McGregor and others, assert that the committee were not warranted in the use of their names. If Astorians want Astoria to come out from its hole in the ground they had best convince the world that the fools in that city are dead.

Bad work of the linotypes raises a question as to whether phonetic spelling and the continual admission of slang phrases to positions of good and regular standing in our language will not eventually completely destroy the science of etymology. The slang of today becomes the classic of tomorrow, and arbitrary changes in spelling would in time make impossible the tracing of the history of words. But another change threatens to corrupt the purity of our mother tongue. That is the habit common to people of all classes, and differing only in degree, of slurring the beginning and end of words and often entirely obliterating the connections. David Harum's so-called quaint phraseology is read with interest and amusement by many dwellers in our cities who fondly imagine such uncultured pronunciation to be confined to a few Yankees "down East" or the inhabitants of the far west or the sunny south. They would be surprised, however, if some night they could listen to a phonographic reproduction of all the words and phrases they had uttered during the day. There is small doubt they would fail to recognize their own sentiments, so disguised by errors of pronunciation of which they would be the authorship. It is remarkable how the habit has grown of disregarding the legitimate initial and final consonants and vowels and combining the two into meaningless sounds in reality much harder to pronounce.

GOV. YATES INAUGURAL.

The wife of Gov. Dick Yates of Illinois, is the mother of Gov. Richard Yates of today; at whose inauguration last week these solemn words were uttered: "The greatest of all the sons of Illinois, he whose portrait hangs in this hall opposite to the portrait of the great Douglas, immediately after taking the oath of office as chief magistrate of the American people, years ago, said: 'In your hands, my dissatisfied fellow-countrymen, and not in mine, is the momentous issue of civil war. You have no oath registered in heaven to destroy this government, while I shall have the most solemn one to preserve, protect and defend it.' We know now, in the light of his matchless career, that words failed him utterly when at his inauguration he strove to give suitable expression to the sentiments of his inmost soul. For we know now what was in his thought when he raised his hand and kissed the book and completed the act that absolutely and forever bound his loving heart and mighty mind and sublime soul to the glorious cause of the American people. We'll did he keep his oath. Having proclaimed his purpose to rely solely for the help which is needed to perform his stupendous task upon the great American people and that God who has never forsaken them, he simply did so.

"You and I know that he received the help asked for, received it from millions of loyal hearts and from the infinite power on high. He put one hand in the outstretched palm of the American people and with the other he laid a strong hold on the almighty arm of the Almighty God, and, standing there, supported by humanity and supported by divinity, Abraham Lincoln fought the grandest fight and won the grandest victory this world has ever seen since the Savior walked among the sons of men.

"In humble imitation today of his august example, may not you and I get away from the mere words of our obligation, and without endeavoring to express all that it means yet realize the fundamental fact that we have registered an oath which no other man but we are now subject to, and that from this hour our duty to all the generations of Illinois, past, present and to come is to stand up, like men, in our duty and fulfill that oath in spirit and in truth."

On the 17th the senate was notified that the house adopted a resolution appointing a committee to investigate the methods of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, and to report in 10 days. The resolution was concurred in.

Senator Johnston has introduced a bill constituting the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer a commission to build a portage railway between the Dalles and Celilo, and making an appropriation therefor.

It is reported that Geo. J. Mohler brother of President Mohler of the ORN, who lately resigned his position as general manager of the CSRY, will succeed to the position made vacant by the resignation of G.P.A. Hurlbut of the ORN. Mr. Mohler has had experience with eastern roads, and his ability has always been equal to the demands of the position filled.

The gentleman from Clatsop has introduced a bill to preserve the Columbia river and its tributaries above tide water as a spawning ground for salmon. The correct thing now to do would be for the gentleman from Wasco to introduce a bill, and pass it, "to prevent drag (gill) nets from destroying the natural spawning grounds of the salmon all the way up to the Columbia river from the mouth of the Wallamet." With all the federal government and the state can do to protect the fish it is the gill-net vandal who destroys them.

In our innocent and unsophisticated way we really believed that the senatorial question would be finally settled this week. The Oregonian says the real reason why there is no decisive concentration of members on any one avowed candidate for the senate is that there are so many candidates in the background. Each one of these is holding out his little group of members, hoping for a break-up, and then he may get in. No less than a dozen or score of men think of themselves each as a possibility. The problem will work itself out, but it may be a week or two before the evolution is complete. Meantime, there are lightning rods up, all round the sky.

If Mr. Simon can succeed in amending the river and harbor bill so as to substitute a canal and locks for the boat railway above the Dalles and divert the \$220,000 now on hand to the new project, and if Mr. Moody can make the amendment stick in the house, they will have done an excellent piece of work not only for Oregon, but for Eastern Washington and Idaho as well. The measure is more than liable to defeat in the house for the reason that Speaker Henderson, Burton, Cannon and nearly all congressmen in influential positions with respect to appropriations of this nature are not favorable to the improvement of the Columbia river, neither knowing or caring anything about this part of the country.

An able effort is to be made in the assembly to defeat a decree of the Supreme court legalizing collections of the mortgage tax law. The fight is to be made in the interest of the German savings and loan society. A man conversant with the situation makes this statement: The attention of the smaller taxpayers and everybody else ought to be attracted to the fact that B. Goldsmith is the representative of the German savings and loan society in Portland and has been for years. He is the president of this taxpayers' league, and in the judgment of some, stands in a peculiar, not to say equivocal position toward the people who have great faith in the influence of the league. Mr. Goldsmith's attorney in Portland is Milton Smith, and Milton Smith is the brother-in-law of the man who is understood to be fathering and caring for the bill now at Salem to defeat the effect of the Supreme court decision. It is something to study about.
