To kill lice use coal oil and crude carbolic acid, using about three times as much coal oil as of the carbolic acid; applying it to roosts and dropping boards, of poultry houses once every two weeks, and for keeping flies of cows use this mixture, adding double its quantity of raw linseed oil, and apply with a cheap tin sprayer, that throws only a mist, just before you milk, which makes cows perfectly quiet while milking, kills quite a lot of flies and adds much to the comfort of the cows during part of the day.

Among those with whom we have chatted this week were Mr. Lynch of Bigelow, who credits his 15-year old son, Warren DeWitt, with being the champion header-box filler; and J.F. Belshe who believes that he had the smartest girls in cook houses in the county, Miss Estella, his own daughter, Miss Jessie Thompson, and Miss Alma Newton, the latter for a short time took Miss Jessies place to close the work on account of a felon which compelled her to quit. There were from 30 to 32 men to cook for, three header crews and a threshing crew, and during the run of four weeks meals were properly served and on time.

### The Wood Proposition.

Union Warehouse Company Supplying all Customers at Actual Cost—Storage Rates Discounted.

R. C. Atwood, Manager of the Union Warehouse Co. in Sherman county, was in Moro on the 18th, and informed us that the company have lately enabled it to supply its customers—that is, Farmers who haul to the Union Warehouses—with their winter supply of wood at lower rates than were ever before quoted for wood in Sherman county. This deal enables the company to deliver wood at Hay Canyon or Demoss to patrons of the Union warehouses at \$4.50 per cord and at the Moro Union warehouse at \$5.00 per cord. Outside parties will be supplied at Hay Canyon or Demoss at \$5.00 per cord, or at \$5.50 per cord in Moro.

This offer is of course limited to the fall wheat hauling season. The company is not making a cent for itself in the transaction—but its aim is to accommodate patrons of the Union Warehouses.

During the discussion, concerning rates, Mr. Atwood stated that the Union Warehouse charges are but 50 cents per ton "from the time of delivery of this season's wheat until time for receiving the next year's crop—or until the wheat is sold or removed, at any of our warehouses in Sherman county."

Furthermore, said Mr. Atwood, we give the farmers the privilege of storing their grain in sacks without weighing or grading it if they wish to do so, piling it in lots separate and apart from other lots, and weigh it out to them in the identical sacks when sold or shipped, thus giving the farmer the full benefit of the increase in weight. We do this at any of our warehouses in the county, added Mr. Atwood, excepting Biggs and Rufus, barred on account of the sand which is there.
