INSURANCE COMPANY BUSTS. After wavering in the balance ever since the catclysm at San Francisco, the Traders' Insurance Company, whose directors and stockholders are among Chicago's wealthiest citizens, went into the hands of a receiver May 5th. The directors had ordered an assessment of \$200 a share on the issue of 50,000 shares but it was given out that the assessment plan failed because fully half of the stockholders tho' rich enough to pay it refused to do so. It was then decided that there was nothing left to do but ask that a receiver be appointed which was done at the instance of the directors themselves.

REGISTER YOUR VOTE. A great many voters, about one third of them in this county, failed to register for the primary election held April 20. All such voters must now register in order to vote in the general election, the first Monday in June. The registration for this purpose will close on May 15, only five days hence. Go and register, if you did not prior to the primary election, and do it early. Don't bother the election board, and your neighbors and friends, and the public generally by going around to the polls and swearing in your vote. It is only necessary in exceptional cases; it is generally an evidence of negligence and political thriftlessness, of which any American citizen ought to be ashamed.

THE BEAVER BUTTON which will hereafter officially designate Oregon industry, has been taken up by all commercial organizations of the state. Brilliantly colored green and white buttons, bearing the officially adopted insignia of the manufacturers of the state, who are to hold a great carnival of display, May 19 to 25, at Portland, are being sent out from head quarters by the thousands, and every man, woman, and child in this state who wants a memento of the inauguration of the "Made in Oregon" annual exhibition, may send their name and address to D. C. Freeman, secretary, Portland, and receive a button.

LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS. Complaints have been filed in Wasco county by Attorney W. H. Wilson in condemnation proceedings instituted by the Oregon Trunk Line to secure right of way over land owned by Mr and Mrs J. H. Sberar, B. F. Laughlin, E. F. Sharp and Kathleen Sharp and G. T. Parr and Grace Parr. The land in question is located along the Deschutes river and over it the Trunk Line intends to build its railroad, concerning the value of which the railroad and the owners have failed to agree.

In talking with Mr Parr about the suits for right of way filed by the Oregon Trunk Line he said that the company wants the very best part of the land; if they get title as comparatively valueless; that if the real backers of the road would make themselves known and assure the owners of the land that the project is not all hot air it would be received differently by the people who bought the land without thought of a railroad ever going there, they want it for an electric power plant site.

Rev. Paul Rader delivered an instructive sermon on the proposed amendment to the local option law at the Methodist church Sunday evening.

Rev. A. J. Adams, after serving the Moro Presbyterian church for two years, has been unanimously called to the pastorate. He will be installed pastor Thursday evening, May 17th, Rev. E. T. Allan of Irrigon, will preside and preach the sermon, Rev. Levi Johnson of Pendleton, and Rev. E. L. Moore, recently of Nashville, Tenn., will assist at the installation. The public cordially invited to attend these interesting services.

SCHOOL FIELD MEET. A regular May carnival and school field meet between the schools of Moro, Wasco and Grass Valley will be held at Moro, May 25th, 1906, beginning at 10 a. m. Everybody come and bring your baskets well filled with good things to eat and enjoy the day with them. Refreshments will be served on the grounds to all those who wish it. The Moro cornet band will furnish music during the intermissions. The day will be taken up with games, races, etc., consisting of all kinds of athletic sports, base ball, basket ball, 100 yard dash, 50 yard dash, egg race, running broad jump, running high jump, shot put, relay race, etc. One admission of 25 cents pays for all, both morning and afternoon; grand stand 10 cents extra.

COLUMBIA SOUTHERN THROUGH TRAIN SERVICE from Shaniko via Biggs to The Dalles and Portland will soon go into effect. A. L. Craig general passenger agent, and W. E. Coman, assistant general freight agent of the OR & NCo. met a number of the business men of the Dalles at the Merchants' Club parlors and discussed the question of securing a local train between Portland, the Dalles and Biggs, to connect with the Columbia Southern for points on that line. During the meeting Mr Craig said that the matter of a local train had been brought to his attention and after consulting with the business men present he had determined to recommend it, and his idea would be to have the train leave Portland at 8:15 a. m., reaching the Dalles about 11:15 a. m., going on to Biggs to meet the Columbia Southern, returning to the Dalles at 12:40 and remain there until 3 p. m., before leaving for Portland. Thus Sherman county passengers could lay over at the Dalles, instead of at Biggs, and if it suited their pleasure spend the afternoon there, leaving for home on a later train. This arrangement is something Sherman county people long have desired, and from which the railway companies will derive considerable benefit, by connecting Columbia Southern points with a through train to the Dalles and Portland. It will certainly meet with favor from Sherman county people, who have often asked for such consummation. Mr Craig's recommendation is assurance of the establishment of the service, but at how early a date it is impossible to say.
