## The SPORTING WORLD

**Corrigan, Turf General.**  
Ed Corrigan, "the master of Haw-  
thorne," will go down in history as  
one of the most indefatigable turf fight-  
ers of all time. Corrigan has been fight-  
ing other turf notables for more than



a decade. There is seldom a time when  
some one is not camping on his trail in  
full war paint.  
Corrigan is said to be losing \$1,000 a  
day because of his long drawn out  
battle in New Orleans, where the track  
controlled by his arch-enemy, the West-  
ern Jockey club, refuses to be put out  
of business. By forming the American  
Racing association Corrigan worked  
great harm to the Western Jockey club.  
The eastern tracks long ago barred  
Corrigan's horses.

**Championship Billiard Tourney.**  
A billiard tournament to settle  
the championship of the world will be  
played at Madison Square Garden, in  
New York city, beginning April 8 and  
lasting two weeks. Six of the greatest  
living exponents of the game will com-  
pete for a medal emblematic of first  
place among the professionals. The  
players who will participate in the  
tourney are Jake Schaefer, Blossom,  
Sutton, Ora, Morningstar, Hoppe and  
Cure, the Frenchman.

A committee promoting the tourney  
is now arranging the details, and it is  
the intention of the promoters to make  
the affair the biggest ever known in  
the billiard world. Julius Baiko of  
Chicago is one of the leading spirits in  
trying to get the top notch profession-  
als together again to stimulate interest  
in billiards.  
The style of game to be played will  
be eighteen inch ball line, two shots in.  
After the championship has been de-  
cided in New York an effort will be  
made to take the entire list of con-  
testants to Chicago to compete in a  
round robin tournament for some spe-  
cial prizes of considerable value.  
George Blossom anticipates an early  
trip to Paris to rejuvenate the "acade-  
mies" and to play for the world's cham-  
pionship.

**Chicago's Athletic Recruits.**  
More timber for a championship track  
team at the University of Chicago has  
been promised by Catch Stagg. At  
least a dozen athletes of ability have  
entered the Midway school.  
It is stated officially that Roy Mad-  
digan, the former Englewood (Ill.) high  
school track star and football player,  
will join the track squad. Another  
track man of promise is Joseph Ri-  
dolph of Crown Point, Ind., a pole  
vaulter, who has gone above the eleven  
foot mark repeatedly.

Maddigan, who is considered one of  
the best pole vaulters in the world, an ath-  
letic way, has been working on a farm  
since his graduation from high school  
last spring. He is now six feet one  
and a half inches in height, weighs 200  
pounds and is considered one of the  
best proportioned athletes in the west.  
As a track man Maddigan held the  
local high school championship in the  
weights last spring. He is also a high  
 jumper of ability and is good in the  
pole vault, although his great weight  
now will force him to give up this  
event. While he is regarded as excel-  
lent material for the track team, many  
believe he will prove of greater strength  
on the football field.

**Tenny as a Public Star.**  
The famous race horse Tenny is this  
season to be offered as a public star.  
The once famous race horse is now  
spending his last days on an obscure  
farm in Harrison county. H. C. Duffy,  
residing near Cynthiana, has offered  
the service of Tenny to the public for a  
small fee. The horse has been unfor-  
tunate during his career in the stud,  
and few mares have been bred to him.

**Charles Olson.**  
Charles Olson, the wrestler, issued a  
challenge from Asherville, N. C., re-  
cently to any wrestler in the world, no  
weight barred. Olson at present claims  
the world's middle-weight champion-  
ship. One Hackenschmidt, who is  
something of a wrestler himself, would  
make Mr. Olson look like a Chinese yen  
in a match.

**Keene to Race Again.**  
Foxhall Keene told a friend recently  
that he will drive again in the Van-  
derbilt auto race next fall and that he  
has already ordered the car he will use.

## Need of the Juvenile Reformatory

By HASTINGS H. HART, Superintendent Illinois Children's Home  
and Aid Society

THE juvenile reformatory is not designed as a PERMA-  
NENT institution in which to bring up children to man-  
hood and womanhood. However good an institution may  
be, however kindly its spirit, however genial its atmos-  
phere, however homelike its cottages, however fatherly  
and motherly its officers, however admirable its training, it is now  
generally agreed among those who are familiar with the needs of chil-  
dren of this class that institutional life is at the best artificial and un-  
natural and that the child ought to be returned at the earliest practi-  
cable moment to the more natural environment of the family home—  
HIS OWN HOME if it is a suitable one, and if not then some other  
family home.

