CHEAP RAILROAD TRAVELING. A reduction in fares from Pacific Coast points to New York, Boston, Montreal and intervening points, make the through fare \$58, is announced by A. L. Craig, general passenger agent of the Harriman lines in the Northwest, after a conference with passenger officials of other Northwestern roads. The new rate becomes effective immediately and will continue until further notice. This rate is the result of a cut in tariff by the Soo lines and the readjustment in the east called for a similar cut in the price of through tickets. The rate from Spokane, Pendleton, Walla Walla and common points is now \$53. Tickets sold at the \$58 and \$53 tariffs will be good by way of Montreal and St. Lawrence River gateways, over either the Grand Trunk or Wabash out of Chicago. How long the reduced rates will continue is only a matter of surmise. Some railroads predict that they will not last longer than the final week of June, although a continuation after that date is considered likely.
