THE BRITISH LOST HEAVILY

Complete Victory at Glencoe, But Very

Dearlly Bought.

FIVE OFFICERS AND 31 MEN KILLED

Among the Wounded Are Twenty Officers and

151 Men—British Displayed Remarkable Bravery.

London, Oct. 21.—The war office has announced that in the fighting yesterday between Glencoe and Dundee, thirty-one non-combatants and five men were killed and 151 wounded.

Many Officers Killed.

London, Oct. 21.—In the battle between Glencoe and Dundee yesterday, one colonel, three captains and five British lieutenants were killed, and one general, one colonel, three majors, six captains and nine lieutenants were wounded. General Symon's wounds are considered mortal.

The list of officers killed and wounded shows that while the British victory was complete, the heavy loss among officers was due to their valiant conduct in attacking the traditions of the British army and refusing to use the cover of which the men availed themselves during the storming of the British positions.

Basutos Loyal to the Queen.

London, Oct. 21.—A dispatch from Cape Town says the paramount chief of the Basutos has asked permission to assemble other chiefs with a view of visiting them to pledge loyalty to the queen. Consequently Orange Free State burghers near Basuto border are in a state of consternation.

Guards Received an Ovation.

London, Oct. 21.—London gave the guards a grand farewell today on their departure for the Cape. Three battalions, the first, second, and third Grenadiers, left. Along the whole route from the barracks to the railway station, the troops received an ovation. Before many yards were covered the wives and sweethearts of the soldiers broke into the ranks, linking arms with the troops, who were carried along in the singing song to the station.

General Symon's Promoted.

London, Oct. 21.—The war office announces that the queen approves the promotion of General Symon to be major general, superseding the late Sir John Buller.

General Miles Coming West.

Washington, Oct. 21.—General Miles leaves today for the west coast in expectation. He will go as far west as Seattle and Portland.

Quinine for Soldiers.

The Medical News tells that more than 125,000,000 grains of quinine have been taken by United States soldiers during the past year. It is said that some of the military hospitals in Cuba and Puerto Rico took as much as 300 grains a week on several weeks. Hardly any of those who were in service in the West India islands failed to take some quinine during their stay. A military correspondent writing from Puerto Rico recently said that practically none of the soldiers had been entirely exempt from malarial disturbances, and that island the epidemic of the malaria was usually not severe it was very obstinate.

Killed a Sheep.

A band of sheep belonging to Peter M. Stank was raised a few nights ago, and a number of animals stolen. The thieves appeared in the morning, which was on the bank of the Columbia river, near Stevenson, in small boats, and after driving the band of sheep to a corner of the pasture, they upon them with clubs, killing five and wounding many more. Taking two of the carcasses, they rowed away, leaving behind them a trackless trail.

A Novel Idea.

The New York Sun prints a story from Birmingham, how the lads and sharp scraps of iron in cinder paths were removed. A member of the state life pack commission tried to remedy the difficulty for the sake of bicyclists. A squad of men was set to work with magnifying glasses and in a day they found nine small tacks. THE SOUTH AFRICAN TROUBLE.

Persistent Rumors of Heavy Boer Losses at Mafeking.

Cape Town, Oct. 19.—A dispatch to the Cape Argus relating the statement of the British commander at Mafeking, Colonel Buller, has been received. Colonel Buller reported a loss of 300 men.

Complaints of Boer Outrages upon natives continue to arrive. These serve further to inflame the Boers and Zulus. Yesterday 150 Boers from Johannesburg arrived at Berridge, and the Boers have been reported to have killed and robbed and

Boers Shelling Dundee.

Lady Smith, Oct. 20.—An unconfirmed report is received that Boer artillery is shelling Dundee.

Advancing on Hattingspruit.

London, Oct. 20.—The war office has received a dispatch from Lady Smith, dated at 10:45 a. m. today.

The following advice from Glencoe are at hand: King's royal rifle and Dublin fusiliers are in the hands of the Boers. They are occupying the position and are advancing under cover of artillery at 2000 yards range. Reports from 9000 Boers advancing on Hattingspruit.

The Fifteenth battery and Leicester regiment have gone to meet them.

The Boer Position Captured.

London, Oct. 20.—A dispatch dated at Glencoe at 6:25 this morning announced that the Boer position was captured after heavy fighting. The British force has received a report that General Symon was wounded at Glencoe.

General Symon's Wounded.

London, Oct. 20.—This has been received from the war office:

"We were attacked this morning by a force roughly estimated at four thousand. Their artillery did no damage. After the position of the enemy had been shelled our infantry advanced to the attack and after hard fighting lasting until 1:30 p. m. the almost inaccessible position was taken, the enemy retiring eastwards. All the Boers were captured. General Symon was severely wounded. Our losses are heavy."

Falling Back on Lady Smith.

Lady Smith, Oct. 20.—Carbuncles and Borden mounted rifles who have been in action with the enemy nearly all day, returned this evening, falling back fighting in the face of 2000 Boers.

THE CUP REMAINS HERE

Columbia Made It Three Straight Over

Lipton's Shamrock.

TODAY'S RACE A MAGNIFICENT ONE

A Good Strong Breeze Favored the Yachts and

at the Finish They Were Less Than Five Minutes Apart.

