CHEAP RAILROAD TRAVELING.

A

reduction in fares from Pacific

Coast points to New York, Boston,
Montreal and intervening points,
make the through fare \$58, is an-
nounced by A. L. Craig, general
passenger agent of the Harriman
lines in the Northwest, after a con-
ference with passenger officials of
other Northwestern roads. The
new rate becomes effective immedi-
ately and will continue until further
notice. This rate is the result of a
cut in tariff by the Soo lines and
the readjustment in the east called
for a similar cut in the price of
through tickets. The rate from
Spokane, Pendleton, Walla Walla
and common points is now \$58.
Tickets sold at the \$58 and \$53
tariffs will be good by way of Mon-
treal and St. Lawrence River gate-
ways, over either the Grand Trunk
or Wabash out of Chicago. How
long the reduced rates will continue
is only a matter of surmise. Some
railroaders predict that they will
not last longer than the final week
of June, although a continuation
after that date is considered likely.

Feed That Mother.

Milk albumen, which is a byproduct

of the milk sugar factories, was com-
pared with fresh meat and meat scraps
at the Utah station, with the result
greatly favoring the meat. As the al-
bumen is very rich in protein, it ap-
pears that the trouble is owing to its
lack of fat, the fatty material in the
meat helping to increase egg produc-
tion. It has been found that lean meat
produces better results fed with eggs
than with wheat, indicating that the
fatty material must be obtained some-
how and that when it is lacking in the
meat it can be obtained from a grain
which contains oil, like corn. Pans at
the Utah station having the most fat
produced most eggs. The meat gen-
erally comes from the cow and is of
course poor. Eggs fed from meat
scraps or bone gave a considerably
better egg yield than those having meat
meal. The results tend to suggest that
the importance of fat in food has been
underestimated and that much of the good
effect of meat is due to the fat which it
contains rather than the protein or
lean portion.

Frost Air For Heat.

When a poultry house "sweats,"

when dampness condenses on the walls
and forms as frost or drips down upon
the occupants it is a sure sign that the
house is not aired often enough or that
the men have overestimated the capacity of
the building and have too many fowls in it.
You can keep more birds with safety in
a well aired building than in one that
is kept tightly closed. For this reason,
