Although the prohibitionists of Oregon have placed a ticket in the field for the coming June election, the names of its nominees will not appear upon the official ballot unless the candidates are again nominated by individual petition.

As the present ticket failed to reach the secretary of state in time for filing, I. H. Ames has urged that immediate steps be taken to make the nomination comply with the legal requirements.

We are not so universally money-mad as we may seem. The older Agassiz was not the only man in this country who ever felt that he had not time to make money. The longing for riches is not universally a predominant passion. Thousands of men feel money-getting is not primarily their calling, and would not leave the work they love and pay the price in time and concentrated effort if ever so good a chance was offered them of a fortune honestly won. The man in whom the money-hunger is so strong and effectual that he is willing to devote his life to satisfying it is a very exceptional man. Most of us hate to save, and the pleasure or profit of the hour looks bigger to us than those of the remote future. Moreover, to almost all the leading preachers, doctors and schoolmasters, and to many of the editors, painters, architects, money, though important, is a secondary consideration. They want to make a living, and much prefer that it shall be a good one, but professional success and reputation is of more value to them than superfluous riches. And why not? Is it not a much more satisfying thing to be a living force, master of a great profession or a great art, or a public leader, than to be merely the possessor of filthy lucre?

Wisdom has been displayed in placing the distribution of relief supplies at San Francisco in the hands of General Funston or of officers assigned by him to take direct charge. The army organization is such as to insure system in the work whereby all the destitute may get their share and none be favored over others.

Outlaw Smith was shot dead near New Era Tuesday morning, he was trailed through the brush by blood hounds brought from Spokane. He was hidden behind a log and was shot through the temple by the dog owner as he was trying to draw a gun. Smith had committed three murders, four burglaries, and an escape from the Portland jail in the ten days just before he was shot.

Secretary of the Treasury Shaw finds time outside of his official duties to talk on subjects of general interest to the country. One of these occasions presented itself a few days ago when he addressed an audience of over 1000 young and old people in a Brooklyn church and impressed upon them that Bible study and Sunday schools were vitally essential to the welfare and progress of the nation. In an age when so many men in the business and political world are careless on these matters it is interesting to hear a man-in-Secretary Shaw's position emphasizing their importance.

The Bible class of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., in N. Y. City, was composed of mercenary sinners to the number of about 125, all of whom, like the Baptist Mission Chinese in Portland years ago, "Lub Clit for flor dollu week." As they learned in the Rockefeller class after a while that the flor dollu week for lub Clit did not materialize, in John D.'s estimation; they sneaked away, and thus it was that nearly 10,000 "pupils" joined the class on the "on and off" principle annually. John D. is quitting disgusted.

The ball game between Grass Valley and Moro last Sunday was a hotly contested one. True, some of the Morosites had the spring fever and underwent somnolent trances on the cushions. Mesch had linesupport, except at first station out Ed. himself was off that day.

### MR. BOURNE WINS.

The nomination of Jonathan Bourne for United States Senator was the big surprise of the primary election. Early returns gave H. M. Cake a lead of over 1000 votes and it was believed by all that this lead could not be overcome. For days Mr. Cake received telegrams of congratulation from his friends in Oregon, and the news was sent to all parts of the United States that Cake had won the nomination. Mr. Bourne, himself, had conceded his defeat and given Mr. Cake assurances of his hearty support. The late returns which gave the nomination to Bourne therefore came as a surprise to every voter in the state. Mr. Bourne is now the nominee of the republican party as against Senator Gearin the present incumbent and appointee of Gov. Chamberlain and nominee of the democratic party.
