TO PROLONG PROSPERITY.

Under the heading: How Can we Make Prosperity stay? the Engineering News presents a very interesting discussion of ways of mitigating the severity of hard times. The influence of the Spanish war expenditures in stimulating prosperity, is dwelt upon. Undoubtedly the demand of the government for supplies, added to the already growing business activity from natural causes, was an important factor in the tremendous revival of industry now in evidence on every hand. They add appreciably to the existing demand for commodities and labor and therefore exercise an important stimulating influence on the general industrial conditions.

The point is that governments, by wise discretion in their extraordinary expenditures, wherever possible, should seek to exercise an equalizing influence upon good times and bad times, thus mitigating the severity of the latter. It is a fact that our seasons of financial prosperity and adversity are really due to fluctuations in the tide of demand. We need as much to check demand in time of prosperity as to stimulate it in time of adversity.

Frequently in good times government grows extravagant and begins works of public improvement that perhaps should not be undertaken at all; whereas, in hard times, reflecting the general sentiment of economy among the people, government often limits expenditures and thus contributes to the industrial depression by further restricting the demand. The correct public policy is just the reverse of this. In hard times needed public works should be undertaken, not only as a means of supplying employment, but also in order that the public may get the advantage of the lower prices prevailing.

THE PRESIDENTIAL VOTE.

It appears to be a pretty well settled fact that Mr. Bryan is to be the democratic nominee next year and Mr. McKinley that of the republican party. In 1896 Mr. Bryan received 178 electoral votes—224 were necessary. If, in 1900, Mr. Bryan succeeds in retaining all the states carried by him in 1896 he will still lack 45 votes.

It is not improbable that Kentucky will add 12 votes next year to the Bryan column, making for him 187, or 37 less than a majority. Of those states which he failed to carry in '96 four indicated that he had a fighting chance. These states, with their republican pluralities and electoral votes are:

If these 34 votes, and Kentucky's 12, were added to the Bryan column in 1900 the total would still be three short of a majority. Other states which are occasionally democratic (1) but which went against Bryan in '96, are Maryland, New Jersey, Connecticut and New York. It is not apparent that the proposition of free silver coinage, at the ratio of 16 to 1, has a large number of new converts in any of these states. It seems, therefore, if any one of them is to be carried by any other than republican votes it will have to be done on some other pledge than that of restoring the monetary status to silver.
