Yancy's teams made a grand display when they pulled away from the Higginbotham warehouse in More Saturday for Prineville, loaded with boiler, engine, etc., for H.V. Gates. The loads filled five wagons, drawn by two teams of eight and 10 horses each, and weighed 30,000 lbs. The Higginbotham Co. has three more car loads to forward. This machinery, says the Hillsboro Independent, has been assembled from shops far apart. The boiler and engine from Portland pipes from Pittsburg and the pump from Massachusetts. The engine is a high speed machine and it is found that the Portland shops can more than compete with the east for that class of machinery. The big Corliss engines are not made here yet, but in practice it is found that those slow acting engines are not as good for driving dynamos as the high speeds.

THE DALLES, OREGON.

Discussing the present situation of affairs in the Dalles if our friends will permit the suggestion—it is not the question whether the Construction Company "is in sympathy with the Dalles," so much as, "when will the Dalles get into sympathy" with itself? The visit of Henry Villard and family to the Dalles recently caused many old residents to reflect on "what might have been" had Mr. Villard been permitted to do for the Dalles what he wished to do, 16 years ago—when he was the moving spirit in both the ORN and the NPRCOS. It was his ambition to locate all the shops for the western division of both systems in the Dalles, but he was not permitted to do so. Why? The city was not in "sympathy" with itself.

As a result, after Mr. Villard was downed, in the house of his friends, the shops that were in the Dalles were taken away and the place lost an enterprise that would have made the Dalles by this time the first city in the state in point of population and business. There can be no doubt whatever about that. Mr. Villard in his palmy days was the most enterprising and far seeing railroad builder of the age. In the construction of the NPRy he foresaw exactly what the present management have just begun to realize. That the key to the Pacific Northwest trade is the gravity haul down the Columbia river to tidewater.

Had those who superseded Mr. Villard in the management of the NPRy realized that fact, and retained control of the ORNRY, they'd not have been compelled to make the sacrifices they just have made, in the fight for trackage which ended on the 7th so gloriously for the old rival. But the Dalles gains nothing by the recent compromise, and if the city expects ever to recover from past follies, now is the time to do so. Not by waiting to ascertain whether Messrs. Turner, Mohr and others are in "sympathy" with the Dalles—but by sensible work, tending to show to the people of the waiting empire that the Dalles is worthy of the co-operation of interior forces in the greatest of all plans to develop this marvelous region for the good of all.

Portland exposition opens September 28th.

"WHOM THE GODS HELP."

Dalles T. M.: Some people in the upper country evidently have not implicit confidence in the saying that "the Gods help those who help themselves," else they would not wait for congress to appropriate money with which to improve the dalles of the Columbia river, but would go to work and do it themselves. They want the river opened to navigation—and want it bad. But are not taking hold of the proposition in a way that will insure speedy action.

There is a movement on foot to build a portage railway around the dalles of the Columbia, the Central Construction and Navigation Company having completed a survey for the proposed road. But should this fail, our friends should not wait for congress to move in the matter. If they want their grain carried to tidewater at the minimum cost they should follow the example set by the Dalles recently, and not wait for the general government to come to their relief.

CALLED UP A TIDAL WAVE.

As showing the marvels of what is called sound it is related that on a recent visit of the steamship Topeka to Muir glacier, giving its tourists an opportunity to view this greatest of all world-wide wonders, the vessel approached rather close to its face. At the time of starting away the whistle was blown as a farewell signal, and instantly the ice-berg broke off with a mighty roar, surpassing that of thunder tenfold, and a mountain of ice, jarred loose by the sound, broke loose from the face of the glacier and with tremendous force rushed into the sea, preceded by a wave fully 100 feet high, almost directly in the wake of the steamer. The vessel was well under way, and quick and dexterous management took her out of reach of danger, though none too soon, for the swell, caused by the mighty wave, broke over the stern of the ship.

Dr. E. H. Marshall, of Boise, Idaho, says that in the vicinity of Boise there is a source of subterranean hot water which is being used to heat that city, and with excellent results. The water was discovered about six years ago, and when first tapped gushed to a height of 50 feet and almost scalded to death the workmen who were boring an artesian well. The water was found at a depth of about 400 feet, and has natural pressure enough to raise it to the top floors of ordinary buildings, whence it will flow down through coils of radiators, heating the whole building. The water is said to have a temperature of 170 degrees Fahrenheit, and a company has been formed for piping the streets and applying the hot water for heating purposes. It is claimed that a saving of 50 per cent. can be effected over the ordinary method of heating. There is a large area of ground near the city where the hot water spouts above the surface when tapped, and a number of well drillers are at work endeavoring to enlarge the area—Butte Inter-Mountain.

The Indians on the Shoshone reservation have to the present time this season sown 125,000 pounds of grain, and it is expected they will sow as much more before the close of the planting season. The department is not giving the seed to the Indians this year as heretofore, but is loaning it, and expects the Indians to repay it when they harvest their crops. The pupils of the Indian school are farming extensively under the direction of the Indian agent, Capt. Wilson, and the teachers of the school. They have put out 12,000 cabbage plants, and have a model garden. A test will be made on the farm with a new beet seed, the department having furnished a large quantity for experiment. Under the present management of Indian affairs the Indians of the Shoshone reservation are improving rapidly in condition, and the majority of the tribe will soon become self-supporting. Great interest is being taken by the Indians in school work, and the agency school is having a very successful term.—Omaha Dec.

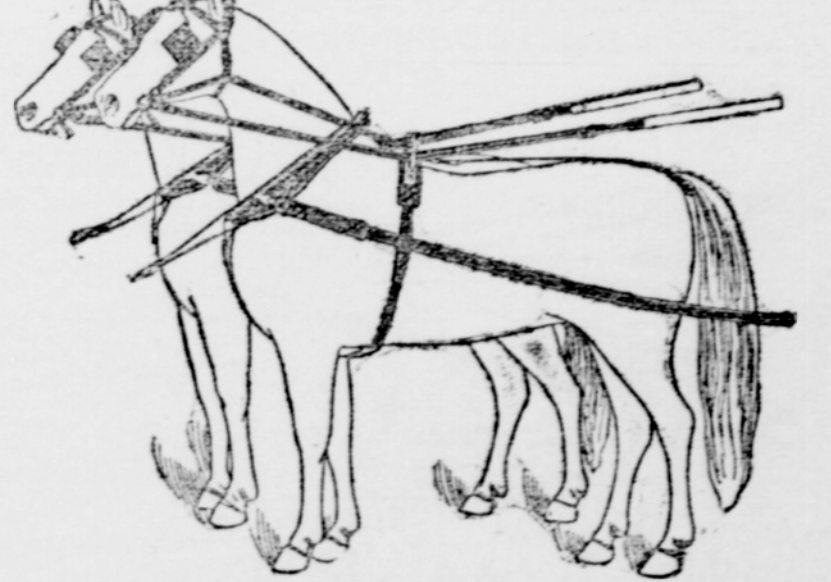