A juvenile reformatory should be planned for a maximum of 500  
boys or girls for the reason that the number should not go beyond  
what can be kept within the personal knowledge and acquaintance of  
a single superintendent. If the average stay of the inmates is eight-  
een months, which is probably enough, and the average number is  
500, that will mean about one new pupil every day in the year, and  
it will tax the powers of any superintendent to keep up a personal ac-  
quaintance with that number of children. If the superintendent cannot  
know the children, that means a delegating of responsibility which  
NECESSARILY interferes with the best results.

The religious training of the children must be directed and its  
general methods regulated BY THE AUTHORITIES OF THE  
INSTITUTION. The practice of allowing every zealous clergyman,  
every representative of a religious or semireligious organization to ad-  
minister religious instruction to the children as they may see fit is not  
only a wrong educational method, but it is a wrong RELIGIOUS  
method.

The intellectual training should be of the HIGHEST quality.  
The majority of the children will be found backward in their studies;  
many of them dull and more disinclined to study.

TEACHERS SHOULD BE SELECTED WITH REFERENCE TO  
THEIR SPECIAL ATTITUDE IN STIMULATING SUCH PUPILS TO AN  
INTEREST TO STUDY.

to apply the standard of efficiency WITH INCREASING  
THOROUGHNESS. The three men who are doing most  
to equip colleges are applying the test of efficiency. Dr.  
Pearsons, Mr. Carnegie and Mr. Rockefeller are constantly exam-  
ining colleges for the purpose of learning the relationship BE-  
TWEEN THEIR PRODUCT AND THEIR EXPENDITURE.  
Of course a share of the academic product it is impossible to test by  
ordinary standards.

THE PRODUCT HAS A VALUE IN QUALITY AS WELL AS IN  
QUANTITY. BUT THE TEST OF AMOUNT OF PRODUCT HAS  
VALUE.

## Influence of the Simple Life Upon the Success of Japan

By Baron KOMURA, the Mikado's Chief Peace Plenipotentiary

THE so called "yellow peril" is wholly the creation of the imag-  
ination on the part of some INTERESTED people of Eu-  
rope.

Not only Japan and China, but the entire civilized  
world, will gain immeasurably by our conflict with Russia. The  
Japanese feel most gratified because in the war they have not only ob-  
tained the permanent safety and lasting security of their own country,  
as it seems now, but have FOR AT LEAST A CENTURY and  
perhaps for all time arrested the "glacial advance"  
of the bear to the southeast.

The Japanese people could never have won the  
victory they have won were it not for three things.  
In the first place, they were thrice armed by having  
their quarrel just; secondly, THEIR ENTIRE  
PUBLIC SERVICE WAS ABSOLUTELY FREE  
FROM CORRUPT PRACTICES, and, lastly, their  
mode of life has ever been one of such extreme sim-  
plicity that their soldiers thus gained an equipment for the stress of  
war they never could have gained had they, like too many other na-  
tions, abandoned themselves to lives of luxury and sloth and been  
unwilling, if not unable, to put their hands to STRENUOUS tasks.

President Roosevelt, it would seem, has from the very beginning  
recognized the value and truth of the idea expressed by one of your  
philosophers when he referred to "plain living and high thinking." The  
importance of the simple life has in Japan been demonstrated  
BY THE WHOLE BODY OF THE PEOPLE just as it has  
been by a few individual instances in this country.

It will not require many years for Japan to recover fully from  
the effects of the war with Russia. She will gain also from the growth  
of commercial and political relations with the United States, England  
and Europe, and I am positive that in the future those who are  
prophesying about the "yellow peril" will not find their horrifying  
predictions realized IN THE SLIGHTEST DEGREE.

Especially will Japan and the United States mutually flourish in  
the growth of international relations. We have many things you  
need, and you can supply us with such as we shall find necessary.  
Our treatment of prisoners of war has been so humane that the  
Russians have not a word of complaint to make.

BESIDES NURSING THEIR SICK AND GIVING THE OTHER PRIS-  
ONERS THE BEST OF CARE, WE PROVIDED ENTERTAINMENTS FOR  
THEM; AND AS A RESULT MANY A POOR FELLOW LEADS A  
HAPPIER LIFE IN THE ENEMY'S COUNTRY THAN HE EVER DID  
IN HIS OWN.
