MRS. WILLIAM BUTLER.

The Venerable Founder of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. Mrs. William Butler of Newton Center, Mass., "our mother of missions," as she is called, the venerable founder of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, is a remarkable woman and in spite of her great age and life of privation and hardship is still vigorous and active in the sphere of life to which she has devoted her energy and her intellect.



In 1858, with her husband and two children, Mrs. Butler sailed for India. Her missionary labors were disturbed by the Indian mutiny three years later. "We barely escaped with our lives," she said to a reporter, "and for months were supported by our friends who be dead. A month after we took to the mountains another child was born to me. We were trying to get round to Delhi at the time, and I had a good to

provide milk for the baby. One night a tiger came and carried off the goat." There was not one native Christian in all that part of India then. Mrs. Butler, now in her eighty-fifth year, is planning to attend the forthcoming jubilee of Methodism in India—its fifty-fifth anniversary—when 150,000 native Christians will give her a great ovation. The sum of \$6,000 is to be raised by the Methodist women as a special thank offering for her splendid services in the cause of Methodism—New York Tribune.

How the Kneepers Her Servants. Here are a few rules given by a woman who enjoys a reputation for never having trouble with her numerous servants and retaining them in her service for years:

She pays good wages—that is, she pays as liberally as she can afford and is always punctual in payment.

She allows her servants a reasonable share of all the duties served the family and is liberal in the matter of their food, maintaining that good work cannot be done on an empty stomach.

She rarely criticizes, but when reproof is needed gives it with firmness and without fear, but kindly.

Praise is always given when due; she thinks it well to acknowledge good service to encourage.

She allows each reasonable time for outings and to attend church, and she does not require service when a girl is taking her afternoon off.

She allows her maids time to keep their own clothes in order and requires them to be neat, clean and orderly about their sleeping apartments.

She is never familiar only evinces a kindly interest in the general welfare without becoming in any way involved in the family affairs of any one of her servants.

If a matter goes wrong, she takes time to investigate before reproving and never scolds or rebukes when angry.

If necessary to dismiss a servant, she never does so when in a temper, but waits until she can control herself, so as to command respect.

She will not allow her maids to gossip about her neighbors' affairs nor to make remarks about one member of the family to another.

She will not allow her children to be rude or insolent to the servants, nor will she allow too great familiarity. And her servants remain with her for years and are devoted to her.

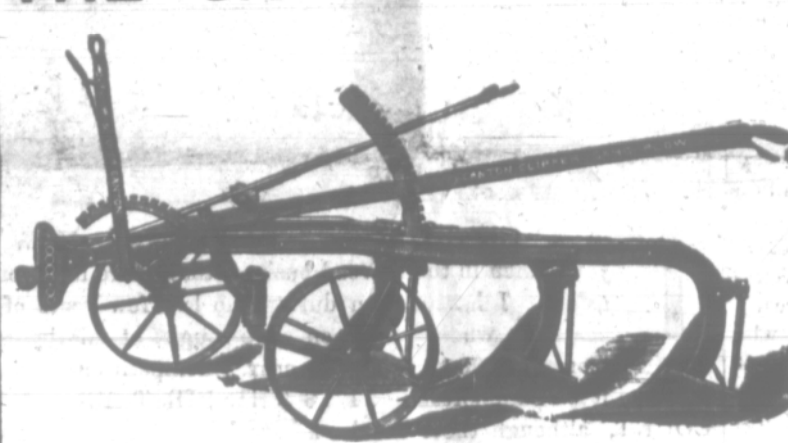
Two Wives and a Maid. A Young Maiden sought the counsel of Two Wives.

best advantage she needs to have knowledge and experience. Working with a home dressmaker is a good training, and taking advantage of the tricks of the trade as seen in the shop windows will save time and trouble. For instance, the large buttons on outside garments of the better class have small buttons on the inside to hold them in place. The thread is not as firm as this little helper and not as tightly. Procks made from material with a loose weave have a narrow tape stitched with the seams so that they cannot pull out. Buttons are often strengthened with lip glue applied before the cutting or with machine stitching between two rows of the hole is cut. These are what I mean by tricks of the trade—Boston Traveler.

Cleaning Velvet. A jeweler told this splendid secret for cleaning velvet. I had taken to him for riveting a little darning bag, to be suspended from a silver clasp. As he gave it back into my hands he said, "It will need to be brushed." Then, with a smile, for I was an old patron, he added: "I'll tell you a secret. Dip your velvet brush in damp sand, and see, the velvet comes forth as fresh as though it were new. It is a cleaning process, too, for the slight moisture removes dust, and the harsh action of the sandy friction gives new life to the nap which has been worn down."

A Damaged Mirror. To repair a damaged mirror pour upon a sheet of tin foil about three ounces of quinine to the square foot of foil. Rub smartly with a piece of buckskin until the foil becomes brilliant. Lay the glass upon a flat surface facing downward. Place the foil upon the damaged portion of the glass, lay a sheet of paper over the foil and place upon it a block of wood or a piece of marble with a perfectly flat surface; put upon it sufficient weight to press it down tightly; let it remain in this position a few hours. The foil will adhere to the glass.

The Bedroom Lamp Shade. On a plain silk lamp shade for use in sleeping apartments in an upper hall or in a dining room dainty red roses or forget-me-nots could be painted in the center for ornament, making a border at the top and bottom by joining the flowers into wreaths. Or if the plain shade needs a daintier prettier piece, a sheet of paper over the foil and place upon it a block of wood or a piece of marble with a perfectly flat surface; put upon it sufficient weight to press it down tightly; let it remain in this position a few hours. The foil will adhere to the glass.

Blistered Linen. To prevent blistering in linen, which is almost always due to bad starching, but occasionally to ironing the articles when too wet, each article must be well starched through, and when about to iron it must be dampened evenly, but not wet. Use a hot iron. Collars and cuffs that have to be turned down should be fixed in the proper shape immediately after each one is ironed, for then the starch is less flexible.

Orange Salad. Some oranges may be utilized in a delicious salad. Slice the oranges not too thin and remove the skin, leaving the pulp in small triangular pieces, with French dressing or white mayonnaise. The little oranges called clementines are very good indeed served in exactly the same way. Blanched English walnuts mixed with such salads are a great addition.

Keeping Your Figure. Always carry the chest further in front of you than any other part of the body, certainly then the part below the waist, but draw this latter part up and up many times a day, especially if you are inclined to get fat there, and nothing destroys a figure more than this which has been described as "the middle aged spread."
