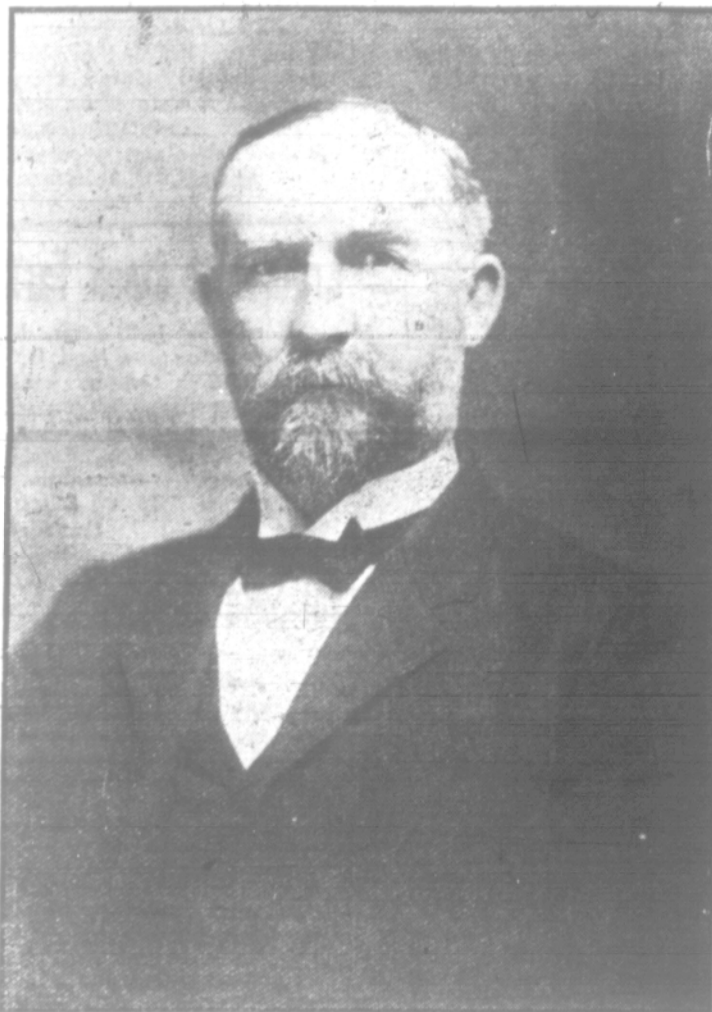

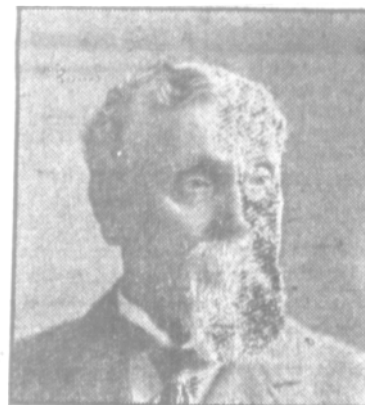
Attorney-General of the state of
Oregon, has announced himself as a
candidate for re-nomination by the
Republicans of this state. Having
served one term with entire satisfac-
tion to the people of the state, the
usual custom will probably be ob-
served and he will be re-nominated
without opposition. Mr. Crawford
has been a member of the Oregon
bar for twenty-five years, which
time he has spent practicing his
profession at Roseburg and Marsh-
field. He was elected attorney-gen-
eral in 1902. During his term he
has been the legal adviser of all the
state officers and boards and com-
missions, and it may be said to his
credit that the state has become in-
volved in very little litigation. Mr.
Crawford's advice to the state land
board that interest should not be

paid to speculators who invested in
the land selected upon invalid min-
eral base, where the investor could
have occupied the land, saved the
state many times the amount of sal-
ary for four years. He has now in
charge three important suits of
great interest to the state. One to
establish the state's rights to nearly
100,000 acres of swamp land in
Klamath county, one to recover from
the Portland General Electric com-
pany 10 per cent of the net profits
of the traffic through the locks at
Oregon City, and one to determine
the boundary line between the states
of Oregon and Washington. Mr.
Crawford has been a safe, conserva-
tive legal adviser, always accom-
modating toward those who have
business with his department, and
prompt in the dispatch of matters
given to his charge.

