoned. To all impoverished miners in this district, the government is giving employment at \$10 a month and board until enough has been earned to pay for a second-class passage home. A large number of miners are being sent out free. In the early part of July four bodies were found in the snow on the trail. They had come down the river with the broken ice, but were so badly decomposed that identification was impossible. In June last a man and woman who hailed from Denver were drowned in the Koyuk while boating. The body of the woman was recovered later and \$700 in gold taken from her clothing. The man's body was not found. The man was Tangley. Miners are leaving Cook Inlet on every boat and few now remain in the interior."

Captain Abercrombie, who with a detachment of soldiers is driving a trail up the Copper river to the Tanana country, will have opened about 100 miles by the time the season closes.

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
