The Dalles, Oregon.

Chronicle, 18th: Paul F. Mohr, Wm. Harris, Oscar Huber, and Engineer Strack, of the Central Navigation and Construction Company, spent last evening and this morning in the Dalles. Last night they were entertained at the Commercial Club, meeting many of our business men. Senator Turner, the leading financier of the company, and Mr. Evans, who were expected, failed to arrive. Mr. Turner, however, will be here some time next week. The engineer has completed his survey, and so far as can be learned the object of this visit is to determine whether or not the heavy work at the portage will be begun at once, which will probably be decided after Mr. Turner's visit. The company is said to be in sympathy with the Dalles and seems to be willing to do their part toward making this their terminus—if the Dalles people are enough interested to do their part. The river will be triangulated to determine about what the cost of bridging it would be, and then the matter can be considered by the Dalles people.