The best known man in western
Oregon and the most popular man

has done more to build up the cause

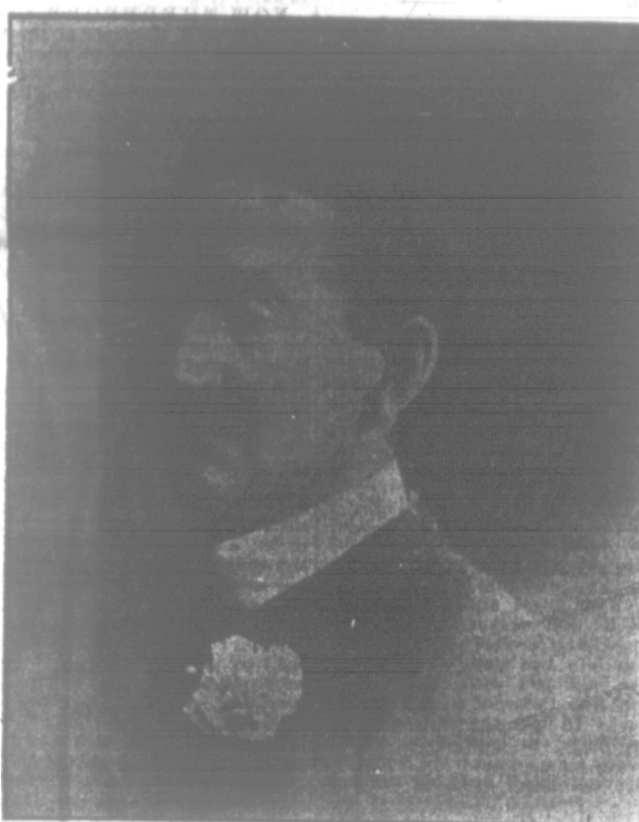


Hon. George A. Steel, Candidate for Nomination for State Treasurer
Was formerly connected with the street
rwy systems of Portland, having been one
of the prime movers in the building of
the Oregon city and Mount Scott lines,
and has been identified in many ways
with the development of Oregon indus-
tries and resources, and in a marked
degree has had and field the confidence
of the people of the state as a candidate for
office in those varied relations. The
friendships thus formed stand Mr. Steel
in good stead now that he is before the
people of the state as a candidate for
office in the direct primary elec-
tion, and without disparaging
the pretensions of any other gen-
tlemen aspiring to the position which Mr.
Steel is seeking, it seems that Mr. Steel
is the strong man in the race. His un-
requited work in behalf of the republi-
can party of the state, having carried
the party through several campaigns to
victory when the outlook was any-
thing but promising, entitle him to the

local support of republicans in every
section, especially in Multnomah, where
many of his best years were spent, and
in Clackamas, where he carved a mag-
nificent farm in the native wilderness.
As Mr. Steel says: The principal duty
of the incumbent of the state treasurer's
office is to keep safely the money of
the people, so that it may not be want-
ed or diverted. If elected, I pledge my-
self to perform that duty with absolute
fidelity. In respect to other ques-
tions in which the people may now be in-
terested, I will say that I am in favor of
the principles of the direct primary elec-
tion law, and believe that it should be
enforced in letter and spirit, including
the provisions for the election of U. S.
senators by direct vote of the people. It
shall be my effort, if elected, to carefully
study the laws pertaining to my office,
and to carefully scrutinize every pro-
vision which may govern my official
action.

Jonathan Bourne, Jr.



Republican Candidate for United States Senator. Champion of Statement One.

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate be-
fore the republican primaries for the
nomination of United States Senator in
congress, for the long term commencing
March 4, 1907, was born in Bedford
Mass., February 23, 1855; was a mem-
ber of the class of 1877 at Harvard Uni-
versity; came to Portland May 16, 1878;
was a republican member of the Oregon
legislature in the session of 1885 and the
extra session of 1886; was one of Oregon's
delegates to the Republican National
convention of 1888, and Oregon member
of the Republican National committee
from 1888 to 1902, and a delegate to the
Republican National convention of 1902;
and was elected as a Mitchell republican
to the Oregon legislature in 1896.
Mr. Bourne has been more prominently
identified with the development of the
mineral resources of Oregon than any
other man in the state, having expended
in the last 20 years over \$1,000,000 of his
own money in the acquisition and devel-
opment of Oregon mines.
While Mr. Bourne has had his resi-
dence and main office at Portland since
1878, he has had another office at New
Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the
business of his fathers estate since 1889,
which makes him familiar with many of
the large interests and leading men in
the East. These qualifications, in con-
junction with his energy, originality, ex-
ecutive ability, and experience in busi-
ness and political affairs, pre-eminently
qualify him for making an able and in-
fluential Senator from the state of
Oregon.
Mr. Bourne has always favored ex-
tending the direct power of the people
over their government as far as possible.
He was one of the leading spirits in the
initiative and referendum movement
from 1886, until it was approved by the
voters at the June election in 1902. In
1904 he was a member of the executive
committee of the Direct Primary Nom-
ination League, and holds the same po-