New York, Oct. 20.—The conditions of wind and weather today were

encouraging to the sailing of the international yacht race. The wind at 9 o'clock was splendid, blowing fully 15 miles. It was half past 9 o'clock when the yachts appeared, jumping along under a spanking breeze toward the starboard tack, and the Shamrock pushed her nose through the foam as if the breeze had been made expressly for her. The Columbia sat up straighter and looked a stride more dignified. At 10:45 when the preparatory gun was fired, the Columbia was shooting up to the windward starting line on the starboard tack, and the Shamrock was half a mile south of the flagpole. Both boats broke their forestay sails when the starting gun was fired at 10:55.

The Shamrock's skippers did not wait for the American boat but tore across the line at 11:00:34, her crew hauling the spinnaker out to the end of the pole as she went over. Barr put the helm up and the American yacht swept across the line at 11:01:35. It was a grand start.

Details of the Race.

New York, Oct. 20.—In a strong breeze today, the Columbia beat the challenging yacht Shamrock, in the third of the international series of races for the America's cup, and the cup remains in the United States.

The American boat won by a large margin over the challenger. The Shamrock was a beautiful one, and the race was a battle royal.

The Shamrock made good use of her spinnaker and was many half lengths ahead before the defender got over the line. She seemed to improve the lead for a time, but when the defender's spinnaker began to draw properly the latter showed her superiority. The challenger. When the outer mark was reached the American was in a better position. Three times she tried to pass the Shamrock and a thousand spectators watched with intense excitement the keenest contest of the season.

Gradually she dug her nose in, and when they rounded the mark the Columbia was in the lead. In the last lap the Shamrock showed her superiority again and showed superiority in windward work. She pointed higher, footed faster and carried herself better than the Shamrock, and they increased to her lead all the way and she was something like a mile ahead when she crossed the finish line.

New York, Oct. 20.—The starting gun was fired at 11 o'clock, and the Shamrock was in the lead.

At 11:50 the boats had covered the seven miles run to the outer mark, and the Shamrock was 300 yards ahead. The wind is blowing 18 miles an hour, and the race is a magnificent one.

12:12 p. m.—While passing Deal beach at 12:35 the observer telegraphed that the Shamrock was only leading the Columbia by 2 1/2 miles. They were half a mile from the stake boat, and the wind is fresh from the north.

Asbury Park now reports the Columbia leading.

The Columbia turned the outer mark at 12:18, the Shamrock at 12:19. At 12:53 p. m. the Columbia is increasing her lead, but the Shamrock is making a great fight.

1:37 p. m.—The Columbia appears from the highlands to have a lead of almost a mile.

The Columbia crossed the finish line at 2:40:30; the Shamrock at 2:45:25.

BOERS ATTACK GLENCOE.

Repulsed by the British and Their Guns Captured.

Cape Town, Oct. 20.—Glencoe camp has been attacked by a great force of Boers who posted guns on the hill and opened fire on the camp. The battle is now general.

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THE SOUTH AFRICAN WAR

Unrest Spreading Among the Tribesmen

in Zulu Land.

BOERS CLOSING IN ON MAFKING

A Transvaal Paper Claims that Success So Far

Has Everywhere Attended the Burghers—Kruger Refuses an Offer.

London, Oct. 18.—According to a dispatch from Durban the Zulus are arming. Chief Dinizulu says he is unable to resist the British, but expects they will be joined by the Swazis. The Boers, according to a dispatch from Pretoria, repulsed a small force of mounted police near Benkesies, west of Cape Colony, capturing two

Seized the Telephone.

Cape Town, Oct. 18.—The Boers seized the telephone at Maseru river last evening and attempted to speak with Kimberley, hoping to learn the disposition of the British forces there. The maneuver was discovered and frustrated.

Kruger Refused the Offer.

London, Oct. 18.—According to a dispatch from Pretoria, the Transvaal government received an offer from a wealthy European recently to supply a fleet of completely equipped torpedo boats for the purpose of blowing up the British transports arriving from South African waters. The offer was

curtly rejected. President Kruger refusing even to consider it. The original offer of the scheme, which had been put forward only 24 hours, left immediately.

Unrest Among Tribesmen.

London, Oct. 18.—Up to noon no confirmation has been received of the report of serious losses at Mafeking. A new and serious element in the military situation is the rising of the warlike tribes of Basutos. The British must keep the Basutos quiet and the paramount chief, Lesotho, thus far has behaved well. The Boers were repulsed at Mafeking, but the Boers are closing in on Mafeking and to destroy the railroad and south of the city.

General Joubert at Newcastle.

Pretoria, Oct. 17.—(Delayed in transmission.)—Commander General Joubert has arrived at Newcastle. He found only a hundred men there when he entered the town.

Boers Buying Up Provisions.

Lorenzo Marques, Oct. 18.—A representative of the Transvaal government here is buying up all the provisions obtainable. The Volkskete, Boer official organ at Pretoria, says that "success thus far has been attended by the burghers," although in skirmishes near Mafeking and other points Boer casualties number 60 or 70 killed and wounded.

White Flag Hoisted at Mafeking.

London, Oct. 18.—A dispatch from Pretoria states that a white flag has been hoisted at Mafeking, and the respondent does not know whether the town intends to surrender.</
