BREVITIES

THE HALL OF FAME.

The Countess of Jersey is one of England's clever women.

Joseph H. Choate, the former ambassador to the court of St. James, has resumed the practice of law in New York city. He has taken office with his son, Joseph H. Choate, Jr.

Dr. Stephen Call, an octogenarian, has resigned the trusteeship of Lincoln, Okla., declaring that conscientious attention to the duties of that position did not leave him enough time for coon hunting.

Curtis Guild, Jr., the recently elected governor of Massachusetts, is one of many accomplishments, and should have turned his attention to music he would have become noted. He is also an actor of ability.

Secretary Root has secured as his confidential clerk H. F. Neighbors of New York, who acted as private secretary to Mr. Root prior to his appointment. Mr. Root is the first secretary since Mr. Blaine to avail himself of the actual services of an employee of that grade.
